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VIETNAM A powerful typhoon that rocked Vietnam has killed at least 44 people, left more than a dozen missing and caused extensive damage to the country's southcentral region ahead of a summit that will draw leaders from around the world.

Government forces have killed at least 11 remaining militants aligned with the Islamic State group over the weekend in southern Marawi city and are attempting to determine whether a Malaysian who may have taken over the militants' leadership is still alive, officials said.

Social workers new accreditation rules approved in spite of doubts

Anonymous complainant alerts police to illegal workers

PHONE reports from citizens directly to the police or via Facebook led to the finding of several law offenders and subsequently to arrests, the Public Security Police Force (PSP) spokesperson said yesterday afternoon during a press conference.

In two different and unrelated cases reported by the PSP, reports from concerned citizens helped the force to act and to find the suspects of unlawful activities. In one case, authorities acted following the upload of a picture to a personal Facebook account. In the first case, the PSP responded to a phone call from an unidentified source, who said that in a certain food and drinks establishment located at Rua de Hong Chau, in Taipa, there were people employed without legal authorization to work in the region.

After receiving the complaint on October 31, the PSP sent officers to the venue, where they found a man outside that was operating a food delivery motorcycle. When re-



quested to show his documents to the police, the man provided a non-resident worker permit (commonly known as a blue card) and a driving license from Hong Kong. The officers promptly noticed that the blue card had a different job stated from the one the man was in fact performing. According to the PSP, the blue card stated "Kitchen Assistant." Moreover, his driving license had not been registered with the police in the region so it was considered that he was riding the delivery motorcycle illegally.

Further investigation uncovered a second man, a cook from the mainland, who did not possess any work permit but a safe conduct to visit Macau (travel permit).

The police also detained the individual responsible for the establishment, a man of 50 years from mainland China, on the accusation of facilitating illegal work.

In the second case, the police said they were alerted to an exhibitionist following the upload of a photo from a Facebook user showing a man seated on a motorcycle and displaying his genitals. According to the Facebook user, the situation was allegedly occurring in the Areia Preta district.

The PSP went to investigate and at around 8.30 p.m. on November 5, the officers spotted a man riding a motorcycle on Rua da Pérola Oriental that resembled the one in the photo. The officers followed him and when he left a food establishment nearby and was preparing to ride the motorcycle again, they stopped and questioned him.

The man, a permanent resident of Macau, aged 47, admitted that he was the same person as in the photo but said he did not remember the incident as he was intoxicated. The police also found out that he did not possess a permit to ride the motorcycle and that, according to the suspect, the motorcycle was his brother-in-law's.

He was accused of exhibitionism.

Mother and son involved in casino scam

TWO local residents, a mother and her son, **L** were involved in a swindle scheme that defrauded a Cotai casino some HKD900,000, the Judiciary Police (PJ) informed at a press conference.

The case started with a report from the casino's security that informed the PJ that the son - a croupier and employee of the casino - had been illegally siphoning gaming chips to a woman that authorities later discovered was his mother.

According to the casino's security team, which had been following the case for a while, there were two ways the duo were unlawfully obtaining credits. The first involved the woman being given more chips by her croupier son than she was entitled to for each winning play. The second occurred during the exchange of chips, when he would credit her with the double the amount she had traded in.

The security team collected evidence of 51 such incidents and calculated a combined loss of HKD130,000.

Last week the PJ organized a special surveillance unit to monitor the table where the man was working. On November 6 they were finally nabbed.

Questioned by the PJ, the suspects admitted the crimes and revealed surprisingly that the swindle, having started in July this year, had earned the duo around HKD900,000, more than six times what the casino had calculated.

However, the art on display at the exhibition did not appear to comply with AFA's official regulations. According to the regulations, "the year of creating the artworks must be after 2015." However, a list of works circulated at the opening noted that some of the art on display - including one of the honorable mentions - dated back as early as 2012. The Times contacted AFA to enquire about this irregularity but did not receive a reply by press time.

Of the works showcased at the exhibition, the people's choice was "Until the End of Time", a provocative music box installation by Yves Etienne Sonolet.

Kiang Wu plans to offer assisted reproductive service

DSEJ to enhance China anthem education

Detailed measures should be included in Policy Address

 $\begin{array}{c} \textbf{S} \textbf{CHOLARS} \text{ from the} \\ \textbf{U} \textbf{niversity} \quad \textbf{of} \quad \textbf{Macau} \end{array}$ (UM) want the government to include typhoon prevention measures as well as concrete measures regarding participation in the Greater Bay Area plan included in the 2018 Policy Address.

At a symposium, which took place last week at UM, several participants who teach at UM voiced their opinions on the preview of the policy address for the fiscal year of 2018 in Macau.

Kwan Fung, Assistant Professor of the Department of Government and Administration Public in the Faculty of Social Sciences at UM, said that the local government must use the experience of Hato to reach a "conclusion regarding the [potential influence of a] typhoon over the development of Macau." In Kwan's opinion, the government needs to set out

a plan of action to prepare for future typhoons.

When commenting on the government's financial assistance payments to the victims of Typhoon Hato, particularly the payments to the SMEs, Kwan said that "they [SMEs] already lost their properties, [therefore] subsidies might not be of much help." Kwan then added that "regarding the typhoon, the government needs to assume the biggest responsibility because it did not perform well on warning and advising." Davis Fong, director of Institute for the Study of Commercial Gaming of UM, who is also a lawmaker, wants the government to reveal the number of jobs already completed within the first five-year plan, which was published last year.

"I hope that in this Policy Address the government can report how much it has done regarding the five-year plan. [...] Will it [the government] reach its goal during the remaining three years?" asked Fong. He would also like the Policy Address to include a detailed strategy plan for Macau's entrance into the Greater Bay Area plan.

"How can the [regional] Greater Bay Area plan coordinate with the Ilocal] five-year plan?" Fong questioned. He affirmed that he hopes the two plans will not lead Macau into competition with her sister cities.

Hao Yufan, dean of the Faculty of Social Sciences at UM, suggested that there is still a long way for Macau to go before it can be considered a world class tourism and leisure center.

"The typhoon shows that there is still a great distance between Macau and a world level tourism leisure center across all domains, such as infrastructure, warning systems, and handling of crisis," said Hao.

Hao also thinks that Macau lacks an accountability mechanism. He has hopes that, this time, the SAR government can establish one in its policy address.

"I hope this time [the government] can elucidate exactly how it will participate in the Greater Bay area plan, [...] [Macau] should study plans for accelerating the integration [into the Greater Bay Area] and for simultaneously reducing costs," Hao declared.

He explained that the government should figure out methods for Macau to assimilate with the regional development without compromising Macau's quality of life.

Several other professors also voiced their differing opinions regarding the Policy Address 2018. Calling for Macau to improve its cultural and scientific development was another popular suggestion.

Leong said that the current course framework in Macau already contains sections related to the anthem and that the majority of Macau's students know how to sing it. As emphasized by Leong, most schools have been organizing a flag raising ceremony as well as playing the anthem at appropriate events. The education authority will supplement teaching materials with information about the anthem and will also organize events to highlight the educational points included in the anthem.

Vincent Van Gogh film an instant hit in Macau

THE world's first fully-painted feature film is a hit in Macau, according to organizer Cinematheque Passion, with its two rounds of local screenings selling out just hours after tickets were made available.

In response to public interest in the film, Cinematheque Passion last week announced 16 additional screenings in late December, all of which sold out within hours. The second round of the screenings brings the total to 30, acording to organizers.

Exploring the last days of one of history's most illustrious and prolific painters, Loving Vincent brings Vincent Van Gogh's tragic end to the big screen through oil paintings in his instantly recognizable style.

Each of the film's 65,000-odd frames is an oil painting. created by a team of 125 professional artists from across Europe who traveled to the Loving Vincent studios in Poland and Greece to participate in this unique and unprecedented production.

The Times attended a media preview of the film on Wednesday night at the art house, along with representatives of the government's cultural institutes and several local artists.

Guests at Wednesday night's screening described the film as "innova-



tive" and "gorgeous", with one attendee commending filmmakers for their "courage and determination" in making the film.

"I think no matter [whether] you're a fan of Van Gogh or not, this movie is a must see," said Dirco Fong, an executive at the Macau Design Center.

Loving Vincent had its world premiere on June 13 the Annecy International Animated Film Festival 2017, where it won the Audience Award and, according to Cinematheque Passion, earned a standing ovation of more than 10 minutes.

The first round of public screenings began on saturday and will run until November 12. The second round begins on December 22 and ends on December 31. The film is in English with Chinese subtitles. **DB**

Structure of Social Workers' Professional Committee stirs doubts

bill establishing new Arules for the professional accreditation and registration of social workers was discussed and passed at the Legislative Assembly yesterday. The bill was passed despite the doubts of many lawmakers about the formation process for the "Social Worker Professional Committee" (CPAS). When established, the committee will be responsible for social workers' accreditation and ultimately, for registering these workers with the Social Welfare Bureau (IAS).

Chan Iek Lap was the first lawmaker to voice an opinion regarding CPAS, saying that "the sector [social workers] will worry about the problem of professional independence. [...] The sector is worried about having laymen manage the experts [the committee will be formed by five members proposed by the government]. [...] The regime also regulates the private sector, but does not regulate social workers within the scope of public departments. [...] Some members of the public asked during the public consultation period if it [the regime] could also include public department's social workers into this qualification?"

Chan believes the inclusion of medical professionals working in public departments into the civil

service regime is inappropriate.

Ng Kuok Cheong used Hong Kong as an example when questioning the government about whether it is considering selecting more than half of the committee's members based on the public's opinion.

"Hong Kong's social workers select representatives to participate in the committee, with more than half of the members of the committee being selected. This is a professional management, indeed a balanced responsible arrangement. It can improve their [the social workers' and the public's] confidence. [...] Is the government open to this course?"

Sulu Sou pointed out that the regime "must be about professionals since you mentioned the word 'professional' more than ten times. Do you think this draft fully expresses a professional independence? Social workers are a little bit disappointed with CPAS. They have strong opinions about it. The majority of them hope to select more than half of the members for CPAS. [...]."

The Secretary for Social Affairs and Culture, Alexis Tam, when replying to the lawmakers, denied claims that CPAS does not represent social workers as fairly as it should.

"The major purpose [of this regime] is to allow social workers to receive professional accreditation. [...] I think the regime has good intentions. It goes against some of the lawmakers' opinions. We pay importance to professional independence, and because of this we gave strong professional importance to them [the social workers]. Regarding CPAS, we are clear about the proportion [between the social workers' committee members and other members]," he said. Tam al so noted that the committee equivalent in Hong Kong has a lower representation of members who are social workers.

After listening to Alexis Tam's explanation, Au Kam Sam said that "CPAS must be the focus of this regime because CPAS holds the dominant rights [for the registration and accreditation regime]. You said that social workers are the majority [of CPAS], but you are deceiving yourself [by saying this]. The social workers sectors hope the members can be elected by the social workers."

Agnes Lam then questioned the government representatives about whether there could be a review period for this regime and requested the schedule for the announcement of the working morality instructions for social workers.

Other lawmakers, including Pang Chuan and Song Pek Kei, were also among those who voiced doubts regarding CPAS's formation.

Alexis Tam noted that the committee will have two teams, one responsible for the accreditation and registration, and one responsible for disciplinary cases.

ON THE LAWMAKERS' AGENDA

NATIONAL ANTHEM Mak Soi Kun suggested that the government should speed up the establishment of the China anthem laws and enhance the educational and propagandistic themes of the Chinese national anthem. "According to several residents, many associations play the anthem when organizing events. However, it is common to witness during these moments scenes where people are only concentrated on playing cellphones, cameras, or talking with other people and laughing. However, across many different countries and regions, playing the anthem is a very important thing, and even there, when friends are coming from all over the world they gather together, they act solemnly, respectfully and quietly to show their respect when listening to the anthem," said Mak.

MUTUAL DRIVING LICENSE

RECOGNITION Sulu Sou expressed his doubts concerning the recent government proposal for the mutual recognition of driving licenses between mainland China and Macau. Sou condemned both the directors of the Transport Bureau and the Macau Government Tourism Office for their comments on the proposal, saying that they showed no concern for the probable deterioration of the transportation situation in Macau once the proposal is enacted. "The residents, in general, are very worried about [the] mainland's driving culture and its transportation law enforcement attitude," said Sou, who also noted that some of the mainland's typical driving aspects include "frequently honking, using long range lighting, changing lanes randomly and speeding up before zebra crossings."

RENTAL LAW Vong Hin Fai suggested altering the city's new rental law, specifically, mentioning the legal consequences and punishment regarding non-notarized property rental contracts. The rental law, which was passed on August 10, will come into effect on February 17. The law dictates that non-notarized property rental contracts will be considered invalid. Vong did not agree with the current meaning of the law and suggested that more details should be added regarding the legal effect of a non-notarized property rental contract, "to avoid unnecessary misunderstandings when legal workers explain this article."

100 years of Macau history on display in Lisbon

A trip through 100 years in the story of Macau will be offered in the upcoming exhibition in the Portuguese "Museum of the Orient" (Museu do Oriente).

The 120 images are a part of the Museum's broader collection which covers the social and political history of the territory, which was under Portuguese administration for over 450 years.

The scenes of the exhibition move from buildings and neighborhoods that have either disappeared or undergone deep alterations, to some of the most highlighted local and national events. They pass through the daily experiences of the Macau communities observing their traditions and habits. The exhibition, showing all of these facets of Macau's recent history, will open at the Museum of the Orient on November 9.



Amongst the collection, which was arranged by journalist and former Times director Rogério Beltrão Coelho, are some of highlighted political figures who passed through the territory. They include Henrique Galvão and Gomes da Costa, and others from different fields such as film stars Orson Welles and Clark Gable. The exhibition also seeks to remember several moments such as the celebrations of the IV Centenary of the Discovery of the Sea Route to India (1898), the first airplane trips connecting Lisbon to Macau (1924 and 1931), as well as other less memorable but very important occasions, such as the explosion of Flora's Armory (1931) and the bombing of the civil aviation hangar by the Americans during the War of the Pacific (1945).

Macau had the advantage of being ahead of its time in terms of photography. Dating from 1844, are the first daguerreotypes of the amateur photographer Jules Itier, which are the oldest known images of the region. The photographic work produced since then by amateurs and professionals in Macau is scattered throughout the world in private collections as well as throughout the collections of museums and institutions.

Just a few of these photos will be shown in the exhibition at the Portuguese museum.



Qatar joins China aviation bonanza with surprise stake in Cathay

ATAR Airways Ltd.'s surprise purchase of a 9.6 percent stake in Cathay Pacific Airways Ltd. to gain a foothold in East Asia has damped a long-held speculation among investors that the Hong Kong flag carrier would soon merge with another major shareholder: Air China Ltd.

Qatar Air on Sunday agreed to buy the stake for HKD5.16 billion (USD662 million) from Hong Kong-based Kingboard Chemical Holdings Ltd. and related companies, which have been steadily amassing shares in the Asian airline for the past year. The purchase, the first by a Middle Eastern airline in an East Asian carrier, makes the Doha-based company the third-largest shareholder in Cathay after Hong Kong conglomerate Swire Pacific Ltd. with 45 percent, and state-owned Air China with almost 30 percent. Cathay's stock fell the



most in more than three months.

"Cathay will have three major shareholders, all with different and potentially conflicting interests," said Corrine Png, chief executive officer of Crucial Perspective, which focuses on research in Asia transportation equities. "We still think it makes more economic sense for Cathay and Air China to merge longer term, but given this new development with Qatar Airways in the picture, it is going to become more complicated for all three parties."

Behind the investment is the battle for better access to China, which is expected to become the world's biggest aviation market within a decade. U.S. carrier Delta Air Lines Inc. bought a minority stake in China Eastern Airlines Corp. in 2015, while American Airlines Group Inc. purchased a minority stake in China Southern Airlines Co. this year.

"Cathay Pacific is one of the strongest airlines in the world, respected throughout the industry and with massive potential future," Qatar Airways CEO Akbar Al Baker said. Cathay CEO Rupert Hogg said in a statement on Monday that he looks forward to a "continued constructive relationship" with Qatar Air, which is a fellow member of the Oneworld Alliance of airlines. Zhou Feng, board secretary at Air China, said having an airline as Cathay's stakeholder, rather than Kingboard Chemical, would "bring about better synergy" as an airline stakeholder has a better understanding of Cathay's strategy and business. Regarding the relationship between Qatar, Cathay and Air China, Zhou said there is both competition and cooperation and it will depend on how the carriers maintain the balance. Air China is part of the rival Star Alliance.

Cathay has previously denied that it is considering a merger with Air China. Swire said in an email that it is firmly committed to Cathay and it has confidence in its longterm prospects.

Qatar Air's Al Baker said the purchase "supports Qatar Airways' investment strategy." The Doha-based airline has been buying minority stakes in airlines around the world, including a 20 percent stake in British Airways parent IAG SA and a 10 percent share of Latam Airlines Group SA, the biggest South American carrier. It also made a failed attempt to gain a slice of American Airlines Group. **Bloomberg**

Venezuelan oil too big to fail, at least for China and Russia

VENEZUELA'S sudden demand to renegotiate its billions in debt could complicate life for its two biggest oil patrons, China and Russia.

President Nicolas Maduro caught bondholders off guard last week with a vow to wring debt relief from Venezuela's creditors, sending the country's bonds tumbling. But the move may also have been calculated to

to boost production there, prepaying for more than a billion barrels.

"Venezuela is too important for the likes of China and Russia to let it fail," said Thomas Onley, an analyst at consultant Facts Global Energy, in a phone interview Friday. "Things are getting tough, no question about that, but China and Russia are the backstop."

At a rally in Caracas, Maduro said his cash-strapped country would seek talks with creditors, ves, a sign, perhaps, of how wary Maduro might be of getting the oil company embroiled in a messy default. That he immediately followed that with a demand for relief is an indication he sees the situation as unsustainable.

In 2001, Venezuela was pumping more than 3 million barrels a day. Last month, national crude production fell to 1.95 million barrels a day and Venezuelan rig counts are at their lowest to China doubled while cargoes to Russia's state-owned oil company Rosneft PJSC more than tripled, according to U.S. Customs data and a shipping report compiled by Bloomberg. But income from those sales are limited because they're repayments for previous loans.

Turning to the risky process of renegotiation may be the price paid by Venezuela to preserve that lifeline, said Francisco Monaldi, a fellow in

An actual default at PD-VSA would create "significant downside risks to both oil production and exports," Luisa Palacios, senior managing director at Medlev Global Advisors, said in an email. She'll be watching to see whether the oil producer makes its bond coupon payments next week, she said. "We will know by Nov. 10." Bloomberg

With output tanking, PDVSA has been forced to buy more cargoes from abroad to blend with its own, tar-like low-quality oil. Meanwhile, many of its refineries have shut because of recurring breakdowns or a lack of domestic supplies to process.

Beijing is going after click farms and fake online sales

CHINA enacted sweeping changes to a business competition law to address fraud in the e-commerce industry, which is plagued by malfeasance ranging from fake positive reviews to merchants goosing sales numbers.

The National People's Congress adopted revisions this weekend to the Anti-Unfair Competition Law intended to address online retailers, the official Xinhua News Agency reported. The changes take effect Jan. 1 but were announced days before Alibaba Group Holding Ltd.'s Nov. 11 Singles' Day bargain extravaganza, which dwarfs Black Friday in the U.S. in terms of revenue.

The Chinese law initially took effect in 1993 as a way to protect consumers and businesses from unfair market practices. At that time, none of China's biggest online companies - including Alibaba, Tencent Holdings Ltd., Baidu Inc. and JD.com Inc. - even existed. As e-commerce developed and prospered, attendant problems grew with it.

These latest revisions stipulate that operators shouldn't deceive consumers by faking sales or employing "click farms" to rack up positive product reviews - increasingly common practices that have drawn the ire of buyers. And the rules encompass the entire breadth of internet commerce, from online goods and movie ticketing to food delivery.

"You now cannot delete bad comments or employ people to leave good comments," said Christine Yiu, an intellectual property law expert and partner at Shanghai-based Bird & Bird. "It's a welcome change that echoes with the whole direction that China's trying to move in, by strengthening old protections and discouraging infringement in the market."

 Online merchants that fake sales or feedback can be fined as much as 2 million yuan Another example of such fraud in China is e-commerce sites buying up movie tickets to artificially boost a film's box-office rankings and to drum up popularity, Yiu said.

The new legislation states that businesses should be self-policing when upholding market order. Among the punitive measures outlined, online merchants that fake sales or feedback can be fined as much as 2 million yuan (USD301,000) or lose their business license, the state-run China Daily newspaper reported yesterday.

"The revision will better address new problems emerging in the market and protect the rights and interests of both business operators and consumers," Yang Heqing, an official of the National People's Congress's Standing Committee, said Saturday, according to Xinhua.

The practice of "brushing" - faking sales transactions to boost rankings or draw more traffic to a website - has plagued Chinese online commerce for years. Much of the criticism focused on Alibaba, the market leader, which has a complicated history with brushing operators and has been trying to stamp out such practices.

The Hangzhou-based company sued Shatui.com last year for allegedly linking merchants with people willing to falsify purchases and reviews to help boost sellers' rankings. Along with the lawsuit, China's biggest technology company warned that merchants found to be violating its policies can have their credit scores cut or businesses shut down.

With a billion listings on Alibaba's Taobao website alone, standing out is critical for online sellers. The art of brushing comes down to tricking a site into believing a purchase has been made and then disguising the movement of money that makes it happen. The fake buyer is then paid by the brushing company.

Chinese companies aren't alone in battling fabricators. Amazon.com Inc. is trying to quash fraudulent reviews, and Facebook Inc. is combating "fake news." Yet China's operators take things to the next level by crowdsourcing the tasks to thousands of people.

"We tried to keep the interests of vendors and customers in mind while revising the law because we need to keep fair market order while encouraging innovation in the cyberspace," Yang Hongcan, director of the Anti-Monopoly and Anti-Unfair Competition Enforcement Bureau of the State Administration for Industry and Commerce, said, according to China Daily. **Bloomberg**

China adds two satellites to homemade global navigation system

CHINA has added two satellites to its homegrown global navigation and positioning network that seeks to reduce reliance on the U.S.-based Global Positioning System, state media reported yesterday.

The pair of Beidou-3 satellites were launched aboard a single Long March-3B rocket from the Xichang launch center in the southwestern province of Sichuan on Sunday night, broadcaster CCTV and the Xinhua News Agency reported.

China plans to complete a network linking more than 30 satellites providing real-time geospatial information worldwide by 2020.

The system started operating in mainland China in 2000 and then expanded to cover the Asia-Pacific region in 2012. The Beidou-3 satellites represent an upgrade with greater accuracy and an enhanced ability to communicate with other satellite navigation systems.

The network would eventually provide monitoring and safety information along the nation's multinational infrastructure megaproject, the Belt and Road Initiative, designed to link China with Central Asia, Europe, Africa and beyond.

On completion, Beidou, which means Big Dipper in Chinese, will join GPS, Russia's GLONASS and the European Union's Galileo as satellite navigation systems with global coverage. India, France and Japan are also developing regional systems. **AP**

RESIDENT Donald Trump visits South Korea today on the second leg of his first official Asian tour. While Trump will be looking to use his trip to strengthen Washington's alliance with Seoul and reaffirm their joint push to maximize pressure on North Korea over its nuclear program, he will also be faced with several thorny issues weighing on the relationship. Here's a look at some of them.

NORTH KOREA

Both Trump and South Korea's liberal President Moon Jae-in agree that it's time to ramp up sanctions and pressure on North Korea, which has ignored international condemnation as it moves forward with its nuclear and missile tests.

But Moon, a former human rights lawyer, still favors dialogue as a way to defuse the nuclear tension and vehemently opposes a potential military clash, which experts believe would cause enormous casualties in South Korea. This contrasts with Trump, who has threatened the North Korean threatened the North with "fire and fury" and exchanged warlike rhetoric with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un.

The world will be watching what kind of language Trump will use in his comments on North Korea. A hint at a military option or crude insults directed at Kim — like the term "Little Rocket Man" he previously used to deride the young North Korean dictator — is certain to enrage North Korea, which could react with weapons tests and threats of war.

Increasing animosity would be a burden for Moon.

TRADE

Renegotiating South Korea's bilateral free trade agreement with the U.S., dubbed KORUS, is likely be high on the agenda during the Trump-Moon summit. Trump has criticized the

deal as a source of the U.S. trade deficit with South Korea, an argument officials there dismiss.

Before Trump's presidency, many in South Korea and the United States regarded the deal as a key pillar of their alliance. But Trump has made scrapping trade deals a hallmark of his presidency. Earlier this year, reports that Trump was considering triggering a withdrawal from the deal caused uproar not just in South Korea but also in the United States.

The two countries eventually started talks this summer on renegotiating the deal, which went into effect five years ago. Many South Koreans are watching if Trump will make off-the-cuff remarks on the trade deal during news conferences or on Twitter.

US TROOPS

Trump wants South Korea to pay more for the U.S. military presence on its soil, which is chiefly aimed at deterring potential aggression from North Korea.

During election campaigning, Trump said South Korea and Japan must make more contributions for together hosting 80,000 U.S. troops or he might withdraw those soldiers. Security jitters subsequently flared among many in South Korea and Japan.

Since taking office in January, Trump hasn't publicly threatened to pull out the troops but he harkened back to an election campaign request for greater burden-sharing with South Korea during his first summit talks with Moon in late June.

South Korea currently pays

more than 900 billion won (USD800 million) annually and negotiations with the United States are to start in the coming months to try to determine a new amount for South Korea to contribute.

US MISSILE DEFENSE

South Korea's recent agreement with China to try to end disputes over an advanced U.S. missile defense system deployed in South Korea could be an issue.

While announcing the deal last week, Beijing, which views the Terminal High-Altitude Area Defense system as a security threat, said it noted that Seoul stated it won't do several things: deploying an additional THAAD battery, helping develop security cooperation with Japan and the U.S. into a trilateral military alliance and joining a global U.S. missile defense network. South Korea's foreign minister made similar remarks during a parliament committee meeting earlier last week.

Critics say the South Korean moves, dubbed by local media as its "Three No" policies, could undermine the operational capability of the allied South Korea-U.S. forces and Trump's push to bolter three-way cooperation with Seoul and Tokyo to put more pressure on Pyongyang.

Other issues at stake are South Korea's hope to regain the wartime operational control of its troops, currently placed at the hands of the chief of the 28,000 U.S. troops in the South, and Seoul's possible purchase of hightech U.S. weapons systems. **AP**

Writers urge US President to seek release of Nobel laureate's wife



HEAD of President ADonald Trump's visit to Beijing, literary luminaries such as Margaret Atwood and Philip Roth are calling on China to free the widow of Nobel Peace Prize winner Liu Xiaobo. A letter issued through the writer's organization PEN America asks that China remove restrictions on Liu Xia's freedom of movement and allow her to meet freely with whomever she wishes.

"Liu Xia has undergone great suffering for many years, simply for being the wife of a man that China has deemed to be a dissident," the letter said. "She should be free to meet freely with family, friends, and members of the international community, free to travel where she wishes, and free to be reunited with the outside world."

Others signing the letter include Chimamanda Adi-

chie, Louise Erdrich, Robert Pinsky and Stephen Sondheim.

In a news release last week, PEN America's executive director, Suzanne Nossel, said the writers hope Trump will "voice the United States' concern about the inhumane and unjustifiable detention of a poet who has been accused of no crime."

An accomplished poet and artist, Liu Xia has been under unofficial house arrest since Liu Xiaobo was awarded the 2010 prize while serving an 11year prison sentence for incitement to subvert government power resulting from his co-authoring a manifesto calling for political reform. Her whereabouts since his July 13 death of liver cancer are unclear.

DECLARING that North Korea was "a threat to the civilized world," President Donald Trump vowed yesterday in Japan that the United States "will not stand" for Pyongyang menacing America or its allies.

Trump, in one of the Asian capitals threatened by North Korea's missiles, did not rule out military action and exhorted dictator Kim Jong Un to cease weapons testing like the missiles he has fired over Japanese territory in recent weeks. The president also denounced efforts by the Obama administration to manage Pyongyang, declaring again that "the era of strategic patience was over."

"Some people say my rhetoric is very strong but look what has happened with very weak rhetoric in last 25 years," said Trump, who stood with Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe at a news conference and stated that North Korea imperiled "international peace and stability."

Abe, who has taken a more hawkish view on North Korea than some of his predecessors, agreed with Trump's assessment that "all options [are] on the table" when dealing with Kim Jong Un and announced new sanctions against several dozen North Korea individuals. The two men also put a face on the threat posed by the North, earlier standing with anguished families of Japanese citizens snatched by Pyongyang's agents, as Trump called their abductions "a tremendous disgrace."

US Commerce head Ross has stake in firm tied to Putin orbit

NEWLY leaked documents show that Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross, the Trump administration's point man on trade and manufacturing policy, has a stake in a company that does business with a gas added that Ross has withdrawn from matters related to transoceanic shipping vessels and has met the "highest ethical standards."

The details are likely to add to the questions about ties between Russia and the Trump administration, connections that for months have shadowed the White House and are a focus of an investigation by special counsel Robert Mueller. Yet it wasn't immediately clear how many partners Ross might have or what the profit-sharing agreement might be. ICIJ disclosed the Ross holding as part of reporting on 13.4 million records of offshore entities in tax havens leaked to German newspaper Süddeutsche Zeitung. The newspaper then shared the records with ICIJ and a network of more than 380 journalists in 67 countries. The New York Times is its U.S. partner in this inquiry. The Times reported on the Ross holding yesterday [Macau time].

It wasn't immediately clear exactly how much of Navigator, which is publicly traded on the New York Stock Exchange, Ross personally owns. ICIJ reported that Ross and other investors own four Cayman Island entities that in turn own 31.5 percent of Navigator, a stake worth which include other companies besides Navigator, at no more than \$10.1 million.

Sibur contributed 8 percent to Navigator's revenue last year, according to reports filed with securities regulators. Russia's energy sector is largely controlled by individuals with ties to The ICIJ reported that Silicon Valley investor and Russian citizen Yuri Milner got \$191 million from VTB Bank, and invested that money in Twitter. The leaked records also show that a financial subsidiary of Russian energy company Gazprom funded a shell company that invested in a Milner-affiliated company that held roughly \$1 billion in Facebook shares shortly before its 2012 initial public offering.

Milner told the ICIJ that he was unaware of any involvement by the Gazprom subsidiary in any of his deals and that none of his investments has been related to politics.

Milner has also invested in a tech-savvy real estate fund that was co-founded by Trump adviser and son-in-law Jared Kushner called Cadre. Milner told the ICIJ that he used his own money for the investment.

The revelations follow last year's release of records from a Panama-based firm involved in setting up offshore accounts. That disclosure triggered investigations in several countries, the resignation of the prime minister of Iceland and ouster of the leader of Pakistan. The Panama Papers also revealed that close associates of Russia's leader Putin had been using the dummy accounts abroad to store their wealth, including a close Putin friend who had \$2 billion of offshore assets.

There are legitimate reasons for setting up offshore accounts, but lax regulation and anonymity in some jurisdictions make it easy to launder money, evade taxes and avoid regulatory scrutiny. Critics of the widening gap between the super-wealthy and the rest have seized upon the use of tax havens as revealed in the Panama Papers as evidence of a crisis, and governments have promised to crack down.

According to records obtained by the International Consortium of Investigative Journalists, Ross is an investor in Navigator Holdings, a shipping giant that counts Russian gas and petrochemical producer Sibur among its major customers. Putin's son-in-law Kirill Shamalov once owned more than 20 percent of the company, but now holds a much smaller stake.

Commerce Department spokesman James Rockas said Ross "never met" Shamalov and has generally supported the Trump administration's sanctions against Russia, according to the ICIJ report. Rockas USD176 million at Friday's closing stock price.

The details add to the questions about ties between Russia and the Trump administration

Ross' stake in Navigator is likely a small fraction of that. In financial disclosure forms he filed with the government this year, Ross valued his holdings in the Cayman Island entities, state actors, including Putin.

Much of the new trove of files includes bank statements, emails and loan agreements from Appleby, a law firm that helps set up offshore dummy companies and trusts. Appleby told the ICIJ that there is "no evidence" that it has done anything wrong.

Other records came from Asiaciti Trust, a family-run offshore specialist based In Singapore, and from 19 corporate registries maintained by governments in jurisdictions that draw the wealthy seeking privacy.

Big investments in two U.S. tech companies from a Russian government bank and Russian energy giant have also come to light.

Queen Elizabeth has investments in offshore havens

EWLY leaked papers revealed Sunday that Britain's Queen Elizabeth II has invested some of her private money in offshore tax havens.

According to documents obtained by the International Consortium of Journalists, the queen's investment managers placed roughly 10 million pounds (USD13 million) in offshore portfolios in the Cayman Islands and Bermuda.

The investments were made in 2004 and 2005 by the Duchy of Lancaster, the queen's private financial manager.

The Duchy of Lancaster, which holds assets for the British monarch to generate income for her, confirmed in a state-

ment that some of its investments are in overseas accounts. It said that all its investments were legitimate.

"We operate a number of investments and a few of these are with overseas funds. All of our investments are fully audited and legitimate," it said.

The documents showed that the queen has roughly 3200 pounds invested in Bright House, a household goods and electronics retailer that has been accused of exploiting customers by charging high interest rates.

Her use of offshore tax havens is likely to generate criticism from activists seeking to abolish the monarchy in favor of a republic.

The queen pays taxes on the income generated by her holdings in the Duchy of Lancaster. She has vast financial assets, including luxury real estate, valuable artwork and jewelry. She is also the legal owner of many of the swans on the River Thames.

The documents about Elizabeth's financial holdings are part of a tranche of some 13.4 million records of offshore accounts leaked to German newspaper Süddeutsche Zeitung and shared with the International Consortium of Journalists and a network of more than 380 journalists in 67 countries.

Labour Party leader Jeremy Corbyn said the widespread use of offshore havens by wealthy individuals in dozens of countries proves "there's one rule for the super-rich and another for the rest when it comes to paying tax." AP

2000 HILLARY CLINTON IS FIRST FIRST LADY IN SENATE

Hillary Rodham Clinton, wife of the president, has won a seat for the Democrats in the Senate to become the only First Lady to win elective office in US history.

Votes are still being counted but exit polls show she has a clear majority over Republican rival Rick Lazio in the state of New York.

The Clinton family voted near their home in Chappaqua, north of the city, with the president telling reporters, "You can't put me down as 'undecided'!"

Mrs Clinton made her victory speech in Manhattan, flanked by husband Bill, her daughter Chelsea, outgoing Democrat Senator Daniel Patrick Moybihan and incumbent senator Chuck Schumer. She told cheering supporters: "Today we voted as Democrats and Republicans, tomorrow we begin again as New Yorkers."

Mr Lazio only entered the race in May after charismatic New York mayor Rudolph Giuliani pulled out to fight prostate cancer.

During an acrimonous campaign he emphasised his strong connections to New York, while Hillary defied accusations she was a carpetbagger and appealed to Democrats in New York City, black, Hispanic, Jewish and women voters - and won through.

Mrs Clinton has also shown her tenacity in the face of the president's much publicised extra marital affairs.

In 1992, when Gennifer Flowers revealed that she had had an affair with him (which he admitted to only years later and then claimed it was confined to one encounter), she uttered the famous words on the CBS 60 Minutes programme: "I'm not sitting here as some little woman standing by my man like Tammy Wynette. I'm sitting here because I love him."

She later had to apologise to the country singer Tammy Wynette who wrote and sang "Stand by Your Man" but was not the character in it - but Mrs Clinton had successfully made her point to the American public.

Then in January 1998 the story about the president's affair with White House intern Monica Lewinsky broke - which Bill Clinton strenuously denied.

Mrs Clinton was defiant once more, declaring in an interview with the NBC Today show that it was all inspired by "this vast right-wing conspiracy that has been conspiring against my husband since the day he announced for president".

She had a difficult moment later that year when her husband admitted to having had a relationship with Miss Lewinsky, and TV viewers watched them walking across the White House lawn - Chelsea between them - to the helicopter waiting to take them on holiday. All that is in the past and now - as her husband prepares to leave office at the end of his second term - Hillary Clinton's supporters are even talking of her running for the top job herself.



FEARS SQUASHED: ZUCCHINI MISTAKEN FOR WWII BOMB IN GERMANY

A worried resident in Germany alerted police to what he thought was a World War II bomb in his garden. Officers rushed over — and found a particularly large zucchini.

Police were summoned to the scene in Bretten, near the southwestern city of Karlsruhe, on Thursday morning by an 81-year-old man.

They said in a statement over the weekend that officers determined "the object, which really did look very like a bomb" was actually a 40-centimeter zucchini.

The offending vegetable, which was very dark in color, weighed about five kilograms. Police believe someone threw it over a hedge into the garden.

Unexploded wartime bombs are unearthed frequently during construction work in Germany, often forcing authorities to evacuate tens of thousands of residents while they are defused. 

Brees, Saints find margin for error in rout of Buccaneers

DREW Brees started listing the mistakes the Saints made against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

There were two lost fumbles, one on Alvin Kamara's run and another on Willie Snead's muffed punt. Wil Lutz missed a 43yard field goal and had an extra point blocked. Brees missed a deep throw to Ted Ginn when the speedy receiver was behind the Bucs' defense. The Saints' kickoff return unit also botched a trick play.

In the NFL, teams generally need to be playing well to overcome all that. New Orleans overcame it to the tune of a 30-10 rout.

"By no means was it perfect out there," Brees said. "I felt like we had some opportunities to score" more points.

The Saints (6-2) are now riding a six-game winning streak, longer than any streak they had during their last playoff season

in 2013, and their longest since 2011. Four of the victories have been by two touchdowns or more. None was closer than eight points.

Against Tampa Bay, the Saints made their share of big plays. There was Kamara's serpentine, 33-yard touchdown on a screen pass and Ginn's 36-yard score on a pass over the middle. Undrafted rookie Justin Hardee scored New Orleans' first TD when he blocked a punt and recovered it on the run.

Defensively, the Saints continued to look like world beaters in what has been a stunning turnaround from New Orleans' O-2 start, during which the same unit gave up 1,025 yards and 65 points.


"We started out being one of the youngest defenses in the league," said defensive end Cameron Jordan, who had 1 1/2 sacks against Tampa Bay. "I could not be prouder of our defense and the way that they are playing."

The Bucs (2-6) lost their fifth straight, and their frustration boiled over during a scuffle that involved quarterback Jameis Winston and receiver Mike Evans.

Winston, who lasted only a half while playing with a shoulder injury, instigated the thirdquarter dust-up when left the sideline and pushed his finger into the back of rookie cornerback Marshon Lattimore's helmet. Lattimore shoved back and then Evans decked Lattimore from behind, drawing an unnecessary roughness flag.

Evans berated himself for being childish and malicious. Winston, whose playing status for next week is uncertain, acknowledged that he's not dealing well with the disappointment of a season that began with a lot of promise after the Bucks narrowly missed the playoffs a year ago.

"I hate losing. I hate losing. I hate losing," Winston said. "It's something that we are going to have to handle internally, but we are going to handle it." **AP**

surefire way for a Chelsea manager to ease any anxieties is the sight of a dejected Jose Mourinho at Stamford Bridge.

Antonio Conte achieved just that yesterday [Macau time], handing Mourinho a third successive losing return visit to Chelsea with Manchester United.

Alvaro Morata's second-half header secured the 1-0 Premier League win as Chelsea outplayed United to instantly recover from a debilitating loss at Roma in the Champions League.

The spirited performance moved the fourth-place champions a point behind Mourinho's side, while Manchester City extended its lead over United to eight points by beating Arsenal 3-1.

"We are worried," said Mourinho, who won the Premier League three times across two spells as Chelsea manager. "But there are 18 teams more worried than us because we are second."

Conte, though, is less worried than he was going into a game that saw defender David Luiz ruthlessly dropped and forced to watch from the stands.

"This season we are struggling a bit to find the best solution for this team," Conte said. "Last season we found great balance with the system, 3-4-2-1, but this season we changed many players and we have to find the best solution game by game.

"We showed good balance tonight, we created many chances to score, we could have been more clinical, but it's OK."

OK, because Morata did find the net once to end a six-game scoring drought in all competitions.

The goal was gifted in the 55th minute by the United defense, but it also owed much to Cesar Azpilicueta's vision and precision.

Morata peeled away from defender Eric Bailly and the striker was completely unmarked 12 yard (meters) from goal when he met Azpilicueta's pinpoint cross with a powerful looping header.

"Don't forget this is the first season he is playing regularly," Conte said of the off-season recruit from Real Madrid. "He played a really good game against three physical, strong central defenders. He showed he is strong physically and he has good technique. If I have to find a negative aspect, he could have scored more goals and killed the game."

Morata was only signed by Chelsea because Romelu Lukaku opted to sign for United rather than rejoining the Premier League champions from Everton. But while Lukaku has now gone a seventh game in all competitions without scoring, Morata's goal famine is over.

"I think we lost emotionally for a few minutes after the goal," Mourinho said, "the team was a bit in trouble to be confident again and to try to play again."

Chelsea was transformed from the disorganized team that was picked apart so easily at Roma in a 3-0 loss, making an assertive start against United.

Tiemoue Bakayoko had an early chance to put the hosts in front but missed the target, United goalkeeper David De Gea denied Eden Hazard and Morata lacked power with a strike before halftime.

But Chelsea was getting closer, overrunning United in midfield with stability restored by N'Golo Kante returning from six games on the sidelines with a hamstring injury.

Within two minutes of Hazard being again thwarted by De Gea, United was carved open as Morata scored. But it was an anxious ending for Chelsea, with the three points preserved with a minute to go when Thibaut Courtois produced a close-range save from Marouane Fellaini. Mourinho, who complained last month that he won't "cry" about injury problems like other

managers, in part blamed the loss on the absence of players like Paul Pogba.

"Of course we missed some important players, especially the quality and the physicality of some of them who could not be available," Mourinho said. AP

Stiverne did not land a punch and never should have bothered showing up.

Earlier, Sergey Lipinets won a unanimous decision over Akihiro Kondo for the vacant IBF junior welterweight title, a decision that was lustily booed by the crowd of 10,924 at Barclavs Center. AP

Asia can make TPP work without the US

Donald Trump's grand tour of Asia will attract a lot of attention this week, but in one respect the fuss will be misleading. The president will be no more than a bystander when the region's leaders make a very big decision - whether to go ahead with the Trans-Pacific Partnership, a deal that the U.S. designed and subsequently abandoned.

They can go ahead without the U.S., and they should.

True, the pact was designed to go into effect only if countries accounting for 85 percent of the region's output signed on. This bar is impossible to reach without the U.S. Also, countries such as Vietnam and Malaysia made concessions during the original talks in hopes of gaining access to the huge American market. Without that incentive, their interest in the deal is diminished - and if the agreement were thrown wide open to take account of this, it might unravel altogether.

Yet the deal isn't dead. Negotiators have narrowed their differences, and it's possible agreement can be reached this week. They should seize the moment. Prolonging the talks raises the risk that political winds will shift again. (Last month's election in New Zealand nearly derailed the talks as negotiators sought further changes.)

It would have been far better to wrap up the initial negotiations sooner, so that the U.S. could have signed before Trump's election - but it's too late for regrets on that score. Prompt action now can salvage a pact that's valuable even without the U.S.

This is partly because the deal's most far -reaching clauses aren't about tariffs, but aim to set new standards for the protection of intellectual property, data flows, labor and environmental conditions, and more. In the long run, this will serve the interests even of countries such as Vietnam that stood to gain most from increased trade with the U.S. Japan's government, for its part, rightly sees TPP's ambitions as a tool to push through structural changes that make sense in their own right, and which would be politically difficult otherwise.

Japan and others are also wary of U.S. pressure to negotiate a bilateral free-trade agreement instead of the TPP. Having a regional deal in hand would make it easier to engage with the U.S. on level terms.

Best of all, adopting the agreement lar-

The Guardian newspaper says the "Paradise Papers" document trove reveals that the singer was an investor in Maltese company Nude Estates, which bought the Ausra shopping center in 2007.

Bono's spokeswoman told the paper that the

THE U.N.'s weather and climate agency says 2017 is set to become the hottest year on record aside from those impacted by the El Nino phenomenon.

The World Meteorological Organization says this year is already on track to be one of the three hottest years of all time, after 2015 and 2016, which were both affected by a powerful El Nino effect, which can contribute to higher temperatures.

Last year set a record for the Earth's average global temperature. The warning was timed

for yesterday's start of the latest U.N. climate change conference, hosted this year by Bonn, Germany. Some 25,000 scientists, envoys, lobbyists and environmental activists have descended on the city for two weeks of trying to figure out how to turn the goals of the 2015 Paris climate change accord into reality.

WMO says key indicators of climate change — such as rising carbon-dioxide concentrations in the atmosphere, rising sea levels and the acidification of oceans — "continue unabated" this year.

It said the global mean

temperature from January to September this year was about a half-degree Celsius warmer than the 1981-2010 average, which was estimated to be 14.31 degrees Celsius.

The five-year average temperature from 2013 to 2017 is more than 1 degree Celsius higher than that during the pre-industrial period.

WMO says 2017 has been marked by higher-than-average rainfall in places like western China, southern South America and the contiguous United States. It has also been marked by lowerthan-average coverage areas for Arctic sea ice. **AP**

gely as it stands would allow a future U.S. administration, with a clearer understanding of U.S. interests, to join without protracted new bargaining. With that in mind, negotiators have wisely decided to suspend and not eliminate certain clauses especially sought by the U.S., such as those dealing with "biologics." These could be easily reinstated.

The region's leaders shouldn't let this chance slip. Talks led by China on the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership are moving along, but that's almost certain to be a narrower deal, focused on tariff reductions rather than questions of greater concern to advanced economies such as Japan and Australia.
