ARNOLD (BUT LITTLE ELSE) IS BACK IN 'TERMINATOR'

Thirty-one years and counting, and the Terminators keep rolling off the assembly line like new iPhones, upgraded with shape-shifting abilities, rebooted Sarah Conner assassination levels and, one presumes, better selfie cameras.

"Terminator Genisys," directed by Alan Taylor ("Thor: The Dark World"), is the fifth entry in the series begun by James Cameron and a naked money grab aimed at rejuvenating a flagging franchise. The three-plus decades of "Terminator" have spread across the relentless march of technology and the Internet, but the movies are curiously stuck between their pre-digital 1980s origins and a dystopian vision of machines' rule over the planet.

However many Terminators are

unveiled, the mechanical heart and soul of the series will always be Arnold Schwarzenegger's T-800. He's the android version of earlier, cast-aside operating systems: a Game Boy with a gun. "I'm old, not obsolete," he says in "Genisys."

And that, surprisingly, is the case. Schwarzenegger's return to his most iconic role (he was absent in the forgettable 2009 entry "Terminator Salvation" while governor) provides much of the appeal of this otherwise purposeless redo

Not only does his leather jacketclad hulk continually best newer, better Terminators, in "Genisys" the 67-year-old successfully wrestles a synthetic version of his younger, body-building self. Aging is a hard fact of life, even for the machines sent from the future to kill us.

Five films in, "Genisys" works very hard to explain its existence. Screenwriters Laeta Kalogridis and Patrick Lussier begin in 2029, long after Skynet robots destroyed most of humanity in Judgment Day. John Conner (Jason Clarke) is leading a promising if grim revolution when the fight begins hopping through

To rescue John's mother, Sarah Conner, John sends his loyal soldier Kyle Reese (Jai Courtney) to 1984. But the machines are aware of the plot, and after Reese lands with a thud in a Los Angeles back alley, the familiar T-1000 of "Terminator 2" (he of liquid metal, played here by Byung-hun Lee) is just around

the corner.

Sarah (Emilia Clarke) is more the one doing the rescuing, though. With Schwarzenegger's Terminator in tow ("Pops" she calls her longtime cyborg protector), she informs Reese of a very different mission than the one he was expecting.

An alternate timeline, caused by the crisscrossing time travel, is offered up for why many of the events of previous "Terminator" films — often in the same locations, with the same catch phrases — are repeated. It makes for a cautionary tale: Hand rebootcrazy Hollywood a plot device like a time machine and the most advisable course of action is to run for cover.

The movies may be acquiring another potentially dangerous tool: the means to clone. "Terminator Genisys" may well be most

remembered for the digital cameo of a young Schwarzenegger. Granted, monosyllabic blocks of wood are likely easier to photocopy than other actors. But the digital rendering is nevertheless impressive.


Sarah, Reese and the T-800 travel ahead to 2017 to prevent Judgment Day, postponed (through a great deal of illogical, belabored description) from its original 1997 date. The film tries to claw its way into the present, and, hopefully, into a future trilogy.

Linda Hamilton devotees will likely never accept another in the role. But Clarke, the ascendant dragon mother of "Game of Thrones," gives the film enough grit and a touch of depth.

But as Taylor leads the movie from set piece to set piece, the time-traveling thread of "Terminator" begins to unravel and its welcome playful tone ("Genisys" is often enjoyably ludicrous) bleeds into ill-advised self-parody.

The "Terminator" films are about a ceaseless, impossible quest to close the Pandora's box of technology before it ruins us. But "Genisys" is too busy remixing franchise favorites and setting up further sequels to devote much attention to the sci-fi anxieties that spurred it in the first place. As Alex Garland's recent "Ex Machina" showed, those are questions worth rebooting.



IN 'KEEPERS,' FILM CRITIC REVISITS A LIFETIME AT THE MOVIES

A theater up the street asks this employees to include the title of a favorite movie on their nametags. The choices of these teenagers and twentysomethings can be anything from "Fast and Furious 5" or "The Hunger Games" to the occasional retro pick like "The Sound of Music."

It prompts the question, "Why that movie?" There's probably more behind the choice than just a favorite star or mind-blowing special effects. Often it's the context we bring to the theater that makes it a particular kind of experience, good or bad, and says something about us and our lives at a moment in time.

Answering that potentially personal question is one factor that sets "Keepers" apart from other books extolling Hollywood's best. Another is its author, film critic and historian Richard Schickel, a keeper himself after a half-century of ruminating about the cinema. For kindred spirits who would rather watch a movie than do pretty much anything else, reading Schickel's memoir is like paging through a

family photo album with a wise and witty elder who tells you what he thinks is going on around a picture's edges.

Unlike those who point out the films to see before your internal bulb burns out, Schickel doesn't provide a handy list. He has a story to tell — his or the movie's, if not both — and

goes beyond a recap of the plot. He also provides a bit of insight gleaned from having known an actor or filmmaker. Of the enigmatic director Stanley Kubrick, he remarks: "You never had a bad time with Stanley. You never came away from time spent with him unenlightened — he told you of a book or a movie you had to see, an idea you had to pursue."

Many of Schickel's keepers will be familiar to seasoned movie fans. After all, there is wide agreement about films like "Citizen Kane," ''Double Indemnity," ''The Searchers," "The Godfather" and "Chinatown." One of the attractions of "Keepers" is the encouragement to check out less prominent films, for example, writerdirector Preston Sturges' work from the 1940s and foreign films from the 1950s like "The 400 Blows" and "Ikiru." Schickel makes room on the buffet for low-budget entertainments, too, such as the 1959 Audie Murphy Western "No Name on the Bullet."


NEIL YOUNG'S 'THE MONSANTO YEARS' ATTACKS CORPORATE GREED

Neil Young's voice, playing and passion are undimmed, but his lyrical talent is diminished in much of this new album, which — as the title "The Monsanto Years" suggests — is obsessed with what he perceives as the despoiling of America at the hands of corrupt corporations and complacent politicians.

The sound is distinctive Neil, little changed over 50 years, though the voice is a bit scratchier now. But he's replaced the symbolic approach — "flying Mother Nature's silver seed to a new home in the sun" from 1970's "After the Gold Rush," for example — with a more literal style. The complaints about Monsanto, Walmart and "big box" stores that are killing mom and pop shops too quickly devolve into sloganeering.

It's a pity that the words aren't more nuanced, because much of the music, recorded with the L.A. band Promise of the Real, is haunting. "Wolf Moon" — yes, he's still singing about the moon — is evocative and powerful to begin with, but weakens as it becomes overtly political. "Workin' Man" uses vignettes nicely to build context, and "Rules of Change" is driven by a simple, effective percussion that evokes Native American rhythms and the beauty of the plains.

The recurrent themes are plunder and

greed. Young laments that people only want to hear about love, not the truth about the environmental calamity confronting them.

His position is heartfelt, and his anger so real you can taste it, but there is something discomfiting about Young positioning himself as an all-knowing seer, putting people down for wanting simpler, cheerier songs. It's easy to admire Young for taking a stand, for not taking the easy "greatest hits" route, but these songs would benefit from a subtler lyric approach.

San Francisco hotels are world's priciest as rates surge 88 percent

an Francisco already is one of the priciest U.S. cities for apartment renters and companies seeking office space. Now the area has a new distinction: it's the world's most expensive place for visitors to spend the night.

The average price for a San Francisco hotel room has jumped 88 percent in the past year to USD397 a night, according to an index compiled by Bloomberg of the world's top 100 financial centers. The city ranks ahead of Geneva, where rooms set travelers back \$292 a night, and Milan, at \$271. Chicago, with rates at \$240, ties Miami as the second-costliest U.S. cities

The surge in San Francisco room rates was the biggest among the lodging markets tracked by Bloomberg. The rising costs are being driven by the region's technology-industry boom, a soaring job market and a dearth of hotel construction as developers focus on office and residential buildings - a combination that's allowing operators to be aggressive with their pricing.

"The influx of tech companies into San Francisco has been tremendous, and with it this new emerging traveler, this millennial traveler, who is looking for downtown experiences," said Chuck Pacioni, general manager at the San Francisco Marriott Marquis. "Many of them may travel for work to Silicon Valley, but instead of staying at a suburban hotel, they want to stay in the city for the culture and the experiences."

The high rates visitors are paying for rooms has enticed investors. Loews Corp.'s lodging unit bought the Mandarin Oriental San Francisco Hotel in April, two

months after Hilton Worldwide Holdings Inc. purchased the city's Parc 55.

San Francisco is one of 25 lodging markets with a year-overyear increase in room rates, the Bloomberg data show. Chicago had the second-biggest gain, with a 64 percent surge, followed by a 47 percent jump in Milan and a 33 percent rise in Kuala Lumpur. Among U.S. cities where hotel costs have fallen, New York had the biggest decrease, with a 13 percent decline to an average room rate of \$202. In Europe, Paris hotels were among the biggest losers, with a 37 percent drop to \$146.

Nightly prices in Budapest fell by more than half, the greatest decline worldwide, to \$85. Globally, the cheapest market is Hanoi, Vietnam, where rooms average \$62 a night.

The Bloomberg gauge measured 100 cities based on the average daily cost of hotels, regardless of star ratings, for two adults in a double-occupancy room. Rate calculations were taken in May for two blocks of time - Aug. 1 to Aug. 10 of this year and Feb. 1 to Feb. 10, 2016 - to account for holiday, promotion and convention-related pricing.

In San Francisco, a booming job market has helped boost the city's population by 5.9 percent over four years, according to the latest U.S. Census Bureau figures. That compares with a 4.2 percent gain statewide.

The city's workforce growth has led developers to focus on building office projects, said David Loeb, a lodging analyst at Milwaukee-based Robert W. Baird & Co. More than 8 million square feet (743,000 square meters) of office space is scheduled for development in the next four years, according to CBRE Group Inc. San Francisco may surpass Manhattan as the priciest U.S. office market by the end of this year, the brokerage said this month.

Kilroy Realty Corp. is building a 30-story tower for Salesforce.com Inc. in the city's booming South of Market neighborhood. Across the street, Boston Properties Inc. and Hines are developing what will be the city's tallest skyscraper, about 50 percent leased to Salesforce, and Jay Paul Co. is erecting a 684,000-square-foot office and condominium project. Residential projects are popular, with San Francisco apartment rents averaging \$2,280 in the first quarter, twice the national average, according to research firm

"There's a ton of office and a ton of residential going up because there's a lot of job growth," Loeb said.

While that growth is helping buoy hotel demand, many developers eschew lodging projects because of the high expenses associated with staffing a hotel in San Francisco. The city's hotelroom count grew just 0.3 percent in the first five months of the year, compared with a 3 percent increase in New York, according to data compiled by Robert W. Baird.


"If you want to build something in San Francisco today, the economics, such as labor costs and zoning, essentially favor other asset classes," Loeb said.

The technology industry that so far has helped San Francisco may also prove its weakness should there be a decline in coming years, said Patrick Scholes, an analyst at SunTrust Robinson Humphrey Inc. In the shorter term, the renovation of the Moscone Center convention space is likely to hurt lodging demand, said Pacioni of the Marriott Marquis. He expects 2017 to be the worst year.

"The city is working with groups to keep the impact as low as possible - that's why it's taking four years to get done - but it will definitely affect hotel demand," he said.

Geneva is the priciest city for five-star hotels, which are luxury properties with amenities such as spas, full-service health clubs and signature golf courses, according to Bloomberg data tracking 30 cities. Rooms at hotels in that category average \$622 a night in the Swiss city, up 1.3 percent from last year. Los Angeles ranks No. 2, with five-star stays soaring 21 percent to \$582.

For the cheapest stay in a fivestar hotel, look to Moscow and Manama, Bahrain. Luxury rooms in those cities average \$228 a night. **Bloomberg**

Ara Marlborough Single ESTATE SAUVIGNON BLANC 2012

Translucent lemon-yellow with pale metallic reflex, the invigorating nose offers lime, guava, leeks and cut grass. Supported by piercing acidity and slight petillance, the exuberant palate delivers grapefruit, gooseberry, nettle and lemon blossom. Medium-bodied at 13%, the herbaceous entry carries onto a vibrant midpalate, leading to minerally finish.



ARA MARLBOROUGH SELECT BLOCKS SAUVIGNON BLANC 2011

Shimmering lemon-yellow with bright citrine reflex, the refreshing nose presents physalis, pomelo, cut grass and wet stone. Braced by crispy acidity and slight petillance, the expressive palate furnishes calamansi, guava, scallion and crushed shells. Medium-bodied at 13.5%, the vegetal entry continues through a dynamic mid-palate, leading to a tangy finish.



Ara Marlborough Resolute Sauvignon Blanc 2011

Pastel lemon-yellow with light sunshine reflex, the bracing nose provides grapefruit peel, gooseberry, white peach and thyme. Buttressed by racy acidity, the revitalising palate supplies lemon peel, bell pepper, mangosteen and oyster shell. Medium-bodied at 13%, the pristine entry persists through a herbal mid-palate, leading to a cleansing finish.

The Kiwi Emblem

Situated in the northeastern corner of the South Island along the 41st parallel south, Marlborough is not only the cradle of New Zealand wine, but also home to some of the world's best Sauvignon Blanc. There are not many instances where the New World scores a resounding victory over the Old World in a certain style or variety, but Marlborough belongs to one of the exceptions.

Vines have been planted in Marlborough since 1870s, but production at commercially significant and viable scales only began in 1970s. By 1980s, Marlborough had established a name for itself and New Zealand in general, thanks to its sprightly and herbaceous Sauvignon Blanc. Rapid expansion ensued in the 1980s, resulting in a dilution of quality, but was later on countered by vine pull schemes sanctioned by the government. Owing blissfully to its geographical location, Marlborough is shielded from tropical influence from the west and Antarctic influence from the east. Marlborough is divided into 3 sub-regions and, at the risk of generalization: with fertile alluvial soil, Wairau Valley to the north tends to produce approachable and fruit-driven wines; with dried and poorer soil, the Southern Valleys in the middle tends to produce weightier and more structured wines; with volcanic soil in a cool climate, the Awatere Valley to the south tends to produce fleshy and rich wines. Marlborough generally enjoys low rainfall, abundant sunshine hours and substantial diurnal variation, allowing grapes to develop intense phenolics while retaining acidity. Producing more than half of all New Zealand wines, Marlbo-

rough is no doubt the country's engine room. Marlborough's signature style of Sauvignon Blanc used to be invariably vinified in stainless steel and released within 12 months of harvest, but ambitious winemakers have begun experimenting with using oak barrels for top-notch harvest. The region also produces Pinot Noir, Chardonnay, Riesling and Pinot Gris, as well as a small amount of sparkling wines.



Germanic

The people of Germanic descent (the Vikings, Germans, Danes, Dutch, Swedes, Norwegians, Icelanders and English) had a rich history of mythology with a large cast of gods, goddesses, heroes and giants.

Two families

According to Germanic myth, there were two god families. The Aesir were descended from giants and had warlike tendencies. The Aesir were ruled by Odin and lived in the land of Asgard. The Vanir were older gods who lived in Vanaheim. The two god races fought bitterly, but eventually a fragile peace was made, and the two families exchanged valued members to seal the pact.

Who's who

Aegir was the ruler of the sea, a giant and a member of the Vanir family.

Balder belonged to the Aesir family and was the son of Odin and Frigg. He was handsome, gentle, loving, good and the wisest of the Nordic gods.

Frey was the god of fertility and fair weather. He ruled over Alfheim, land of light elves. He was the son of Njord and the twin of Freya

Freya was the goddess of love and war. She cried golden tears and owned a feather coat that allowed her to fly between the worlds.

Frigg was the wife of Odin and the goddess of marriage. Friday is named after her.

Hel was the goddess of the underworld and was usually depicted as half white and half black. She was the daughter of Loki and the giant Angrboda.


Idun was the goddess of immortality. She was guardian of the apples that kept the gods eternally young.

Loki, the trickster, was the god of mischief and cunning.

Njord was the god of chariots, wind and sea, also known as the giving god.

Odin was the leader of the Aesir. He governed war, poetry, wisdom, healing and death. Legend says that he sacrificed his eye for wisdom.

Thor, the god of thunder, was the son of Odin and a fierce enemy of giants.

Slavic lore

People of Slavic descent (Russians, Serbs, Croats, Bulgarians, Czechs, Slovaks and Poles) did not have a large pantheon of mythical gods.

The world tree

The Slavs believed that a gigantic oak tree held the universe. At its crown was paradise, or Svarga, ruled by Svarog. The oak's trunk was the world of living creatures, or reality (Yav). Hell was found in the oak's roots and was ruled by Chernobog.

Characters

Belobog was the master of light. He personified goodness, happiness and luck. He brought sunshine, warmth and life.

Chernobog was the god of evil and darkness. He was known as the god of chaos, night and the dead.

Dazbog was the sun god who lived in the Palace of the East (a land of eternal summer and plenty). He began each day as an infant and died every evening as an old man.

Hors represented the old sun, becoming smaller as days shorten. He died on the winter solstice, defeated by Chernobog. On December 23, he was resurrected, becoming the new sun, Koleda. Hors was the god of healing and survival.

Kupala was the goddess of midsummer. The water mother, she was associated with trees, herbs, sorcery and flowers. Her celebration fell upon the summer solstice, a sacred day honoring the elements of fire and water.

Lada was the goddess of harmony, order and beauty. She was also known as the Lady of the Flowers and was usually depicted as a girl carrying flowers.

Mokosh was the goddess of fertility, home and earth. She governed feminine occupations and fate. She was said to have visited homes to perform domestic duties. Hair or fleece was left as an offering to her.

Perun was the most powerful of Slavic gods. He governed mountains, oak forests, war, lightning and fire. He was associated with weapons of stone and, later, weapons of metal.
