GERE, QUIET AND MOVING IN PORTRAIT OF A HOMELESS MAN

Spare change? Any spare change?" The man holding the cup in the street looks, from a distance, like just some guy in a wool cap, formless parka and rumpled pants.

Only this is Richard Gere, and if you looked a little closer, you'd recognize those silver-haired good looks and that chiseled face. And those people on the streets in "Time Out of Mind" are actual New Yorkers who often walked by the movie star, oblivious, as director Oren Moverman was shooting, proving - if it needed to be proven — that we don't really look at homeless people among us, even if we're handing them a few quarters.

But Gere's character, George, also clearly has no desire to be looked at. He seems to wish he could be invisible. And in this almost documentary-style portrait of a homeless man — clearly a labor of love for Gere, who's also a producer here — the actor succeeds in moving us deeply, precisely because he doesn't call attention to himself in an "actory" way. And yet, the cumulative effect is heartbreaking.

Although its plot is sparse, one of the things "Time Out of Mind" does best is to convey the sense of stunned befuddlement George feels at his predicament. WE may know that he's a homeless man, but it takes George nearly threequarters of the movie to actually say, "I'm homeless," and even then, it's more an incredulous question than a statement. It's also one of the clearest things George ever says. The man is living in a permanent haze of confusion.

George wasn't always this way. Slowly, we learn he was once employed, a husband, and a father. But tragedy struck, and eventually he lost his job, his home, his family (he's estranged from his one daughter). When we meet him, he's trying to catch some shuteye in the bathtub of a friend. (The desperate effort to get a few hours of good sleep — when one doesn't own a bed — is one of the film's most depressing motifs.)

We have no idea how long he's been there. But the friend has been evicted, and George must leave. "You don't live here, all right?" snarls the surly building superintendent (Steve Buscemi, one of several big names, including Kyra Sedgwick, in small cameos). George takes his small red suitcase (soon, he won't have

even this) and looks for a place to sleep, to sit, to just BE. He tries the subway. He tries the emergency room waiting area, but can't stay there because it's not under 32 degrees

outside. He tries to seduce the nurse — "I'm really clean" is his grim pickup line — just so he'll have a warm bed.

We watch as George slowly tries to navigate his way through the city's social services. Some of these scenes take patience: from George, and from us. There are constant questions: Where's your birth certificate? What was your last residence? Usually, he just stares into space or shakes his head.

The brightest spark, if you can call it that, comes from the talkative companion George finds at a homeless shelter — Dixon (a wonderful Ben Vereen), who says he's a former jazz musician and regales George with stories. Dixon entertains us, but he sometimes infuriates George, who's simply desperate for some quiet.

That search for quiet is another unexpectedly devastating element of the film. Moverman and Gere surround George with conversations — extra loud — that ordinary people are having around him: on the subway, on the phone, in Grand Central Station. These conversations seem to bore themselves into George's brain, reminding him that he has no more connections in life.

As he himself says at one point: "I don't know anybody anymore." Gere, whose acting skills have inexplicably been underrated for years, says this line quietly, almost mumbling. But it has enough force that he could be shouting it off the rooftops.

"Time Out of Mind," an IFC Films release, is not rated. Running time: 120 minutes.


BOOK IT

'IN THE DARK PLACES' HAS SOLID, MULTILAYERED PLOT

Peter Robinson's intelligent series about Detective Chief Inspector Alan Banks deftly explores contemporary issues that by their nature often take place in the urban areas of Yorkshire, England, with the occasional trip to London. But in his 22nd outing, Banks and his team of first-class detectives take to the Yorkshire countryside to investigate crimes that target farms.

In addition to its solid, multilayered plot, "In the Dark Places" also works as an adroit look at isolation. Farms located miles apart can allow crime to grow undetected and breed a kind of disconnect that comes from living so far from the nearest neighbor. Alan and each member of his team are acutely feeling the emotional emptiness of having few close relationships.

The Homicide and Major Crimes team isn't happy about investigating the theft of a local farmer's tractor. But the new police com-

missioner wants rural crimes investigated because they involve expensive farm equipment and specialty livestock. John Beddoes' neighbors consider him "a hobby farmer" with his upscale vehicles,

a rapeseed crop that supplies a high-end oil maker and free-range pigs and chickens sold to local quality restaurants.


The missing tractor becomes linked to a possible murder when blood is found in an abandoned World War II airport hangar that may be used as a transfer site for stolen equipment. The investigations lead to the disappearance of two young men, one the son of a local farmer, and uncover a gruesome discovery at the crash site and small, illegal slaughterhouses. The novel's brisk plot is complemented by Robinson's strong characters who continue to intrigue. Alan and Detective Inspector Annie Cabbot both ponder their loneliness, wondering why they so often let friends and lovers drift away. Yorkshire's isolated landscape and the distance between farms add to the detectives' ennui. Only Detective Sergeant Winsome Jackman, long a fan favorite of Robinson's series, seems to be in a good place with a growing attraction to a former veteran who shares her interests.

Robinson continues the high standards he has always brought to his series with "In the Dark Places."

COOPER-LED HOLLYWOOD VAMPIRES RAISE THE DEAD - AND THE ROOF

A lice Cooper has made a career out of keeping the creepiness front and center in hard rock. His latest project Hollywood Vampires — a true supergroup including Aerosmith guitarist Joe Perry and actor-guitarist Johnny Depp — is an outgrowth of his most recent "Raise the Dead" tour, which featured Cooper covering classic rock songs from bands who had a member die from drug or alcohol abuse. Offerings include covers of The Doors (Jim Morrison), The Who (Keith Moon), Led Zeppelin (John Bonham) and T-Rex (Marc Bolan).

Cameos from classic rock legends abound here, as well, including contributions from Paul Mc-Cartney, Joe Walsh, Zak Starkey, AC/DC's Brian

Johnson, Perry Farrell, Robby Krieger and Dave Grohl. Most (but not all) the tracks are from artists who saw members die from substance abuse. Among the strongest on "Hollywood Vampires" are a pounding cover of The Who's "My Generation," a Krieger-powered Doors medley of "Five to One/Break on Through," and a version of T-Rex's "Jeepster" that manages to be heavy and pop-y all at once.

Cooper's nasal sneer is perfect on Three Dog Night's "One," and Perry's slashing guitar powers the still-iconic "Cold Turkey," John Lennon's ode to drug withdrawal. The band title refers to a '70s drinking club Cooper was part of that also included Lennon, Moon, Harry Nilsson, Bernie Taupin and Micky Dolenz of the Monkees.

Bon Jovi to rock Cotai next weekend

ll geared up for his first ever Macau gig, lead sin-⊾ger and style icon Jon Bon Jovi will be appearing live and in the flesh next weekend at the Venetian as part of the group's first ever Macau performances. As one of the most wellknown American rock groups with a four decade arsenal of hits spanning the 1980s to present, Bon Jovi's announcement of their local debut as part of a series of concerts across Asia has already managed to generate significant buzz; yet not for the reason they'd hoped. Controversy over the shelving of the group's mainland tour dates has managed to garner another kind of buzz - that of Chinese whispers as to the reason why.

After last week's abrupt announcement of the sudden axing of their Shanghai and Beijing gigs, online speculation has been rife.

The likely culprit? Tibet and the Dalai Lama. According to the Financial Times (who first broke the story) the shows were called off because the band once included a picture of the Tibetan Buddhist leader in a video backdrop during a concert in Taiwan in 2010. And to cement further speculation on the Party's hypersensitive reasoning, the cancellations came on the same day as the leadership held showy celebrations in Lhasa to mark 50 years of its establishment as an ethnic autonomous region.

And so from one autonomous region to a special administrative one, Macau now remains the only China location on the tour map.

Indeed the gigs were to have

been the group's first ever mainland ones and had been enthusiastically promoted by band members. Evidence of this could be seen last month when Jon sang popular love song 'The Moon Represents My Heart' in Mandarin for Chinese Valentine's Day as a "special gift to Chinese fans" before the dates. Yet Bon Jovi are not the only ones to have had shows cancelled by the overzealous censors at the Ministry of Culture. In July Maroon 5 had their Shanghai performances allegedly axed over a happy birthday message one of the band members posted on Twitter to the exiled religious leader.

So from being banned, now let's talk about the band.

Of course a bit of innocuous

controversy never did any rock star any harm, especially one as famous as Jon. Tellingly, whether young or old, most people on earth can sing along to at least a couple of Bon Jovi hits. According to the man himself, who spoke to the Times via an exclusive email interview, "Livin' On A Prayer" is indeed the group's most popular in terms of the sheer numbers who recognize it; yet it's also special because it holds a special place in the hearts of the band themselves. "Many people look back at their career and look for the tipping point", Jon explained. "For us it was 'Livin on a Prayer'. That changed our career and brought us to the next level".

Having been in the music business for over 30 years, Jon Bon

Jovi (born John Francis Bongiovi, Jr.), pianist/keyboard player David Bryan, and drummer Tico Torres now safely belong to that select club of performers who herald iconic American rock star status. Thus far, Bon Jovi have released 12 studio albums, plus two compilations and two live albums, with another one just released. One of the bestselling bands of all time, they've sold more than 130 million records worldwide and performed more than 2,900 concerts in over 55 countries for more than 37 million fans. "First and foremost we see ourselves as singer songwriters, always honing our craft", writes Jon. "That said, it's a lot of hard work but to be following my passion for all of these years and to have it be a career is an incredible way to make a living".

Bon Jovi's musical style has generally been characterized as 'pop metal', rock and 'glam rock', but Jon is averse to labels, preferring instead to let the songs speak for themselves. "Our music is uplifting and empowering. Most people enjoy music for the sake of music; we do not see the need to categorize it", he stated.

Yet as well as the music, part of Bon Jovi's appeal is also the fashion. The current '80s and '90s revival in terms of style and music certainly hasn't done them any harm, and they're just as popular with millenials as with their own generation. "Music is timeless and a hit song will always be good, it transcends generations", Jon acknowledged, adding, "Though I wish I held on to all my ripped jeans!"

With a huge catalog of worldwide hits including 'You Give Love A Bad Name', 'Who Says You Can't Go Home' and 'It's My Life' to name a few, it would be easy for the band to rest on their laurels. But they're still working as hard as ever, having just debited their newest single in July with an album released last month. "This will be Bon Jovi's first album since 'What About Now'. It's our latest, it's not our next", says Jon. "This is sort of the end of a cycle, not the beginning of a new one. But some of the songs are ten vears old".

So while they may have seen and done it all in their glamorous 32-year-careers, visiting Macau will be a first for the trio. When on tour, they always try to get a feel for the distinctive characteristics of each place they visit. "We love to sightsee and try the local food", writes Jon. For their Macau stay at the Venetian, he hopes for "maybe a golf game in the morning and then go experience what the nightlife is like. We really like to see what unique activities there are in each city".

For a unique city, it promises to be a unique concert indeed.

A blend of 80% Garganega and the remaining 20% made up of Chardonnay, Trebbiano di Soave and Pinot Bianco. Luminous citrine with pastel golden reflex, the refined nose offers bergamot, Japanese pear, fresh herbs, white clover honey and seashell. Supported by crispy acidity and pulsating minerality, the poised palate delivers lemon peel, pomelo, honeydew melon, bouquet garni and rock salt. Medium-light bodied at 12%, the pristine entry continues through a tangy mid-palate, leading to a composed finish.



Santa Sofia Amarone della Valpolicella Classico 2008

A blend of 70% Corvina, 25% Rondinella and 5% Molinara. Dark garnet with deep cardinal-carnelian rim, the haunting nose radiates cranberry, red cherry, mint, pot pourri, tobacco, truffle and geranium.

Anchored by spirited acidity and velvety tannins, the spellbinding palate oozes raspberry, redcurrant, spice box, cocoa, wild mushroom, leather and lavender. Full-bodied at 15%, the endearing entry persists through an exuberant mid-palate, leading to an indelible finish.



Santa Sofia Ripasso Valpolicella Superiore 2011

A blend of 70% Corvina, 25% Rondinella and 5% Molinara. Rich garnet with bright cardinal-carmine rim, the perfumed nose effuses bilberry, damson, spice box, coffee and toasted oak. Braced by animated acidity and delicious tannins, the sensual palate emanates dried cherry, prune, allspice, gunpowder tea and rosewood. Mediumfull bodied at 13.5%, the bold entry carries onto a vibrant mid-palate, leading to an alluring finish.



SANTA SOFIA RECIOTO DI SOAVE 2008

A blend of 80% Garganega and the remaining 20% made up of Chardonnay, Trebbiano di Soave and Pinot Bianco. Rich golden with light amber reflex, the charming nose presents apricot, loquat, sweet ginger, vanilla and almond. Buttress by generous acidity, the attractive palate supplies peach, nectarine, crystallised mandarin, assorted nuts and manuka honey. Medium-sweet and full-bodied at 13%, the intense entry transforms into a mellow mid-palate, leading to a hedonist finish.

The Most Serene

Arguably the most glamorous of Italy's 20 administrative regions, Veneto is surely one of the most important in terms of fine wines. Whilst Piemonte is rightly proud of its Moscato, Barolo and Barbaresco, and Toscana revered for its Brunello di Montalcino, Chianti and Vin Santo, Veneto is firing on all cylinders – its formidable portfolio comprises Prosecco, Soave, Valpolicella, Amarone, Ripasso and Recioto. Situated in the northwestern tip of Italy, Veneto is at the crossroad of Germanic, Latin and Slavic cultures, sandwiched between the Alps and the Mediterranean. On the top of its diversity, be it cultural or oenological, Veneto is known for its devilish ingenuity – who would thought that the most powerful Italian red wine would hail from the north? Indeed, the region has been renowned for its wines since the Roman Republic era, during which both Gaius Plinius Secundus (Pliny the Elder) and Publius Vergilius Maro (Virgil) referred to Recitum – from which modern Recioto got its name – produced therein.

Subsequent to the fall of the Western Roman Empire, Veneto continued to thrive under the Eastern Roman Empire, i.e. the Byzantine Empire. Directly breaking away therefrom in 697, the Most Serene Republic of Venice ("serene" refers to sovereignty) is arguably the only state in Europe which has never been ruled by what the ancient Romans considered barbarians.

With its strategic location in the trade routes, the Republic of Venice became immensely wealthy during the Middle Ages and early modern period thanks to its quasi-monopoly in silk and spice trading. Of the 5 maritime republics (the other 4 being Amalfi, Genoa, Pisa and Ragusa), the Most Serene Republic of Venice was generally the most powerful, and it took someone as iconic as Napoleon I to put an end to this regional power. Yet Veneto's legacy remained, evidenced by its many UNESCO World Heritage Sites, as well as the gallant baroque music and opera composed by one of its most famous sons, Il Prete Rosso ("the Red Priest") Antonio Lucio Vivaldi.

Santa Sofia has been producing some of the finest wines in Veneto since 1811. It is renowned not only for its Palladian palace, very rare as it is, but also for its classic (re-) interpretation of Amarone. If Veneto has never been barbarised, neither has Santa Sofia ever been Americanised. Bravo, maestro!



TODAY (SEP 18) Atonal - Multimedia Art by Gigi Lee

Atonal is an abstract, multimedia work immersing visitors in an experience of sound and light. The piece is inspired by the concept of Atonality. Atonal music largely refers to compositions that do not conform to the system of tonal hierachies that characterized classical European music, breaking the Western music rule of 24 major and minor keys. Lacking a tonal center, or key, it creates an out of focus listening mode, thus comparable to abstract painting, defying traditional aesthetics. The abstract painting of Vassily Kandinsky is closely related to atonal music.

This work tries to present an updated form of abstract art. Using the elements of sound and light—which could be as intangible as time—the artist furthers his exploration of time, an abstract theme he has been focusing on, by exploring concepts such as 'virtual', 'linear' and 'unlimited'. The work can be seen as an abstract, interactive artwork.






