



Retrenched Lisboa Palace workers reemployed

The Macau Federation of Trade Unions (FAOM) informed that all workers involved in the recent Lisboa Palace controversy returned to work yesterday, having signed contracts with the main contractor of Lisboa Palace. According to a statement issued by lawmaker and vice president of FOAM, Lei Cheng I, the result followed a meeting on Tuesday with the owner of the Lisboa Palace, the project's main contractor, FAOM, and the Labor Affairs Bureau (DSAL). The total of 86 Macau resident workers have all been reemployed.

Growth in prices continues to slow

The composite Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose by 1.65 percent year-on-year to 108.1 in August, according to new data released from the Statistics and Census Service (DSEC), marking a further decrease of 0.43 percentage points from the 2.08 percent year-on-year growth in the July. Composite CPI reflects the impact of price changes on the general households. DSEC accredits the increment to dearer rentals for parking spaces, higher charges for eating out, as well as increases in property management fees and automobile prices.

Bus accident victims and relatives meet with agency

Following a request by some of the tourists injured in the Rua da Entena accident, the Macao Government Tourist Office (MGTO) and the Tourism Crisis Management Office (GGCT) coordinated a meeting between six affected tourists, their families and the travel agency yesterday. During the meeting, the victims' families made their requests. Currently, four courists remain hospitalized and four family members remain in Macau to accompany them. 36 affected tourists have already left the MSAR. Additionally, four other family members of victims travelled to Macau and have had accommodation provided by the travel agency responsible for the bus that crashed at Rua da Entena.

OPENED to the public on September 13, The Parisian Macao registered its first crowds over the weekend. This coincided with the celebrations of the Mid-Autumn festival.

The high number of people flowing into the newest resort in the territory from last Friday to Sunday led The Parisian to create a temporary carpark facility at Hall E of the Venetian Macao Expo.

One of these will be the musical and dance show "Thriller Live," a revival show based on the work of the late pop star Michael Jackson that will be on the stage at the Parisian Theatre from September 30.

For now, Sands China is maintaining the strategy of encouraging local residents to visit their premises offering several discounts in a campaign named "Parisian Loves Locals". **RM**

Alzheimer's Service Center established at central hospital

A center for the evaluation and treatment of patients with Alzheimer's Disease is now open at the Conde de São Januário Central Hospital (CSJCH), providing one-stop medical services to Macau's Alzheimer's patients.

The center seeks to help people with signs of Alzheimer's who have been evaluated in any other health center in the city, or those who have been diagnosed with the neurological disease.

Aside from the medical treatment patients receive at the CSJCH, they will also be supported with home care. try and Neurosurgery, all from CSJCH," informed Lo, declaring that the new center did not have to apply for new medical professionals.

The center also "did not apply for some facilities, as many of them are already available at the CSJCH," said Lo.

Another function of the facility is to provide an emergency center when necessary. The center was subjected to a drill on Tuesday, when simulated patients from a marine accident needed to be forwarded to the hospital. "It takes ten minutes for the center to be transformed into an emergency one," Lo claimed.

Besides the center, a service network for Macau's Alzheimer's patients has also been established. Tam said that "Marc Wortmann, Executive Director of Alzheimer's Disease International sent a congratulations letter, praising the SAR's work, and showed himself available to assist Macau in promoting related works on an international level, including the introduction of Macau's Alzheimer's service network in the next World Alzheimer Report."

It is expected that patients will have to wait one month to be transferred to the center, a shorter waiting period compared to the current three months. Lo informed that Macau currently has approximately 4,000 Alzheimer's patients, with about 1,500 confirmed to carry this type of neurological disease.

Fittingly on World Alzheimer's Day yesterday, Alexis Tam, the Secretary for Social Affairs and Culture, inaugurated the center. guration, the Secretary visited the Centro de Cuidados Especiais. Tam noted there that the city is enhancing the welfare of the old. Tam acknowledged that Macau's average age is increasing, a fact which is being addressed because of the attention both he and the IAS have drawn to the issue.

Tam also informed that a new center for Alzheimer patients will be established at the Centro de Saúde da Areia Preta. **JZ**

Indian tourists check in at The Venetian

OCAL authorities expressed the hope that the number of Indian tourists visiting the peninsula will significantly increase this year. However, some Indian visitors have been disappointed with how they are being received in the region.

A note received by lawmaker José Pereira Coutinho from the Indian community in the region stated that there has been an increase in the number of "extra immigration measures" specifically for Indian nationals.

The complaint made to the lawmaker noted that such nationals are required to stand in a separate line and asked to show that they bring with them at least MOP5,000 in cash and have return flight tickets. The local immigration services reportedly demand that they show a printed copy of these return tickets.

"They still demand a hard copy or else they will not let you enter Macau. Should this continue further, Macau might just lose another tourist market," the complaint noted.

Immigration Bureau to confirm the allegations, however a spokesperson from the public department explained that such measures are part of the bureau's working guidelines for "a number of touhave service formalities," the spokesperson said.

The Times interviewed several Indian tourists. Some of them said they entered the region with no hassle, but other visitors confirmed that they faced hurdles. Experiences of having to wait for a long time or being asked to procure the documents mentioned above appear to happen more often to tourists who travel alone.

Preeti Trehan said they did not encounter difficulties when entering Macau and were not interrogated by immigration purposes. "There was no trouble at all. It [the process] was very fast," she assured.

Nonetheless, a self-employed tourist who is visiting Macau for the second time claimed that the immigration bureau is only stopping Indian nationals and some from Afghanistan. "You can call it as treating against race, you can call [it as] racism. It's very humiliating. But if the Chinese go there [to India], we treat them well. Chinese tourists are treated well in India," said a man who did not want to be identified. Another Indian who claimed to be on a business trip explained that they were asked to enter a room for investigation purposes and had their passports, return tickets and hotel vouchers photo-

Coutinho believes that the way Indian tourists are being treated when entering Macau is creating a negative image regarding the region's reception of such tourists. According to him, the region is paying closer attention to the Indian tourist market, and as such,

HE New Macau Association (ANM) thinks that the Office for Personal Data Protection (GPDP) is targeting their organization in order to intimidate and frighten them. They have stated that they believe this is aimed at preventing them, or any similar organization from undertaking any 'public referendum.' ANM is making the claim following the latest development regarding the case involving the association and the GPDP.

"We speculate that the Macau Personal Data Office [GPDP] wants to create a precedent of punishing the organizers of the civil referendum in order to deter other people from hosting similar events," Jason Chao, vice president of ANM said at a press conference held yesterday by the organizing committee for the 2014 Civil Referendum.

"We believe that they [government authorities] fear a possible rising trend of this kind of vote [referendums] in Macau," he added.

On the topic, Chao also added that government action is intended to prevent what it considers to be undesirable conclusions. His comment references the collection of data (namely Macau ID cards numbers) that is collected with the purpose of ensuring that the voters/referendum participants are official Macau citizens and participating in their own name. In his opinion the "modus operandi" of the GDPD will contribute to a "further deterioration of human rights in Macau" in a way that will prevent the civic participation and expression of public opinion.

The president of the ANM, Scott Chiang, added: "They [authorities] cannot prevent public vote or a civil referendum from happening at all, but they can greatly reduce the credibility of it by denving access to a very technical way of identifying the voters."

Chao affirmed that according to their legal rights, the orga-

accusation of illegal data collection that carries a fine that can be as high as MOP40,000 with a minimum of MOP4,000. In the instance that the GDPD decides to enforce that fine, the organizing committee has indicated that it is prepared to contest it in court, Chao noted.

He added that the reply of the organizing committee is based on legal opinions collected by the group. The reply has been constructed with the participation of a legal advisor and independent researcher Kai Yeung Wong. It seeks justification on the legislation of Personal Data Protection, namely such laws which exist in the European Union which Chao says is the base of the Macau legislation on the matter and is often cited by the GDPD, including in the last letter from the government department.

Although the letter received by Chao reports only to the civil referendum of 2014, the activists think that the fact that the media outlet Macau Concealers, linked to the ANM, which recently undertook an online vote for the unofficial nicknames of Macau's Panda cubs, might have influenced the decision of the GDPD to present this new case.

something to do with the Panda [cubs' names] vote but that's my speculation," he said recalling that the letter from GDPD came shortly after the launch of the online referendum, although he reaffirmed that until the present there have been "no complaints [from any department] regarding the Panda [cubs' names] vote." According to him, the organizing members of the referendum have been targeted three times over the 2014 actions that compiled public opinion on whether the CE should be elected by universal suffrage in 2019 in addition to other questions on the topic of political reform within the region. The previous two cases have not resulted in any formal accusation from either the Public Prosecutions Office or the GDPD, although according to Chao, they may yet be raised within the next three years.

Despite restrictions they claim to have faced, Chao does not exclude the possibility of repeating such an act. He reaffirmed: "this depends on the political needs. If there is a topic that we think should be put to a vote, of course we will host a new round of the civil referendum."

GAMING Wynn shares drop on back of Nomura speculation

WYNN Resorts, which opened its Resorts, second property in the territory last month, saw its shares drop after market analyst Nomura speculated that mass-market gaming volumes at the Wynn Palace are not as strong as expected.

"Wynn has indicated that its business levels at Wynn Macau have not been affected by the [August 22] opening of Wynn Palace," Nomura analyst Harry Curtis said in a statement. "While positive for Wynn Macau, indications are that mass volumes at Palace are lighter than expected." Wynn Resorts has declined to directly comment on the matter, saying only that the company will provide "actual numbers at the appropriate time."

Despite the opening of Sands China's The Parisian last week, Nomura analysts are saying that gross gaming revenues (GGR) are down 14 percent this week compared to the previous week, suggesting that Curtis. The Parisian may have

Decreasing revenues in local industrial sector

THE total revenues of the indus-trial sector in Macau decreased by 1.7 percent year-on-year to MOP10.5 billion in 2015, according to the industrial survey launched this week by the Statistics and Census Service (DSEC).

As the decline in costs outpaced the decrease in revenues, gross surplus grew by 20.9 percent to MOP2.59 billion. Gross value added, which measures the sectorial contribution to the economy, amounted to MOP4.53 billion, up by 9.1 percent.

A total of 898 establishments were operating in industrial production, a vear-on-vear increase of 35 establishments, all of which were manufacturing companies with less than 30 persons engaged. The total number of people engaged decreased by 420 to 11,888.

Total receipts of the manufacturing sector (MOP7.13 billion) decreased by 5.9 percent year-on-year and intermediate consumption (MOP4.97 billion) dropped by 12.1 percent.

According to DSEC, the number of companies in the manufacturing sector increased by 35 year-on-year to 892 in 2015. Establishments involved in the manufacture of food products and beverages rose by 32, publishing and printing establishments went up by 24, and establishments in the manufacture of textiles and apparel, among others, decreased by a total of 19. The total number of people engaged dropped by 407 to 10,804.

Analyzed by industry, total receipts of manufacture of Cement & Concrete (MOP2.03 billion) decreased by 8.3 percent amid lower demand for locally produced cement and related products in construction. Total receipts of manufacture of Food Products & Beverages (MOP1.73 billion) declined by 3.9 percent after rising for six consecutive years.

Receipts of the manufacture of wearing apparel decreased by 15.6 percent year-on-year to MOP525 million.

"Everybody – no matter where they come from – loves the rabbit lantern. In this way it truly symbolizes the intercultural relationship of people in Macau," he added.

This year, the event is part of the celebration of the Mid-Autumn Festival associated with the "Macau Lantern Festival 2016", an initiative organized by One Central and the Macau Government Tourist Office, and co-organized by Albergue SCM.

The exhibition is open to the public every day until November 20, in the afternoons and early evenings.

Ng Lap Seng more vigorous while in the US

WILLIAM Kuan Vai Lam, member of the board of directors of the Sun Kian Ip Group, said that Ng Lap Seng's vigor "is even better than when he was in Macau."

The comments, cited by Jornal San Wa Ou, came during Kuan's time spent earlier this week in Hengqin, where he paid a visit to an opening ceremony for a SKY program.

In Kuan's words, Ng is "waiting for the court to open in January, [...] having some blood pressure problems. There are no other health problems. [He] is even more energetic because he doesn't have to bear much mental pressure, and he is taking a good rest."

Ng Kei Nin, son of Ng Lap Seng, while attending the commencement of one of his company's new projects, refused to answer journalists' questions twice; once regarding his father's status in the US and also regarding whether their Hengqin project will be affected by Ng Lap Seng's case.

The opening ceremony of an integrated commercial project by SKY and China Resources Land Limited was not attended by expected guests Zheng Renhao, mayor of Zhuhai, or the Hengqin New Area Administrative Committee's director-general Niu Jing. Despite their absence, Ng Kei Nin assured attendees

that the Hengqin project is progressing according to the schedule.

Ng Lap Seng was arrested in the U.S. on September 19 last year and was released last October after paying half of his USD50 million bail.

In July of this year, a new charge was leveled against the Macau billionaire. In addition to the bribes allegedly handed to the recently deceased former president of the UN's General Assembly, John Ashe, Ng is now being charged with providing benefits to one or more officials from the UN's Development Program to garner their support for the construction of a conference centre in Macau.



VW investors seek USD9.2b in Germany in diesel scandal

OLKSWAGEN AG investors filed lawsuits seeking a total of 8.2 billion euros (USD9.2 billion) for losses stemming from the company's emissions-cheating scandal.

About 1,400 lawsuits are currently pending at the Braunschweig Regional Court, the district handling legal matters for the region where Volkswagen is based, the tribunal said yesterday. Investors are alleging they suffered damages because the company was slow in disclosing the issue. Volkswagen has rejected the allegations.

Investors have lined up to sue in Germany, where VW shares lost more than a third of their value in the first two trading days after the Sept. 18 disclosure of the emissions scandal by U.S. regulators. Monday was the first business day after the anniversary of the scandal and investors had



feared they needed to sue within a year of the company's admission that it had equipped about 11 million diesel vehicles with software to cheat on pollution tests.

The amount is slightly less than the 10.7 billion euros that had been expected based on


lawyers statements last week, but more suits could still trickle in because of uncertainty about when the deadline expires. The court may need about four weeks to register all the complaints, according to the release.

The U.S. government, whi-

ch uncovered the cheating, is also among the investors suing and seeking 30 million euros.

Volkswagen, based in Wolfsburg, has repeatedly said that it had informed markets in a timely manner based on the information available. Bloomberg

EU unveils new plan to scrap mobile roaming charges

THE European Commis-L sion has unveiled new plans to end mobile phone roaming charges next year after coming under fire from providers and consumer groups over its previous scheme.

The plan announced yesterday would be based on where phone users live or the EU country where they have "stable links."

Unlike the previous scheme to cap roaming free use at 90 days per year, the new plan would set no limits on time or the volume of data used.

Providers fear people might buy cheap services or SIM cards in another European country, and then use them at home.

Under the plan, providers could take action if customers do far more roaming than domestic use.

The plan must now be examined by operators to see if it would actually work. AP

But the share of revenue generated in Asia has been growing fast, doubling to about 20 percent of the total last year from about 10 percent in 2011.

Julius Baer is the fifth-largest private bank in Asia in terms of assets under manage-

ment, according to a 2015 ranking by Asian Private Banker. Its AUM in Asia stood at \$75.1 billion, the publication said. It's the third largest in Switzerland after UBS Group AG and Credit Suisse Group AG.

Like UBS and Credit Suisse, Julius Baer has been expanding in Asia, lured by the growing number of rich people. Private wealth in the Asia-Pacific region surpassed that of North America for the first time in 2015, according to a report by Cap Gemini SA.

"In general we are following where the market is going. And Asia is our second home," Collardi said in a separate Bloomberg Television interview yesterday with Haslinda Amin. He said the bank has been

Samsung suffers backlash in China over smartphone response

IU Jingtang was a Samsung loyalist. The Shanghai technology consultant traded up steadily through its smartphones to the new Note 7. But Liu's devotion was shaken by the Korean tech giant's confusing response to its latest product safety scare.

Liu, 32, said Samsung Electronics quickly confirmed his Note 7 wasn't covered by a recall announced last week. But he said after reports China might have suffered its first explosion of the problem-plagued phone, Samsung's announcement that it saw no problem with the battery with no other explanation left him baffled.

"My loyalty to Samsung is bound to decline by a lot," said Liu. "Samsung was my priority, but not anymore."

China should be a bright spot for Samsung as it wrestles with a global recall of 2.5 million of its new flagship smartphones. The company has not confirmed any in China suffer the same problems that led to fires in the United States. But its brand has been battered by complaints it is doing too little to reassure Chinese owners their handsets are safe.

The potential damage to its image threatens to disrupt Samsung's efforts to use the Note 7 to propel faster growth in a crowded Chinese market where it has slipped to sixth place after being the No. 1 brand as recently as mid-2014.

They also are sensitive about being treated as well as Western consumers.

"I think consumers are pretty unhappy with Samsung," said Ben Cavender of China Market Research Group. "Consumers start to feel like they are being taken advantage of, that they are not being accorded the same respect here as they are abroad."

Asked what it was doing to reassure Chinese consumers, Samsung said in a statement it is confident about the safety of Note 7s sold by authorized outlets.

IKEA suffered a similar backlash in June after the Swedish furniture recalled dressers in the United States and Canada due to concerns they could tip over and harm children. When the company didn't immediately do the same in China, people posted angry comments online asking whether it valued Chinese lives less. IKEA announced a recall in China in July.

Samsung has blamed the fires on a manufacturing flaw in batteries and said Note 7 units sold in China would not be affected because theirs came from a different supplier.

On Monday, Samsung said its investigation into the first report of a Galaxy Note 7 fire in China found unspecified "external factors" might be to blame. It said it was unable to investigate a second fire report because the consumer refused to hand over the charred phone.

Liu, the technology consultant, said the statement made him question why Note 7 phones sold in China would be different from those sold abroad.

"They hastily put out this statement. Was that really good? I think it was unsatisfactory," said Liu. As for external factors, he said, "does that mean the customer deliberately heated it over a fire? That doesn't make much sense."

Samsung surprised customers by saying no phones in China were covered by its global recall and then recalling 1,858 phones. It said those were distributed for testing before sales to the public began.

"For Samsung to recall only 1,858 units in China while it recalls 1 million in the United States seems insincere," said a comment left on a website of the Communist Party newspaper People's Daily.

"Whether those phones that are not recalled will wind up being a problem or not will be a bomb planted in the hearts of customers," it said.

Samsung is the world's biggest smartphone brand by number of units sold but in China it trails market leader Huawei Technology Ltd. and three other local brands - Vivo, Xiaomi and

Oppo. Apple Inc.'s iPhone was in fifth place in the first half of this year.

The Note 7 "was a good opportunity [to expand sales], but they blew it," said Liu.

Working in Samsung's favor is the fact that phones are sold through retailers in China instead of carriers. That allows users to switch brands quickly and new competitors to enter the market.

"In any given month, a brand is going to leapfrog another brand and come up with a brighter screen or bigger battery of faster charging," said Cavender.

On Tuesday, the Note 7 was on sale at electronics retailers and shops run by state-owned phone carrier China Mobile Ltd., though employees said customers were asking about the reports of explosions.

"Sales for Note 7 were slightly affected by the incident but we are still selling them," said a saleswoman who was reached by phone at an outlet of Suning, the country's biggest electronics retailer, in the Wangjing neighborhood on Bejiing's northeast side. "We are making explanations to customers every day, it is up to the customer to believe it or not."

The Note 7 was sold out in black and only available in gold at a China Mobile store in the capital's eastern business district, said a salesman who would give only his surname, Li. He said a customer bought one Tuesday and no one asked about the report of an explosion.

"There are some customers who only favor Samsung and they don't bother asking questions," said Li.

Longer term, the Note 7 in China is likely to "take a major sales hit," said Cavender.

"People who want to buy a phone are going to switch to Apple or to a local brand like Huawei," said Cavender. "Or if they want a Samsung, they probably are going to wait for the next generation, because they don't want to take the risk that they will get a faulty product." **AP**

Cambodia deports 63 Chinese, Taiwanese over alleged web scam

AMBODIA has de-→ported 50 Chinese and 13 Taiwanese citizens to China over an alleged internet scam, complying with demands from Beijing, a senior police official said yesterday.

The suspects were flown out of Cambodia on Tuesday, said Gen. Ouk Haiseila, chief of the Cambodian Interior Ministry's Immigration Investigation Bureau. He said the Chinese government sent a special plane from Beijing to take them back.

In June, Taiwan pro-

tested after Cambodia deported 25 Taiwanese internet scam suspects to rival China in the latest snub of the self-ruled island. Cambodia regards Taiwan to be part of China.

The latest group of 63 suspects was arrested late last month in a rented house in Phnom Penh, Cambodia's capital. They were accused of defrauding victims in China using phone calls made over the internet.

Since 2012, at least 982 Chinese and Taiwanese accused of taking part in internet scams have been arrested and deported back to China, according to Ouk Haiseila.

Taiwan's Although constitution formally decrees that it and the Chinese mainland are part of a single Chinese nation. Taiwan functions like an independent country and does not acknowledge Beijing's claim of authoritv over it.

Rights activists and Taiwanese authorities say such deportations reflect the great influence China exercises over Cambodia through aid and investment.

China is a key ally and economic partner of impoverished Cambodia. It has provided millions of dollars in aid and investment over the past decade, agreed to write off debts and granted it tarifffree status for hundreds of items.

Kenya and Malaysia have also deported Taiwanese internet scam suspects to China despite protests by Taiwanese officials. **AP**

Seoul questions 'serial offender' North Korea's UN membership

NORTH Korea's repeated flouting of U.N. Security Council resolutions by conducting nuclear and missile tests calls into question its suitability for membership of the world body, South Korea's top diplomat has told The Associated Press.

Foreign Minister Yun Byungse stopped short of calling for Pyongyang's expulsion from the U.N. but said its authoritarian government was violating the terms under which both the Koreas had been admitted 25 years ago. He said the North had "broken records" in its violation of global norms: It is the only nation to have conducted nuclear tests in the 21st century and is already subject to five Security Council resolutions over its weapons testing.

"I think all members of the U.N. have to ask themselves whether North Korea is really qualified as a member of the U.N.," Yun said in an interview late Tuesday said on the sidelines of the annual gathering of world leaders at its headquarters in New York.

Calling North Korea a "serial offender," he said the Security Council, the U.N.'s top decisionmaking body, needs to close loopholes in existing sanctions and impose tough new measures in response to the North's

fifth and most recent atomic test. He said that the "Hiroshima-sized explosion" Sept. 9 made clear that Pyongyang poses an "existential threat" to its U.S.-allied southern neighbor and a growing menace to the world.

"This latest test is a very sobering reminder [that] the danger and the threat from North Korea is now reaching a very, very dangerous stage. For many years we have been talking about the development of North Korea's nuclear weapons and missiles, and now we may be reaching a stage where we have to worry about the deployment of nuclear-tipped missiles," Yun said.

"If that day comes, that's not just a threat to South Koreans or to Japanese, it's a threat to the United States and almost all members of the international community," Yun said. He described the ongoing negotiations over a new Security Council resolution as a "last chance [...] to check this fanatic behavior" of young leader Kim Jong Un.

In a fresh sign of defiance, Kim oversaw a ground test of a new rocket engine and ordered a satellite launch preparation, North Korean state media said Tuesday, an indication the country might soon conduct a prohibited long-range rocket launch — possibly to coincide with the 71st founding anniver-

sary of the ruling Workers' Party which falls Oct. 10. Commercial satellite imagery confirmed activity consistent with preparations for such an engine test.

The United Nations and others view the North's space launch development project as a cover for tests of missile technology, as ballistic missiles and rockets in satellite launches share similar bodies, engines and other technology. The North has conducted more than 20 launches of various types of missile this year. Yun also voiced concern that the North was accelerating its accumulation of fissile material with a view to mass producing nuclear bombs.

North Korea has said it needs nuclear weapons and missiles to cope with U.S. military threats. About 28,500 U.S. troops are stationed in South Korea, a legacy of the 1950-53 Korean War which ended with an armistice, not a peace treaty. Yun dismissed repeated North Korean calls for the U.S. and South Korea to scrap annual military exercises, which it describes as a preparation for invasion. Some experts argue that could provide a diplomatic opening. Aid-for-disarmament talks have been stalled since 2008, and Washington says they can restart only if the North recommits to denuclearization. Yun said the North uses its argument over military exercises as an excuse as it pursues weapons development.

"We should not play their game," he said.

Yun welcomed a meeting earlier this week between President Barack Obama and Premier Li Keqiang of China — the North's main trading partner and traditional ally, in which both countries condemned the recent nuclear test and pledged closer coordination on addressing the nuclear threat from Pyongyang.

China is critical not only for enforcement of sanctions but agreeing to tougher measures, as it is a veto-wielding member of the Security Council.

The North was already slapped with the toughest U.N. sanctions in two decades following its fourth nuclear test in January. Yet Kim has doggedly pursued a dual strategy of seeking economic growth while developing nuclear weapons, with some apparent success. After the September test, North Korea's state news agency cited a foreign ministry spokesman as describing sanctions as "laughable." Yun said the case of Iran showed that sanctions take time to have an impact. He said the restrictions were starting to bite. He cited an increase in defections of members of the North Korean elite who were willing to risk imprisonment or execution to escape the country for South Korea as they see no future living in the North. AP

US flies bombers over South Korea again in show of force

THE United States yesterday flew a pair of supersonic bombers over ally South Korea for the second time in as many weeks in a show of force following North Korea's latest nuclear test earlier this month.

U.S. Forces Korea said one of the two



consider them as nuclear capable in their current configuration.

Military experts raise concerns that North Korea is moving closer toward obtaining the ability to put nuclear warheads on a variety of its ballistic missiles, a growing arsenal that one day may include a reliable weapon that could reach the U.S. mainland. North Korea conducted its fifth and most powerful nuclear test to date on Sept. 9, claiming it as a successful nuclear warhead detonation that proved its ability to mass produce "standardized" nuclear weapons that could be used on missiles. There is a possibility that North Korea will follow its latest nuclear test with a long-range rocket launch as it did after its fourth nuclear test in January. The North's state media earlier said leader Kim Jong Un observed a ground test of a new rocket engine and ordered a satellite launch preparation. Outsiders view North Korea's space launches as a cover for banned ballistic missile tests as the country openly pursues long-range nuclear weapons. AP

B-1B bombers landed at Osan Air Base, 120 kilometers from the border with North Korea, but did not say when it will return to Andersen Air Force Base in Guam.

Such flyovers are common when animosity rises on the Korean Peninsula, which is technically in a state of war because the 1950-53 Korean War ended with an armistice, not a peace treaty. The United States also flew two B-1B bombers over South Korea on Sept. 13.

"What we are showing today is just one tool we have to choose from a wide array of options. The alliance grows stronger every day and we remain prepared to defend and to preserve the security of the Korean Peninsula and the region," Lt. Gen. Thomas Bergeson, commander of the U.S. 7th Air Force in South Korea, said in a statement. North Korea uses such flyovers and the American military presence in the South in its propaganda as alleged proof of U.S. hostility, which it says is the reason it needs a nuclear weapons program. After last week's flyover, North Korea's official Korean Central News Agency described the B-1B as an "ill-famed nuclear war means" and accused the United States of resorting to "nuclear threat and blackmail" against the North.

The B-1B doesn't currently carry nuclear weapons under a disarmament treaty, and some U.S. experts do not

HMAD Khan Rahami vowed to martyr himself rather than be caught after setting off explosives in New York and New Jersey, and he'd hoped in a handwritten journal championing jihad that "the sounds of bombs will be heard in the streets," federal terrorism charges lodged against him yesterday alleged.

Criminal complaints in Manhattan and New Jersey federal courts provided chilling descriptions of what authorities say drove the Afghan-born U.S. citizen to set off explosives in New York and New Jersey, including a bomb that injured over two dozen people when it blew up on a busy Manhattan street.

Meanwhile, more details emerged about Rahami's past, including the disclosure that the FBI had looked into him in 2014 but came up with nothing.

According to the court complaints, Rahami's journal included a passage that accused the U.S. government of slaughtering Muslim holy warriors in Afghanistan, Iraq, Syria and elsewhere.

"Inshallah [God willing] the sounds of the bombs will be heard in the streets. Gun shots to your police. Death to your OPPRESSION," the journal ended.

One portion expressed concern at the prospect of being caught before being able to carry out a suicide attack and the desire to be a martyr, the complaints said. Still another section included a reference to "pipe bombs" and a "pressure cooker bomb" and declared: "In the streets they plan to run a mile," an apparent reference to one of the blast sites, a charity run in a New Jersey shore town.

There also were laudatory references to Osama bin Laden, Anwar al-Awlaki - the American-born Muslim cleric who was killed in a 2011 drone strike and whose preaching has inspired other acts of violence - and Nidal Hasan, the former Army officer who went on a deadly shooting rampage in 2009 at Fort Hood, Texas, the complaints said. Authorities said some of the journal was unintelligible because it was damaged in gunfire when Rahmani, 28, initiated a shootout that led to his capture Monday outside a bar in Linden, New Jersey. Initially charged with attempted murder of police officers, he was held on USD5.2 million bail. Rahmani remains hospitalized with gunshot wounds. It wasn't immediately clear whether he had a lawyer who could comment on the charges. The court complaints describe Rahami buying bomb-making equipment so openly between June and August that he ordered citric acid, ball bearings and electronic igniters on eBay and

had them delivered to a Perth Amboy, New Jersey, business where he worked until earlier this month.

That issue arose after the Orlando massacre in June, when FBI Director James Comey said agents a few years earlier had looked into the gunman, Omar Mateen, but did not find enough information to pursue charges or keep him under investigation.

Asked Tuesday about Rahami, White House spokesman Josh Earnest said President Barack Obama "is confident that the Department of Justice and the FBI will go back and review the interactions that this individual had with law enforcement to determine if there's something different that could have been done or should have been done to prevent the violence that we saw over the weekend."

As for whether Obama was concerned that the 2014 FBI inquiry had been closed after finding no terror ties, Earnest noted Rahami's rights as a U.S. citizen.

Rahami worked as an unarmed night guard for two months in 2011 at an AP administrative technology office in Cranbury, New Jersey. At the time, he was employed by Summit Security, a private contractor.

AP global security chief Danny Spriggs said he learned this week that Rahami worked there and often engaged colleagues in long political discussions, expressing sympathy for the Taliban and disdain for U.S. military action in Afghanistan. Rahami left that job in 2011 because he wanted to take a trip to Afghanistan, Spriggs said.

AP spokesman Paul Colford said the AP told law enforcement officials about Rahami's work at the Cranbury facility.

Summit's vice president of security services, Daniel Sepulveda, said Rahami last worked for the company in 2011. Sepulveda said he was unaware of any complaints about Rahami's conduct.

William Sweeney, the FBI's assistant director in New York, said on Monday that that at the time of the bombing, Rahami was apparently not on the FBI's radar. Nor were Afghan intelligence officials aware of either Rahami or his family, said Mohammad Masoom Stanekzai, director-general of the Afghan National Directorate of Security. The bombing investigation be-

gan when a pipe bomb blew up Saturday morning in Seaside Park, New Jersey, before a charity race to benefit Marines. No one was injured. Then a shrapnel-packed pressure-cooker bomb exploded Saturday night in New York's Chelsea section. wounding 31 people, none seriously. An unexploded pressure-cooker bomb was found blocks away - with Rahami's fingerprints on it and his face captured by a nearby surveillance camera, according to the court complaints. Late Sunday night, five explosive devices were discovered in a trash can at an Elizabeth train station. Fingerprints also matched the materials found there to Rahami, the complaints said. AP

UTHORITIES used tear gas to disperse protesters in an overnight demonstration that left about a dozen officers injured in North Carolina's largest city and shut down a highway after the fatal shooting of a black man by Charlotte police who said he was armed and posed a threat.

The protests broke out Tuesday night after 43-year-old Keith Lamont Scott was fatally shot by a black officer at an apartment complex on the city's northeast side. They continued into yesterday, when TV footage showed dozens of protesters on Interstate 85 apparently looting semi-trucks and setting their contents on fire on the highway.

Following the shooting and prior to the protest, an online post on Facebook by a woman claiming to be Scott's daughter angrily asserted that he was unarmed when police shot him. The Associated Press was not able to immediately verify the authenticity of the post.

Tuesday night, a larger group of demonstrators gathered near the scene of the shooting. The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department tweeted that demonstrators were destroying marked police vehicles and that approximately 12 officers had been injured, including one who was hit in the face with a rock. Photos and TV video showed police firing tear gas to break up the crowd. Some officers were in riot gear.

Later yesterday, the streets were quiet with no protesters in sight and I-85 was moving again. Broken glass and rocks littered the ground where a police car had been vandalized. Less than 5 miles away, wooden

pallets barricaded the entrance of a Wal-Mart that had apparently been looted.

The unrest in Charlotte came just hours after another demonstration in Tulsa, Oklahoma, over the shooting there of an unarmed black man by police.

Charlotte police officers went to the complex about 4 p.m. looking for a suspect with an outstanding warrant when they saw Scott – who was not the suspect they were looking for - inside a car, department spokesman Keith Trietley said in a statement.

Officers say they saw Scott get out of the car with a gun and then get back in, Trietley said. When officers approached, the man exited the car with the gun again. At that point, officers deemed the man a threat and at least one fired a weapon, he said.

Scott was taken to Carolinas Medical Center and pronounced dead.

Officer Brentley Vinson, who shot Scott, has been placed on administrative leave, which is standard procedure in such cases. Vinson has been with the department for two years. Detectives recovered a gun at the scene and were interviewing witnesses, Trietley said.

Police blocked access to the area, which is about a mile from the campus of UNC at Charlotte, as protesters gathered after the shooting.

Video from WCCB-TV in Charlotte showed police in riot gear stretched across a two-lane road confronting protesters at the apartment complex later in the night. Some of the officers flanked the main line on one side of the road.

Some protesters were heard yelling "Black lives matter," and "Hands up, don't shoot!" One person held up a sign saying 'Stop Killing Us."

Other footage showed protesters lingering around a police vehicle after shattering its windows.

One television news crew retreated from the scene after demonstrators began rocking their remote van, which was parked near the apartment complex where the shooting occurred.

Charlotte Mayor Jennifer Roberts appealed for calm and tweeted that "the community deserves answers."

In Tulsa, hundreds of people rallied outside police headquarters calling for the firing of police officer Betty Shelby, who shot 40-year-old Terence Crutcher on Friday during a confrontation in the middle of a road that was captured on police dashcam and helicopter video.

Shelby's attorney has said Crutcher was not following the officers' commands and that Shelby was concerned because he kept reaching for his pocket as if he were carrying a weapon. An attorney representing Crutcher's family says Crutcher committed no crime and gave officers no reason to shoot him. Local and federal investigations into that shooting are ongoing. AP

2001 SIMPSON SMUGGLED INTO AFGHANISTAN

The BBC's world affairs editor has become the only television reporter to broadcast from Taleban-held Afghanistan as the country prepares for an American attack.

John Simpson and a cameraman were smuggled into the Nangarhar Province, near the border with Pakistan, by heavily armed smugglers.

On the advice of their escorts, the two men donned burqas - the traditional full-length garment compulsory for all women living in Taleban-controlled Afghanistan.

The United States is targeting Osama Bin Laden and other al-Qaeda members present in Afghanistan after blaming them for the 11 September attacks.

Mr Simpson, who has reported from many of the world's trouble spots over the past 20 years, said the disguises worked "superbly", despite both of them being more than six feet tall.

"Merely putting on the burqa, I found, has an extraordinary effect - it seems to make you disappear," he said.

"Behind their burqa, women have become an invisible sex in Afghanistan."

The BBC duo spent several hours in Afghanistan before being taken back over the border into Pakistan.

Mr Simpson reported a heavy Taleban presence along large stretches of the frontier, but said there was still an "eerie emptiness" in the province they visited.

He said people appeared to have either fled their homes in anticipation of an American attack or were keeping their heads down.

The BBC correspondent also noted talk in Afghanistan of a "gradual defection" from the Taleban as their popularity declined.

"The militias and smaller contingents whch joined them back in 1996 when they were plainly winning [are beginning] to have second thoughts now," he said.

"People say they are starting to be corrupted by power."

The Taleban have controlled large areas of Afghanistan for the past five years. The mission of leader Mullah Mohammed Omah and his fighters was to make the country the world's purest Islamic state.

DANISH ELVIS FAN LOSES 'GRACELAND' TRADEMARK DISPUTE

A court in Denmark has ordered the owner of a museum modeled after Elvis Presley's Graceland Mansion to pay 500,000 kroner (USD75,000) in damages to a U.S. company that owns the Graceland trademark.

Memphis, Tennessee-based GL SPE LLC sued Henrik Knudsen for using the name Graceland for his museum in Randers, in northwestern Denmark.

The Maritime and Commercial High Court in Copenhagen on Wednesday ruled in favor of the U.S. company, and ordered Knudsen to pay damages for trademark infringement.

Knudsen has since changed the name of the museum to Memphis Mansion. Twice the size of the original Graceland, the museum includes Knudsen's private collection of Elvis artifacts, an American diner-style restaurant and a souvenir shop. IN CONTEXT

The US attack began on 7 October, with air strikes targeting the airports of Kandahar and Kabul, and terrorist training camps near Jalalabad.

The offensive was the first retaliatory response to the 11 September 2001 terror attacks in which nearly 3,000 people died. Within three months the Taleban were effectively ousted. Osama Bin Laden has so far eluded capture - though other members of al-Queada have been hunted down by coalition forces and the Pakistani military.

Nato's International Security Assistance Force began peacekeeping duties in 2002 and maintains a heavy presence in Afghanistan.

Infighting between local commanders over power and territory became a feature of the post-Taleban period. The authorities in Kabul have been able to exert little control beyond the capital and militant violence has continues.

In September 2006 there were 5,500 British troops deployed in the country as part of an international force. That figure rises to 5,800 in October 2006. Of those already in Afghanistan, 1,300 are in Kabul and 4,200 are in the southern province of Helmand.

John Simpson went on to report from northern Iraq when the US and Britain attacked the country in 2003.

In April 2003 he was injured in a "friendly fire" attack by a US Navy jet which killed his Iraqi translator.

PILL Kessel was quick to note he wasn't on the United States' roster for a disappointing World Cup of Hockey.

He wasn't the only one to point out problems with the team's construction.

In the moments after the Americans' 4-2 loss to Canada that eliminated them from contention, the questions cascaded: John Tortorella as coach? Too much grit? Not enough skill? What might change after another all-too-familiar early exit from an international tournament?

U.S. management doubled down on the sandpaper style that almost resulted in a gold medal at the 2010 Vancouver Olympics but hasn't worked since. Kessel, centers Tyler Johnson and Paul Stastny, wings Kyle Okposo and Bobby Rvan and defensemen Justin Faulk, Kevin Shattenkirk and Cam Fowler were among skilled players left off the World Cup roster, generating criticism months ago and even more with the U.S. bowing out after going 0-2.

"To come here and flop like we did is extremely disappointing," defenseman Ryan Suter said. "Obviously we have to examine ourselves and what more could we have done and how can we get better for future tournaments."

The American's two-and-out revealed they brought too much physicality to a skill game. Canada, Russia, Team North America and others have thrived with fast-paced, entertaining

Early World Cup exit may lead to big changes for USA Hockey

hockey. Speed has been king at this international tournament. With the aim of beating Cana-

da, U.S. general manager Dean Lombardi built a big team with an edge to neutralize the talent of the top hockey power in the world. Instead, the World Cup showed depth of talent is everything. Leaving more skilled players at home proved detrimental.

Kessel, a Conn Smythe candidate as playoff MVP when the Pittsburgh Penguins won the Stanley Cup this spring, took to Twitter after the U.S. loss to make light of being not selected.

"Just sitting around the house tonight [with] my dog," Kessel tweeted. "Felt like I should be doing something important, but couldn't put my finger on it."

Kessel was the Americans' leading scorer and best player at the 2014 Sochi Olympics, but he was left off the initial and then final World Cup rosters. Hand surgery after the playoffs may have put his availability in doubt, but USA Hockey's management team clearly overlooked him and others.

The U.S. opted for old-guard players like forward Brandon Dubinsky, defensemen Jack Johnson and Erik Johnson and grinder Justin Abdelkader. Tortorella, as old-school a coach as there is left, wanted to play his brand of hockey and stood by his roster construction and style. "It's disappointing, frustrating, all different types of emotions," Tortorella said. "I think we let some people down. It's on my watch. I certainly feel responsible for that."

Patrick Kane, who did not score a goal in two games after winning the Hart Trophy as the NHL MVP last season, wouldn't blame his coach for this failing.

"Tortorella is just one of the most passionate guys I've ever seen about hockey," Kane said. "I'll never say a bad thing about him. He's just a great coach. We didn't show up for him."

Lombardi and other executives will take heat for the World Cup debacle, though it might lead to philosophical changes about how to beat Canada and win elite tournaments. It will help at future events to have players like Auston Matthews, Johnny Gaudreau, Jack Eichel, Brandon Saad and Seth Jones, all of whom played on the 23-and-under Team North America and weren't eligible for the U.S. team.

"There is definitely a fantastic future coming here," Tortorella said. "There are some good young kids there that I think they'll bring some juice to the program." **AP**

Chelsea, Liverpool stay on course in English League Cup

WITH no European competitions clogging up their schedules, Chelsea and Liverpool are placing more importance on the English League Cup than usual this season.

They both advanced to

both rested key players but still fielded strong lineups in a bid to stay alive in one of three competitions they'll enter this season. World leaders kick off second day AT UN General Assembly

Forty-two world leaders kick off the second day of the 71st United Nations General Assembly.

Leaders representing China, Afghanistan, the EU, Pakistan, Japan and Ukraine are among those slated to deliver their annual addresses in New York yesterday.

On the opening day Tuesday, Syria and the refugee and migrant crisis were the focus of many U.N. speeches. In a statement yesterday, the International Day of Peace, U.N. Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon called on warring parties to lay down their arms and observe a 24-hour global ceasefire.

"The symbolism of a day without fighting is a crucial reminder that conflict can and must come to an end," the U.N. chief said.



Trump skips swingstate cities; opts for rural town instead

DonALD Trump is spending a lot of time in this critical presidential swing state, but he campaigned yesterday [Macau time] far from cities like Charlotte and Raleigh where many candidates have courted moderate voters in recent years.

Instead, he zeroed in on this tiny, rural town of about 850 people to make his pitch to the disaffected, working-class white voters who have propelled his campaign. The strategy appears to be less about swaying undecideds and more about making sure supporters don't stay home on Election Day. Registered Democrats outnumber registered Republicans 2-1 in Duplin County, but voters here have chosen the GOP presidential candidate in the past two elections by a wide margin. Among those lifelong Democrats is James Teachey, a 78-year-old retired farmer who said this year was the first time he donated to a presidential campaign: USD40 to Trump. "People are sick and tired of the way things are going in Washington and the way

people are running it," he said. "I was born coming out of the Depression. We know what a dollar means, what leaving your door unlocked means. And all tho-

se things are gone." Trump's business background is a big draw for his supporters here in Kenansville, where beyond the small downtown area's handful of restaurants, gas stations and a couple of grocery stores lie farms that are the area's major economic driver. Pork and poultry growers and processing plants employ thousands in Duplin County and have drawn Latino residents who now account for more than 20 percent of its population of 60,000. Still, Trump drew cheers with vows to get tough on immigration during his speech at the Duplin County Events Center on the outskirts of Kenansville. He also garnered applause by promising to bring manufacturing jobs back to the state. "They're making a fortune in Washington pushing trade deals that take jobs away from North Carolina and all these states. Those days are over. The jobs are coming back," he said. Earlier in the day, he addressed a crowd in High Point, a hub of the declining

furniture industry that was hit hard by the loss of manufacturing jobs but still hosts a world-renowned furniture trade show.

Not many high-profile candidates have come through Duplin County over the years. Asked if he could remember any other presidential campaign visits, Teachey laughed and said he thought Eleanor Roosevelt came decades ago.

While Kenansville may seem like an unusual stop, Trump's decision to veer away from population centers shows North Carolina is a state he has to win, said Thomas Famon, a political

the modern trend to leave Macao only during holidays, some admitted that there is a certain peer pressure to go somewhere with friends every long weekend.

But regardless of whether people are travelling to get away for work or in pursuit of something else, most people often report feeling even more tired than on normal work days once they have returned from their trip.
