'TANGERINE' A VITAL PEEK INTO UNSEEN LA STREET LIVES

aitlyn Jenner and her glamorous Vanity Fair cover brought unprecedented visibility to transgender women. Laverne Cox, the first transgender actress to win an Emmy Award, fronted Time magazine, an image of grace and growing acceptance.

The transgender women at the heart of "Tangerine" come from the opposite end of the spectrum — the invisible and maligned. They're sex workers who troll the streets of Hollywood, turning tricks in parked cars. Their hangout is an all-night doughnut shop. They keep company with pimps, druggies and the overlooked.

Shot entirely with iPhones, writer-director Sean Baker's fifth feature is an urgent, intimate look at a day in the lives of two transgender prostitutes. It illuminates Los Angeles' fringe-living, often unseen characters: the hookers and dope fiends, the late-night cab drivers. They're so colorfully realized, in fact, that you may not really want to spend a whole day with them. "Tangerine" shows their lives ruled by desperation with few bright spots.

It's Christmas Eve morning, and fast-talking, frenetic Sin-Dee (Kitana Kiki Rodriguez) is fresh out of a monthlong stint in jail. She and best friend Alexandra (Mya Taylor) are so broke, they're splitting a doughnut. As they catch up, Alexandra tells Sin-Dee her pimp/drug-dealer

boyfriend was unfaithful while she was away. Sin-Dee becomes instantly determined to find the woman who did her wrong.

She leads a reluctant Alexandra on a mission through the streets of Hollywood and West Hollywood, into Laundromats, strip-mall restaurants and seedy-looking hotels, accompanied by a cacophonous soundtrack that abruptly jumps from classical music to dubstep. When Sin-Dee finds her mark working in a hotel-room brothel, she drags the crack-addled, shoe-less Dinah (Mickey O'Hagan) out by her hair.

The actresses play their roles so convincingly, and the iPhone footage looks so immediate, at ti-

mes it almost feels like watching a depressing documentary.

Meanwhile, Hollywood taxi driver Razmik (Karren Karagulian) is having a typical day. One of his passengers is a woman whose dog just died. Another drunkenly barfs all over the cab's backseat. Razmik takes the edge off by patronizing the prostitutes who work the same streets he does. At the end of his workday, he returns to the apartment he shares with his wife and baby girl. On this night, his Armenian-speaking in-laws are their holiday guests. As the day progresses, the characters' lives intersect, culminating in a confrontation at Donut Time.

Baker knew he wanted to ex-

plore life at the corner of LA's Santa Monica Boulevard and Highland Avenue, a hotbed of drugs and prostitution, but he found his stars before he found his story. Real-life friends Taylor and Rodriguez have great chemistry together and are naturals in their respective roles (though Rodriguez talks so fast, some of her lines are unintelligible). The women's stories about their neighborhood ultimately informed the script.

It's a testament to the story, performances, direction and camerawork that "Tangerine" feels so present and realistic, but that's also what makes it so upsetting. It's not just the violence or the drugs, it's the

hopelessness. Sin-Dee, Alexandra, Dinah and Razmik are all doing the best they can in a world where they have limited options, and it's hard to see how things get better for them.

"Tangerine" premiered at the Sundance Film Festival earlier this year, and transgender issues have seized the spotlight since then. Maybe a film like this will help make the less-glamorous members of this community more visible, too.

"Tangerine," a Magnolia release, is rated R by the Motion Picture Association of America for "strong and disturbing sexual content, graphic nudity, language throughout, and drug use." Running time: 87 minutes.

'THE ASSASSINS' HAS FAST PACE, MANY TWISTS


ayle Lynds proves she's a master of the modern cold-war spy thriller with her latest novel, "The

The duplicity begins as six master assassins rob a Baghdad museum to recover money owed to them by Saddam Hussein. Judd Ryder has given up the spy game, but that changes when he arrives at his home one evening to see a man who looks like him leave his residence and get hit by a car. Who was the intended target? Ryder or the stranger?

Ryder's retirement is over.

The six assassins each hold a piece of a priceless limestone tablet, and they begin to turn on each other. Ryder and CIA trainee Eva Blake become targets because they were the last ones to see the elusive killer known as the Carnivore, and he has several pieces the others are seeking. It's believed they know the Carnivore's hiding place. Personal feelings have to be pushed aside, and enemies will be forced to work together if they are going to find answers and survive.

Lynds keeps readers guessing, and the end result feels like several novels bound together in one terrific package. The fast pace and twists are in abundance, but the sheer comple-



xity of the narrative forces readers to think while enjoying the ride. Treachery, double-crosses and a treasure straight from history add up to a thrilling novel.

JOY WILLIAMS GOES SOLO AND BARES SOUL

Nearly 20 minutes into "Venus," an acoustic guitar emerges from the computer clamor that fills most of the album. The refreshing sound of an actual musical instrument nudges Joy Williams into the set's best song, the soul-baring ballad "What a Good Woman Does."

"I can't carry the weight of

this war," she sings. Williams' acrimonious split with Civil Wars partner John Paul White is at the core of "Venus," her first solo album since the breakup. She also sings about the death of her father and a rocky patch in her marriage, addressing the wrenching topics with commendable candor and appealing eloquence.

But when Williams parted with White, she also said goodbye to strummy folk music. Rebooting as a solo act, the 32-year-old chose to create songs geared for dance clubs instead of coffee houses, with lots of robotic whooshing, whirring, clonks and thuds. It's as if she was chasing the

Katy Perry demographic, and the artifice of the arrangemen-

ts dilutes the blood on the tracks left by the lyrics. Part of the problem may be too many fingerprints on the project one song has five co-writers, Williams among them.

It's a testament to Williams'

vocal skills that she sounds so good singing this music, vulnerable but valorous and sensuous. That makes the best of "Venus" more powerful than any synthetic kick drum.

hanel's guests were led to their seats in a giant recreated casino this week inside Paris' Grand Palais — replete with roulette tables and fully-functioning gambling machines that had one Chinese fashionista addicted within minutes.

But the real gasps came when Kristen Stewart and a diamond-encrusted Julianne Moore walked out through an arch — both wearing bespoke Chanel couture — to take a seat around a celebrity-filled poker table in the center of the catwalk. There they hugged, chatted, gambled and laughed all through the show.

Moore and Stewart grew close as they co-starred in "Still Alice," playing mother and daughter. They both dined together in an exclusive Paris restaurant last weekend.

"I like people when they're gambling and well dressed like in Monte Carlo," said Lagerfeld.

Fellow gamblers placing bets included singers Rita Ora and Vanessa Paradis and model Lara Stone, who were there to showcase Chanel's latest jewelry collection.

CHANEL'S 3-D COUTURE

Lagerfeld, 81, says the secret to feeling young is always looking to the future.

Nothing demonstrated this better than Chanel's bright, high-tech couture show that featured Coco Chanel's famed skirt-suit jacket made via 3-D printing.

"I like the idea of taking the most iconic jacket of the 20th century and turning that into an object that was impossible to make when that jacket was invented," explained the couturier.

The quilted jackets were completely seamless and seamstress-less — created by feeding Lagerfeld's sketches into a computer program, that the couturier eccentrically named "Sweetie."

"Computers are going to enter more and more in the evolution and techniques of fashion — you cannot resist. On the contrary, if it exists in its time couture will live on," he said.





CHANEL'S '80s SHOULDERS

A 1980s flavor lingered in the air for fall-winter in a largely black-andwhite show, with oversized truncated jackets, large square shoulders, epaulettes and dramatic lapels.

The shoes were a standout — backless stilettos with a split tongue on the front that Lagerfeld compared to "airplanes children make with folded paper."

The 67-piece-stong collection mainly played it safe, but designs loosened up toward the end, frothily, with tailoring that harked to the fizz fizz years of the '20s. Feathered fringing adorned loose, long cocktail dresses, evoking the famed "Flapper" era.

Meanwhile, modernized '20s "bob" wigs — worn in identical form by all models — also mirrored this era, giving the collection a homogenous, fem-bot feel that riffed on the futuristic 3-D printing concept.

ARMANI AND STARS ATTEND SHOWS BUT NOT DINNER

Co-stars from 2009's "The International," Naomi Watts and Clive Owen caught up with each other at the Armani Prive Show, sitting side by side.

Nearby, was French Oscar-winning actress Juliette Binoche — who con-

fessed that she didn't know designer Giorgio Armani all that well, as he doesn't attend dinners he invites her to

"Each time we meet there's a tenderness and respect ... We've never had dinner, really. He leaves everyone to have dinner and goes home; probably thinks about the next season," she said, laughing.

ARMANI IS ELEGANT BUT DOESN'T TAKE RISKS

It was, as ever, an elegant affair at Armani Prive, with the 80-year-old couturier serving up his expected array of satin gowns, jacquard skirts, feathered fringing, and long evening dresses embroidered with lashings of Swarovski crystals and sequins.

The color palette of the 47-look-s how beautifully evoked the last moments of the evening, as it has in previous seasons; with fuchsia pink, turning ultra-marine blue, purple and black.

Peak shoulders on jackets and backless dresses were the season's focus, alongside Siamese-looking fitted jackets. They cut a distinct style alongside short black wigs on models, though have done without the overly-billowing, segmented sa-

tin pants.

Though Armani is, with reason, one of the most respected designers in the world, in his couture he could afford to push the creative envelope more and be more adventurous.

BOUCHRA JARRAR MAKES CONTRASTS

Bouchra Jarrar mixed her signature contrasting styles with a dash of the '50s in her slick show.

Bandeau-style croptops evoked onehalf of a post-War bikini — worn over high-waisted retro pants or softly colored voluminous culottes that could have been worn by Marilyn Monroe.

As ever with the Moroccan-born designer, contradictions were whispered in the textures and styles. Feminine pale blues, yellows and nude pink were punctuated with flashes of black.

And several looks mixed up sportswear, daywear and eveningwear with panache. One couture textured taupe croptop had an exposed midriff, a sporty miniskirt and glamorous ankle-length sheer organ-

Jarrar showed off her couture talent with a series of multi-color, frothy, fur-feather asymmetrical tops — and

again, in her signature draping with a beautiful pale blue gown with a gold band.

YACINE AOUADI

Debut designer Yacine Aouadi channeled black in his couture presentation, saying it's the color associated with mystery.

"For my first collection, I wanted to evoke superstition, so I used black, as I'm still afraid if my (fashion) house is going to take off or not," he said humbly from the show venue in the Grand Palais.

The 13-piece-strong show would seem to set the French-born designer, who cut his teeth at Balmain, in a good place.


Aouadi mixed Victorian styles such as high austere collars and intricate black lacework with sporty cropped skirts and zippers, and sheer organza sections with decorative writing that, when worn on skin, resembles tattoos.

"I wanted to mix in the tattoo elements, to break up the historic allusions," he said.

He struck a fine balance, mixing sometimes ecclesiastical styles and myriad chevrons with clean, gentle A-line shapes into highly wearable looks

NIRA VALLEY HARMONY RESERVE Sauvignon Blanc 2009

Grown in Maharashtra, the organic grapes were manually harvested. Light citrine with pastel chartreuse reflex, the nose is clean and refreshing, offering pomelo peel and guava for fruits, infused with mint and cut grass. Buttressed by vibrant acidity and palpable minerality, the palate is pure and vegetal, delivering pomelo and bell pepper for fruits, supplemented by nettle and crushed seashell. Medium-bodied at 12.5%, the tropical entry continues through an exotic mid-palate, leading to a spicy finish.



NIRA VALLEY HARMONY RESERVE CABERNET SAUVIGNON 2009

Grown in Maharashtra, the organic grapes were manually harvested. Rich garnet with carnelian-Venetian red rim, the nose is complex and fruity, effusing bilberry and damson for fruits, enriched with tomato leaf, spice box and tobacco. Braced by joyous acidity and generous tannins, the palate is fleshy and herbaceous, providing cassis and prune for fruits, imbued with blackcurrant leaf, cigar box and graphite. Medium-bodied at 12.5%, the tangy entry persists through an expressive mid-palate, leading to a spiced



NIRA VALLEY HARMONY RESERVE SHIRAZ 2009

Grown in Maharashtra, the organic grapes were manually harvested. Bright garnet with rosso corsa-scarlet rim, the nose is redolent and scented. emanating plum and dried cranberry for fruits, augmented by bay leaf, potpourri and smoked bacon. Supported by vivacious acidity and copious tannins, the palate is energetic and fragrant, supplying strawberry and dried cherry for fruits, complemented by rooibos tea, garrique and game. Medium-bodied at 12.5%, the herbal entry transforms into a smoky midpalate, leading to a lingering finish.

The Sindhu Revival II

Lying between 6th parallel north (on a par with Central Africa) and 37th parallel north (on a par with Sicily), mainland India has a particularly tropical climate marked by intense heat, high humidity (the Indian subcontinent is sandwiched between the Arabian Sea and the Indian Ocean) and the mighty monsoon season, with incessant rain for months. In oenological terms, this could result in sunburn, fungal diseases and over-ripeness. The fertility of India is as such that it gave birth to one of the four ancient civilisations, as well as up to two crops per year.

Indian vintners have to employ an arsenal of measures to ensure the quality of grapes. To begin with, irrigation is often necessary, and so is frequent pruning. Vines are often trained up on bamboos and wires in a pergola to increase aeration and canopy cover against the unforgiving sun; higher up off the ground, grapes are also less likely to catch fungal disease.

Where latitude does not provide favourable conditions, altitude can be a mitigating factor. For cooler climate and better protection against wind, vineyards are often planted high on the hillside in the states of Karnataka and Maharashtra, ranging from 200m to 1,000m above sea level. Located towards the southwest of the country, Karnataka and Maharashtra, along with the likes of Andhra Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Punjab, Jammu and Kashmir, are the main wine-producing states of India.

Unsurprisingly, as many other up and coming wine-producing countries, India grows a wide array of French varieties such as Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay, Chenin Blanc, Clairette, Merlot, Pinot Blanc, Pinot Noir, Sauvignon Blanc, Shiraz and Ugni Blanc, producing still, sparkling, dry and sweet wines alike. What is surprising, however, is that 90% of all grapes produced are sold and consumed as table grapes; merely 10% are used to made wine. At present, India's annual per capita consumption of wine is merely 9ml. With a burgeoning middle class and an increasingly Westernised younger generation, there is much market potential to be explored.



TUESDAY (JUL 14) Exhibition At the Risk of Color – Claude Viallat and Franck

Claude Viallat was one of the founders of the Supports/Surfaces Movement in France, which since the 1960s has been questioning the traditional structure of paintings by drawing repeated patterns on surfaces without stretchers or frames. His works supersede the limitations of canvas, frame and wall; by painting on all kinds of surfaces, from tents to lose fabrics suspended from ceilings, Viallat creates a new spatial dimension for viewers.

Franck Chalendard expresses his artistic creation principally through paintings. He is good at using repetitive shapes and patterns to create abstract figures, thus exploring new meanings. In his recent works, he paints color blocks on fabrics with glossy printed patterns, using the emotive power of colors as a pathos-free style to present full chromatic delights.



China

Through the centuries, China accepted and adapted many religious ideas. Confucianism, Taoism and Buddhism have been influential in the ancient legends of the land.

Eight immortals

Eight immortals played a vital role in Taoist myth. These superhumans were not gods, but humans who gained eternal life by achieving enlightenment. These immortals were rather like our modern-day superheros. They had great powers, such as the abilities to fly or perform magic. There are many stories about their adventures as they went about their daily business of conquering evil.


Yin and Yang

Most cultures have creation myths that explain how the world came into being. One Taoist myth from China explains that in the beginning there was nothing but blackness and chaos. Out of this blackness, two cosmic forces, yin and yang, created an egg, the universe. Yin represents the earth, or female forces of life, while yang represents the sky or male forces. For 18,000 years, a giant cosmic baby grew inside the egg. When the time was right, the giant Pangu was born. Pangu kept the sky from falling on the Earth for another 18,000 years. When Pangu died, his breath became the wind and clouds, and his voice became thunder and lightning. His left eye became the sun, and his right eye became the moon. His blood became rivers, and his flesh became the soil and trees. Finally, the tiny fleas that had lived on him became many races of people.

Dragons and demons

Fukurokuju was the god of long life and wisdom. He was usually portrayed as a little old man with a long head.

Hotei promised contentment.

Jurojin was the god of long life and happy old age.

Daikoku was the god of wealth and agriculture.

Ebisu was a deaf fisherman and the god of work.
