North Korea vesterday fired what appeared to be the most powerful missile it has tested since President Joe Biden took office, as it revives its old playbook in brinkmanship to wrest concessions from Washington and neighbors amid a prolonged stalemate in diplomacy. The Japanese and South Korean militaries said the missile was launched on a lofted trajectory, apparently to avoid the territorial spaces of neighbors, and reached a maximum altitude of 2,000 kilometers and traveled 800 kilometers before landing in the sea.




Thailand The governor of a province in eastern Thailand declared a state of emergency after an oil slick washed up on a sand beach, shutting down restaurants and shops in a setback for the pandemichit tourism industry. Some 20-50 tons of oil are estimated to have leaked last week in the Gulf of Thailand from an undersea hose used to load tankers at an offshore mooring point owned by the Star Petroleum Refining Co.



New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern said she is self-isolating after coming into close contact with a person infected with the coronavirus. The exposure came on a flight from the town of Kerikeri to the largest city of Auckland. New Zealand's Governor-General Cindy Kiro was also on the Jan. 22 flight and has also gone into isolation. Both women had been in the Northland region to do some filming ahead of New Zealand's national day.

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TAK CHUN BOSS ARRESTED OVER ILLEGAL GAMBLING OPERATIONS

WO suspects from an illegal gambling syndicate connected to the investigations of the Suncity case have been arrested, the Judiciary Police (PJ) told a special press conference yesterday morning.

The suspects are Levo Chan Weng Lin, owner of junket operator Tak Chun Group, as well as Choi Wai Chan, president of Ying Hai Group. The two groups are commercial associates.

Levo Chan is the major shareholder and co-chairman of Macau Legend Development Ltd.

The police disclosed that in the follow-up investigations on a similar case last November, the authority discovered that the two suspects allegedly conducted illegal activi-

Last November's case referred to by the police was the arrest of Alvin

The duo was suspected of operating illegal online gambling and side-betting activities. The PJ said that Chan was the main operator and Choi provided support.

On January 28, when deemed appropriate timing by the PJ, an arrest was made at a hotel in the NAPE District. News outlet Allin Media reported the location to be the Waldo Hotel, opposite Sands Macao.

During the investigation, the suspects failed to cooperate, according to the police, who said that they found a significant amount of evidence in their offices and residences. The evidence came in the form of computer data, print documents and cash.

After the press conference, the two suspects were transferred to the Public Prosecutions Office. They were charged with the crimes of operating a criminal syndicate, illegal operation of gambling activities and money laundering.

A series of announcements had previously been made by gambling concessionaires that operations with junket operators would be

terminated. Tak Chun Group then announced the cessation of operations of its VIP gambling rooms.

Meanwhile, Levo Chan's wife, Taiwanese entertainer Ady An, issued a statement through her management agent in Taiwan, declining to comment on personal matters, as reported by several news outlets.

Last night, Macau Legend issued a statement noting, "The board is aware of the arrest and detainment of Chan Weng Lin an executive director, the co-chairman of the board, the chief executive officer and a controlling shareholder of the company, by the Macau Judicial Police."

"The board is of the view that as the group is operated by a team of management personnel and the above incident relates to the personal affairs of Chan and not related to the group, the board does not expect the above incident to have a material adverse impact on the daily operations of the group," the statement read.

Previously, Steve Vickers, specialist in Political and Corporate Risk Consultancy and CEO of Steve Vickers and Associates (SVA) told the Times after the arrest of Suncity CEO that these forthcoming regulatory shifts signaled an end to some or all of the junket business, which has "led to an escalation of efforts by certain junket operators to raise gaming revenues directly on the mainland and to engage in unlawful gaming: both on the mainland and via proxy gaming operations in South East Asia."

Chinese health authority slams home-travel restrictions during CNY

 $T^{\text{HE}}_{\text{Commission (NHC) of}}$ China announced a series of guidelines last week which banned restrictions on home-travel during the Lunar New Year.

Lunar New Year is the annual period during which masses of the mainland's working class travel to their native homes to celebrate the most important festival in Chinese culture.

It has been rumored that restrictions were levied to block home travel, citing Covid-19 control as an ex-

In response, a NHC spokesperson, during a press briefing, slammed restrictions levied on residents in or from low-risks areas. The spokesperson stressed that authorities should not expand restricted areas "as they please."

Coincidentally, following the NHC announcement, the local Novel Coronavirus Response and Coordination Centre issued a guideline, overhauling the "discouragement of festive gatherings" it had previously strongly advised earlier this year due to the recent Covid-19 outbreak in neighboring regions.

Besides giving a greenlight to festive gatherings, the guideline highlights several points of note to the public. For example, when they have festive gatherings, they should wear masks and maintain social distancing. They should only take off their masks when they eat or drink.

Independent utensils should be used when sharing portions of food.

People with Covid-19 symptoms or those who have been in high-risk areas should avoid participating in such gatherings. Nucleic acid test (NAT) results should be presented by attendees at gatherings with more than 400 people.

A returnee from Switzerland has been tested positive for SARS-CoV-2 without any symptoms. She is not counted as a case for the time being.

The 19-year-old was double vaccinated with mRNA vaccines in Macau in July and August last year, before travelling to Switzerland for studies. She has a travel history in Europe.



She boarded a flight in Zurich on January 28 and arrived in Macau on January 29. She has been admitted to the Public Health Clinical Centre in Coloane

for quarantine.

Currently, entrants from Zhuhai or Shenzhen into Macau will need to bear negative NAT results taken within 48 hours. AL

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Ushering in the Year of the Tiger with series of events

O usher in the Year of the Tiger, the Macao Government Tourism Office (MGTO) will organize Chinese New Year (CNY) festivities including the Golden Dragon Parade, Parade for Celebration of the Year of the Tiger, fireworks and CNY related events to celebrate the Spring Festival.

THE GOLDEN DRAGON PARADE

The Golden Dragon Parade will be held on the first two days of the Lunar New Year. The od of Fortune, the three Gods of Happiness, Prosperity and Longevity, Entourage Boy and Girl, the Chinese Zodiac Mascot of the Tiger and other legendary figures will distribute golden ingots across the city.

"Dance performances will be arranged at designated locations to further enliven the city with festive vibes, conveying warm wishes to Macau residents and visitors during the Spring Festival," the Macao Government Tourism Office (MGTO) stated.

The festivities will be kicked-off with the Golden Dragon Parade at the Ruins of St. Paul's on February 1.

At 10:30 a.m., the God of Fortune will distribute golden ingots to symbolize happiness and riches.

At 11:00 a.m., officials from the MGTO, the Municipal Affairs Bureau and the Cultural Affairs Bureau will officiate the eye-dotting ceremony of the golden dragon and dancing lions.

The 238-meter-long golden dragon, joined by 18 dancing lions, will move in an undulating manner past the following locations: the Ruins of St. Paul's, Senado Square, Calçada do Tronco Velho, St. Augustine's Square, Rua Central, Travessa do Paiva, Sede do Governo, Travessa do Padre Narciso, St. Lawrence's Church, Lilau Square, Rua da Barra, A-Ma Temple, Avenida Panorâmica do Lago Sai Van, roundabout at Nam Van Lake and Sai Van Lake Square. According to the MGTO, this is "to spread the festive wishes to all residents and visitors in Macau."

CHINESE NEW YEAR FESTIVITIES

On the first two days of the Lunar New Year, dance performances will take place at Largo do Pagode da Barra, the Ruins of St. Paul's, Largo do Pagode do Bazar and Taipa Houses. Guizhou Congjiang Ethnic Art Troupe will be one of the performance groups.

Lion dance performances

will be held at the following locations at different time slots: Anim'Arte Nam Van, Largo do Pagode do Bazar, Rotunda de Carlos da Maia, Carmo Fair in Taipa, Senado Square, A-Ma Temple, Taipa Houses, Barrier Gate, Qingmao Frontier Post and Leisure Area in Rua do General Ivens Ferraz.

PARADE FOR CELEBRATION OF THE YEAR OF THE TIGER

The mega Lunar New Year celebration event — "2022 Parade for Celebration of the Year of the Tiger" including firework shows, float exhibitions and an online prize-giving — will be presented by the MGTO.

"The 2022 Parade for Celebration of the Year of the Tiger" will be held at the central and northern districts on February 3 and 12.

There will be 14 floats in the parade, seven from the government departments and seven from the local private sectors. There will also be 22 groups of performance artists from Macau and mainland China.

According to the MGTO, the parade's theme is "Turning the

fortune by the mighty tiger." The 2022 Parade for Celebration of the Year of the Tiger will revolve around the story of the "Tiger General's victory over a winged (epidemic) beast."

"A multimedia dance drama under the same theme will weave the 'dazzling floats' and 'wonderful' performances by various teams into a 'splendid extravaganza'," the MGTO described.

THREE FIREWORK SHOWS

A fireworks show will dazzle the skyline above the sea overlooked by the Macau Tower at 9:45 p.m. on the third night of the Lunar New Year.

In addition, two other fireworks shows will take place at 9 p.m. on February 7, known as "Renri" of the Lunar New Year as well as during the Lantern Festival on February 15 to spark greater festive joy for Chinese New Year.

The authorities said the fireworks are set off to "convey festive blessings and wishes for the Olympic Games Beijing 2022 to be held smoothly and to spark greater festive joy for Chinese New Year."

FLOATS EXHIBITION

The floats of the Parade will be on display at the seafront next to the Macao Science Center from February 4 to 11 and at the Tap Seac Square from February 13 to 20. Admission is free to the public.

CNY'S 'STAY, DINE AND SEE MACAO'

The MGTO announced that in tandem with the three fireworks shows on the third and seventh day of the Lunar New Year and during the Lantern Festival, the "Stay, Dine and See Macao" project will bring forth limited tours for Chinese New Year, enabling residents to enjoy fireworks from two different angles.

The two itineraries for the CNY limited tours include fireworks on a cruise where participants can have buffet dinner on the Macau Cruise.

"They can also enjoy the sight of festive-seasonal flowers at the Taipa Houses, one of Macao's eight scenic spots, and learn more about the Macanese culture at the Taipa Houses Museum," the MGTO indicated.

The other is at Penha Hill, where a buffet dinner at the restaurant midway up Penha Hill will be featured.

Participants for the tour will also visit the Spring Festival floral exhibition at the Taipa Houses and the Taipa Houses Museum.

The Chinese New Year limited tours will be available only during the third day and seventh day of the Lunar New Year and during the Lantern Festival, on February 3, 7 and 15.

The MGTO encourages interested residents are advised to sign up as soon as possible to create special memories with family and friends during the Spring Festival.

CNY MARKET AND FIRECRACKERS

The CNY Market located at Tap Seac Square will run from January 25 to 30 from 9 a.m. to 12 a.m. and January 31 to February 1 from 9 a.m. to 2 a.m.

Temporary stalls selling incense and pinwheels are located by the waterfront in Largo do Pagode da Barra from 6 p.m. today until midnight, and thereafter from early morning to 6:30 p.m. until February 7.

Firecrackers, fireworks and rockets will be sold and can be lit from February 1 to 5 from 10 a.m. to midnight at the Avenida Dr. Sun Yat-Sen (the reclaimed land for the new urban area near the Macau Tower), Estrada Almirante Marques Esparteiro, and Taipa (near the waterfront).

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Gov't approves city's 20-year Urban Master Plan

HE Executive Council, on Friday, approved the Master Plan 2020-2040, which integrates the commercial, industrial and tourism and entertainment districts as land use categories for economic activities.

According to the urban master plan, new commercial zones will be created and spaces for economic activities will be reinforced, namely at the Portas do Cerco, the Administration Area of the Macao Border Post of the Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macau Bridge, the former Cotai Border Post, the Inner Harbour and Venceslau de Morais Avenue, in order to promote regional cooperation and economic development at border crossings.

Commercial zones are essentially intended to accommodate trade and service activities, such as offices, financial activities, retail sales, restaurants, conventions and exhibitions, so as to "create conditions for the proper diversification" of the economy and the growth of emerging and cutting-edge industries, in conjunction with the creation of housing areas,



the Executive Council, Andre Cheong said at the press conference on Friday.

The area aims to create conditions to "encourage people to work in the areas where they live and to promote a balance between professional and residential functions." Cheong added.

NON-URBANIZATION ZONE

In the non-urbanization zone, the Master Plan has proposed to preserve the hills, waters and wetlands of the Macao SAR, in order to protect natural resources and those with scenic, archaeological, cultural or historical values, as well as Macau's biodiversity.

The government said that the Master Plan intends to create green or public open spaces in the East -2 UOPG, Outer Harbour Area - 2 UOPG and North Taipa - 1 UOPG through the New Urban Landfill Plan, as well as to maintain the large green or public open spaces in the Coloane UOPG.

In relation to the land that is currently dispersed and destined for industry, it will be concentrated in the Ilha Verde Cross-border Industrial Park, the Pac On Industrial Park, the Concordia Industrial Park in Coloane and the Ká-Hó Industrial Park, with incentives for modernization and industrial development.

Furthermore, the land originally intended for industrial activities, located in residential areas, "will be released for non-industrial purposes, in order to gradually mitigate the 'social problems' caused by the proximity between industrial and residential areas, thus 'improving living conditions'," Cheong explai-

The Master Plan intervention area is divided into 18 Planning and Management Operating Units, which are classified as urban and non--urban areas, the latter representing around 18% of the total area, the authority said.

Cheong also stated that the Master Plan is based on the development goals of the MSAR, with a view to promote Macau's integration into the Guangdong-Hong Kong--Macau Greater Bay Area, support diversified industrial development and protect Macau's historical and cultural heritage.

The city's development strategy is based on the development of a "World Centre for Tourism and Leisure" and a "Beautiful Home", that serve as the reference framework for the preparation of detailed plans, Cheong stressed.

The administrative regulation shall come into effect on the day following its publication.

Hengqin incubation facility operator mulls investments on the island

THE operator of a busi-**I** ness incubation facility on Hengqin Island enticed members of the audience to invest in the island at a commercial event, dubbing it a "now or never" opportunity.

David Cheang, head of AHA HK & Macau Youth Incubation Center, presented yesterday his impressions of the Guangdong-Macao Intensive Cooperation Zone in Hengqin to business personnel at a recent breakfast briefing hosted by the France Macau Chamber of Commerce.

Cheang hinted at the potential and prosperity of the island several times during his 45-minute presentation on the zone, where he operates a business facility.

He highlighted the identifying advantage of Heng-

qin, as disclosed by the government previously, as the access to websites and web services such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and WhatsApp, currently categorized in other parts of China as illegal. This could be very appealing to an audience of which nearly half were non-Chinese.

Another advantage of the island, according to the business facility operator, is its hybrid position. It is a piece of land under Chinese law but levying Macau tax levels.

"The plan for building the Zone has indicated that by 2024 the regulations and mechanisms will be [made similar] to those in Macau," Cheang pointed out. "The authorities in Hengqin will make more policies to synchronise the system with Macau's."

"I think Hengqin will be

a very good location to do trading business," he insisted.

Another question is whether these policies on Hengqin will affect Macau's economy. With such a preferential system, location, workforce and administration, certain members of the audience expressed anxiety that Hengqin will overtake Macau, instead of act in a collaborative and complementary position with Macau.

"From a macroeconomic perspective, Hengqin's GDP will be shared with Macau," Cheang said. "My opinion is whether entrepreneurs in Macau should consider entering Hengqin now, establishing early channels for trades."

Taxation is among the further reasons that the business operator has a good outlook over Hengqin commercially.

"In the future, if we export local products to Hengqin, the practice will be free from taxation," he said. "In this case, I think we [should] relocate certain procedures, productions or operations to Hengqin in order to lower our costs."

He pointed out that produce transported from other parts of mainland China to Hengqin will technically be considered domestic movement, which will be very cost-effi-

Moreover, as the mainland workforce in Hengqin will be considered a local workforce, in contrast to a non-resident workforce in Macau requiring more legal procedures, greater development can be expected in certain sectors.

"At the end of the day, these factors will help lower



entrepreneurs' costs," he concluded.

On the question of how foreign and mainland financial investors can coexist on Hengqin, Cheang believes there are policies to facilitate this.

"I think Hengqin has changed policies to allow foreign investors to invest in Hengqin, including financial institutions," he said, citing Macau's Luso International Bank example.

"[The bank] restructured their shares to allow them to develop in [the] mainland," he explained. "For bond issuance, I think there will be free capital flow so as to facilitate the Macau Stock Exchange to be located on Hengqin."

"Once [synchronization with Macau] is achieved, I think Hengqin will become internationally recognized," Cheang added. "The recognition of this position will be gradual."

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Vaccination record to go digital on April 1

ACAU'S vaccination record will transition to a digital format from April 1 as an Executive Regulation takes effect on the same day, the Executive Council (ExCo) has recently announced.

A new version of the system governing vaccination has been discussed and concluded by the ExCo. As the new system comes into effect in April, the existing version - Executive Regulation No. 16/2008 - will be voided.

The core of the new version is to support the city's digital governance. It is stipulated that after the promulgation of the Executive Regulation, the vaccination record will be published either digitally or physically. The regulation will leave room for it to be published in both manners.

As such, when a person receives a vaccination, the record should be updated digitally. When a print version of the record is required, the entries will be based on the digital version. A specific platform will be established for this purpose.

Meanwhile, the regulation also stipulates that Macau residents will receive certain vaccines free--of-charge. The types of vaccines will be publicized as Executive Orders. Moreover, the director of the Health Bureau (SSM) is vested with the power to waive vaccination charges - completely or partially - on certain people based on certain considerations.

Medical staff must report severe adverse effects following immunization (AEFI) within 24

The regulation categorizes vaccines into three types: the regular type, the non-regular type and the disease-specific type. According to Lo, the Covid-19 vaccine will be a non-regular type.

At the press briefing announcing the conclusion of the Executive Regulation, SSM's director Alvis Lo introduced that regular vaccines are those that should be taken at early ages, such as Bacillus Calmette-Guérin and hepatitis vaccines. On the other hand, Covid-19 and Influenza vaccine shots are categorized as non-regular vaccines.

Given the inclusion of the Covid-19 vaccine in the regulation,




the official was asked if it implies promoting vaccinations. Lo responded that "the regulation is irrelevant to promoting vaccination," recapping the core of the regulation is to promote digital governance.

Furthermore, when asked whether the regulation is a hint on mandatory vaccination, Lo said that promoting vaccination "at this stage" will be done through education, as well as improving access to vaccines and providing free-of-charge vaccines.

Further restrictions related

to Covid-19, such as jab before dining-in, will be founded by the Contagious Disease Prevention and Control Law and the Charter of the SSM, ExCo spokesperson André Cheong, who is also secretary for administration and justice, told the press conference.















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CTM WAIVES DATA FEE FOR HEALTH **CODE USAGE**

CTM has announced that it will waive mobile data fees for its customers when using the Macao Health Code app. In a text message sent to its mobile network customers, the telecom firm said that starting from February 1, CTM postpaid and prepaid mobile customers can register to waive the local data usage when using the Macao Health Code app. The moves were in a bid to support Covid-19 pandemic prevention measures.

Unemployment rate dips to 3.9%

N 2021, the unemployment rate of local residents stood at 3.9%, up by 0.3% year-on--year, and the median monthly income of the locals remained at MOP20,000, according to the Statistics and Census Service

The figure shows a record low since 2009.

The general unemployment rate was 2.9% in 2021, up by 0.4% year-on-year. The median monthly employment earnings of those employed was MOP15,800.

With regards to household employment indicators, the average number of employed persons per household was 1.6 in 2021, the same as in 2020; median monthly employment earnings per household increased by MOP500 year-on-year to MOP28,000.

The labor force living in Macau totaled 389,000 and the participation rate of the labor force was 69.0%. The total number of employed people in Macau was 377,100 and the number of employed residents totaled 282,500. up by 1,200 and 1,600 respectively from the previous period.

The number of unemployed locals increased by 900 from the




previous period to 11,900. Among those unemployed locals searching for new jobs, most were previously engaged in Gaming and Junket activities, and in the construction sector. Meanwhile, the proportion of new labor market entrants seeking their first job decreased by 2.3% to

10.8% of the total unemployed.

Recently, the Labour Affairs Bureau (DSAL) stated that the lack of professional skills and willingness to learn new skills and techniques are the reasons why the employability rate of local construction workers is low in 2021.

According to the DSAL, in 78% of the cases in which the bureau tried unsuccessfully to help employ workers, they did not get an interview "mainly because they did not pass the techniques test or dropped out of the skill tests [before completing them]."





MANY Chinese New Year customs have been widely observed for thousands of years. The family reunion dinner, pasting couplets and setting off fireworks are must-dos during Chinese New Year, also known as the Spring Festival.

But for this upcoming Spring Festival, watching the Beijing Winter Olympics will also become an important activity in addition to the more traditional ones.

The 2022 Spring Festival - the year of the Tiger in the Chinese lunar calendar - falls on February 1, just three days before the Olympic Winter Games officially opens in Beijing.

Lou Xiaoqi, a cultural scholar and founder of Civilization Magazine, said that the Olympic Games and Spring Festival share cultural connotations in common, as they both celebrate togetherness and harmony.

Overseas guests at the 2022 Winter Olympics echoed the importance of unity.

"The Lunar New Year is a celebration of family reunions. The Olympic Games is about the international family coming together. So it just kind of shows that we have a lot more in common internationally than we think that we do," said Oliver Walters, a cameraman for the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

"It's great for other cultures

to come here and experience it and see how much we do have in common and as opposed to what we don't think we have in common," he added.

TIME-HONORED VALUES

Equal to Christmas in Western countries in terms of significance, the Spring Festival is the most crucial time of the year for family reunions in China. The precise origins of the Spring Festival are lost in the mists of time, but according to folklore, it has been celebrated for around 4,000 years.

Chen Haiming, director of the Center for Global Governance and Law, Xiamen University of Technology, said that the Spring Festival embodies the principle of "oneness of heaven and humanity," representing the highest value of traditional Chinese culture and soul of the Chinese Lunar New Year

"The concept of unity between humans and nature has profoundly influenced all aspects of Chinese social life, and even shaped the idea of 'green development,' which China lays particular emphasis on today," he added.

More importantly, the Spring Festival represents the value of family reunions and the pursuit of harmonious family relationships.

The yearlong yearning for a family reunion during the Spring Festival is manifested in the travel rush. During the Spring Festival season -- a 40-day period known as 'Chunyun' -- hundreds

of millions of Chinese people will be on the move, cramming into trains, buses, cars and planes to reach family and friends.

Decades ago, the Spring Festival had little impact outside of China. But as the country's economy grew, the holiday, which has enormous cultural significance in the Chinese-speaking world, has become more prominent.

Similarly, the Olympic Games, full of passion and extraordinary feats of athletic endeavor, were the sporting, social and cultural highlight of the ancient Greek calendar for almost 12 centuries.

One of the most important traditions from the ancient Olympics was the Olympic Truce, a peace accord that allowed warring Greek city-states to set conflict aside, celebrate togetherness, and experience peace inspired by sport.

The modern Olympic Games was revived in the 19th century by Frenchman Pierre de Coubertin, who had read about the ancient Greek Olympics and believed the Olympic Games could contribute to world peace and international friendship.

As de Coubertin envisaged, the Olympic Games have evolved into humanity's largest and most diverse gathering. Every two years, the world watches in awe as athletes from up to over 200 countries and regions unite in competition at the Olympic Games.

Though the Olympic Truce

does not stop wars, it has a vital contribution to enhance understanding, lower tension, and resolve conflict, all for the benefit of humanity.

"The modern Olympic Games serves as a kind of practice for building a community with a shared future for mankind," said Lou.

CELEBRATING TOGETHERNESS & HARMONY AT BEIJING 2022

In 2021, the Olympic motto was revised for the first time in over 120 years, with the word "together" being added. The new motto now reads "Faster, Higher, Stronger - Together."

"In today's fragile world with so much uncertainty, the Olympic Games are more than ever a powerful symbol of hope, peace and solidarity for all of humanity in all our diversity," International Olympic Committee President Thomas Bach wrote in the foreword to the Olympic Manifesto

As the world continues to battle a relentless virus, and as anti-globalization and unilateralism pose severe challenges to the international community, the 2022 Winter Games could not have come at a better time - the world needs to unite together and celebrate humanity.

Given that this year's Winter Olympics coincides with the Chinese Lunar New Year, the Festival's traditional focus on harmony certainly takes on a more global significance. "The world today is in dire need of inclusiveness, which the Chinese culture of harmony without uniformity celebrates," said Chen.

"Given the values and spirit embedded in the Spring Festival, it is a festival to be celebrated not only by people in China but also those around the world," he added.

A fitting tribute to this occasion is the third edition of the Olympic Manifesto scroll published by Civilization Magazine.

The 60-meter-long scroll mainly centers on the Spring Festival and Winter Olympics, showing the integration of diverse world cultures. It also encompasses the festival culture of 23 host countries and 43 host cities of previous Olympic Games.

"This signifies that the culture of the East and the West meet in Beijing and develop with mutual understanding," explained Lou.

ANTICIPATION AND EXCITEMENT

As the Spring Festival approaches, decorations such as red lanterns and Chinese knots haven been hung up at the Main Media Center, hotels and the Athletes Villages to create a festive atmosphere.

"I'm honored to be in China for the lunar celebration. I'm looking forward to celebrating the New Year here in China," Walters told Xinhua.

These sentiments were echoed by a number of media and supporting staff from overseas.

Big Air Shougang, which will undertake the big air events of snowboard and freestyle skiing, was the first competition venue that entered the closed-loop management mode.

Rafal Robert, a ski jumping platform technician from Poland, has stayed within the closed-loop for nearly a month, and thus can already experience the festivities on Xiao Nian, which literally means "Minor New Year" in Chinese and is considered to be the prologue of the Spring Festival.

"I'm very happy to receive a gourd-shaped souvenir from my Chinese colleagues. They told me that the gourd represents good fortune and wealth in Chinese culture. It's very interesting," said Robert.

Maja Hrvatin, who is working for TV Slovenia during the 2022 Winter Games, hopes some of the Spring Festival traditions can show a bright future for humanity.

"I know that you are not allowed to sweep the room on the New Year's day, because you sweep away the joy and good luck," she said.

"It's a nice symbol. I really hope that all the people will come together despite all the obstacles, like everything going on with the virus, so in that way it's nice symbolism." XINHUA

China manufacturing activity grows at slower pace in January

Mactivity in the world's second largest economy grew at a slower pace in January compared to the previous month, according to an official government measure, as the country's strict "zero-tolerance" COVID-19 measures put a dampener on economic activity.

The purchasing manager's index, tracked by China's National Bureau of Statistics, slipped to 50.1 from 50.3 in December, continuing a third month of weak growth. A separate PMI by the business magazine Caixin showed yesterday that manufacturing activity fell even further, contrac-

ting from 50.9 in December to 49.1 in January.

PMI is tracked on a 100-point scale in which numbers above 50 show activity expanding and below show a contraction.

New orders, which are measured in a sub-index, also fell, dropping to 49.3, according to the official measure. New export orders activity also continued to contract, although at a slightly slower pace in January.

Chinese exports have been a consistent bright spot throughout the pandemic.

China saw multiple COVID-19 outbreaks in the past month and implemented strict lockdowns starting in December and continuing into the new year that barred people from leaving their homes. The lockdowns have affected up to 20 million people.

Zhao Qinghe, senior statistician at NBS, said in a statement yesterday that China faces multiple challenges, including a complicated economic environment and outbreaks of COVID-19 across the country.

Non-manufacturing PMI growth also declined, from 52.7 in December to 51.1 in January, with construction and service sectors both seeing weaker growth. MDT/AP



KILLING FIELDS

Death, danger, despair: A year in Myanmar

N elderly woman forced to flee bombings. A former peace negotiator deaving his job to fight Myanmar security forces. A woman's husband shot during a peaceful protest, leaving her alone to care for their two children.

Since Myanmar's military dismissed the results of the country's democratic election and seized power on Feb. 1, 2021, peaceful nationwide protests and violent crackdowns by security forces have spiraled into a nationwide humanitarian crisis.

The Associated Press spoke to people in Myanmar about how their lives have changed in the year since the military took power. They spoke on condition their names are not disclosed for fear of reprisal.

THE WIDOW: "HE SUDDENLY **DISAPPEARED**"

Before his death, Khine's husband earned enough money making door gates that her family lived a comfortable life in Yangon, Myanmar's largest city. She was

able to stay home to care for the couple's two young daughters while the husband worked.

On Feb. 1, Khine's husband got a phone call from a friend, telling him about the military takeover.


"He looked really sad, angry and couldn't talk much," Khine told the AP by phone.

In the weeks that followed,

protests calling for the military to restore democracy and free imprisoned politicians rippled through the country. Khine and her husband joined the crowds.

In late March, as security forces began using lethal force to crack down on protests, Khine was babysitting when demonstrators came to her home to tell her that her

husband had been shot. They took him to two clinics but both refused to treat him. He died when they reached a hospital.

"He suddenly disappeared," she said. "Before the coup, I had never imagined that our family life would fall apart like this."

Her husband is one of at least 1,490 people killed by the military since the takeover, according to the Assistance Association for Political Prisoners, a group that monitors verified arrests and deaths in Myanmar. Over 11,775 have been arrested, according to the group.

Since her husband's death, Khine has started working at a garment factory, earning \$3 a day. Unable to afford their old apartment after the loss of her husband's income, the family has moved into a small room. She worries about being able to provide for her children and their mental health.

"My eldest daughter is becoming traumatized," said Khine. "She often says, 'My friends have their fathers, but I don't.'

THE DISPLACED: "FLEEING THE WAR IS EXHAUSTING"

Bomb blasts, gunfire and artillery shelling have followed 63-year-old Mee at every shelter she's been forced to flee to over the past year.

She first had to flee to a camp for the displaced after fighting broke out near her village in eastern Myanmar. A month later, the camp was no longer safe, and the medicine she needed for her heart disease and hypertension wasn't available. With nowhere else to go, Mee moved to a relative's house.

"While we were there, gunfire was heard," Mee told the AP by phone "We decided not to run away, even if we died, because fleeing the war is exhausting."

Not long after, the area near her relative's house was bombed, and she had to move once more. For now, Mee shares a small barn with 15 other people, all of them displaced. She has enough medicine only for two months and is concerned about the future of her family and the country.

As of Jan. 17, the U.N. refugee agency estimates the number of the displaced since the army takeover at 405,700. Another 32,000 have fled to neighboring countries.

"I am worried and tired every day," Mee said. "For now, my hope is that I just want to see peace and calm. Then, I want to go back to my house."

THE SURGEON: "LIVES HAVE TO BE SACRIFICED"

Before the military seized power, the 28 year-old assistant surgeon was studying for his exams to become a specialist. He lived with his family and would take pride in treating patients at the hospital he worked at in a major city.

On the morning of the takeover, he went to work, seeing military vehicles on the roads and helicopters overhead. The phones and internet were cut. Stepping into the hospital, he learned the military had detained the country's leader, Aung San Suu Kyi.

The next day, he and other health care workers in state-run hospitals quit, sparking what would become known as the Civil Disobedience Movement.

"After the military coup, we no longer wanted to work under them. We believed all the health sectors will have no progress under the military," he told the AP by phone.

Myanmar has become one of the most dangerous places in the world for health care workers, according to Physicians for Human Rights. It said 30 health workers were killed and 286 arrested between the takeover and Jan. 10.

Seeing his colleagues getting arrested, the surgeon fled to an area controlled by an armed opposition group. He has worked in makeshift clinics made of tents in camps for four months, treating people with general illnesses and those wounded by military shelling and land mines.

Medicine is hard to find, with security forces arresting anyone transporting medication.

"We have to carry medicine secretly. That's why it takes about a month for medicine to arrive," he said. "Even if cars are carrying paracetamol or something like that, they're arrested."

The surgeon still dreams of being able to return home to take the exams for a specialist.

"But dreams and reality are different," he said. "The people are suffering from the oppression of the military council. Lives have to be sacrificed for the revolution."

THE JOURNALIST: "WE DARE NOT TAKE OUT OUR CAMERAS"

The videographer knew journalists had to show the world what was happening in Myanmar. Setting aside their anger and sadness about the military takeover, they went to the streets to document protests and brutal crackdowns with their phones day after

"We dare not take out our cameras" for fear of arrest, the videographer told the AP by phone. "Things are getting worse."

Facing increasing threats, many of the videographer's colleagues fled to the jungle to join armed resistance groups. Others have been arrested. By Dec. 1, more journalists were arrested in Myanmar than every country in the world except China, according to the Committee to Protect Journalists. At least two journalists have been killed and others tortured while in detention, the group said.

Yet the videographer continues to work, realizing that any report could be the last one.

"I'm working like an underground journalist," the videographer said. "In case of an emergency, I have prepared a bag if I need

Despite the threats, the journalist has no intention of leaving the

"The international community only knows about the military's atrocities through the media," the videographer said. "But I will continue to do this work until I can't do it. If the security forces chase and catch me — let them."

THE FIGHTER: "I DECIDED I WOULD TAKE UP ARMS"

After watching fellow peaceful protesters get shot in the head by military forces, the 47 year-old made a decision.

"I decided I would take up arms, and I started looking for options to actually do so," he said.

His protests had started peacefully. After the military takeover, he began organizing rallies in Yangon. But as the weeks passed, he knew his safety was in jeopardy.

"I stopped living in my apartment," he said. "I also had to ask my family to leave that apartment to a secret location so that (the military) could not harm them." But when the protests turned deadly, he realized he wanted to take a step further.

"I never thought I would find myself involved in a struggle," he told the AP by phone.

The man is just one of thousands of people in Myanmar who have joined loose-knit guerilla groups called People's Defense Forces. Some have forged alliances with armed ethnic groups that have been at war with Myanmar military for decades, while others have pledged allegiance to the opposition National Unity Government, a parallel administration that declared a "defensive war" against the military in September.

Before the takeover, the man enjoyed going to restaurants with his family, shopping trips to the mall and spending time with his children in their home when he wasn't working at a nongovernment organization involved in the decades-long peace process.

His days are now spent on missions he is hesitant to speak about for security reasons. He lives in an area of a jungle controlled by an armed ethnic group, carrying multiple weapons wherever he goes. He and his comrades forage for whatever they can to survive and sleep in hammocks strung between trees.

"The life I enjoyed is no longer available," he said.

The man said he is frustrated by the international community's lack of response, and that the people of Myanmar have had to take matters into their own hands.

"We have the right to use violence to defend ourselves while the international community stands by." MDT/AP

Russian roar on Ukraine rings hollow to Latin America allies

JOSHUA GOODMAN, MIAMI

was a classic Russian power play with echoes of Cold War gamesmanship. Shortly after entering into service in 2019, Russia's most advanced warship made a goodwill tour of the Caribbean, armed with cruise missiles, air defense systems and other weapons.

But when the Admiral Gorshkov sailed into the port of Havana, it was closely tailed by a Russian rescue tugboat — a sign to many that Moscow doubted the vessel's reliability and the visit was nothing more than a feeble effort to project power.

Russia is once again rattling its saber amid rising tensions over Ukraine, hinting that the U.S. refusal to heed its demands could spur closer military cooperation with allies in Latin America. In recent days, several senior Russian officials have warned Moscow could deploy troops or military assets to Cuba and Venezuela if the U.S. and NATO insist on meddling on Russia's doorstep.

U.S. National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan quickly dismissed Russia's tit-for-tat threats. On the heels of its massive troop buildup on its border with Ukraine, Russia's ability to mobilize troops in the Western Hemisphere, thousands of miles away, is limited at best, experts contend.

"This is pure misdirection and it's not fooling anyone," said Kevin Whitaker, a former U.S. ambassador to Colombia who also served as a diplomat in Venezuela, Nicaragua and as head of the Office of Cuban Affairs in Washington. "It's not real power projection. It's a showpiece and nothing more.'

But even if talk of troop deployments is mostly bluster, Russia's strategic buildup in Latin America is real, posing national security threats in what generations of U.S. policy makers have referred to as "Washington's backyard."

In the past decade, as the U.S. influence in the region has waned, Moscow - and to a lesser extent other far-flung adversaries like China and Iran — have quietly cemented ties with authoritarian governments in Nicaragua, Cuba and Venezuela through a mix of weapons sales, financing deals and intense diplomatic engagement.

Moscow helped Venezuela

design a cryptocurrency, forgave a \$35 billion Cuba debt and runs a high-tech anti-narcotics compound in Nicaragua that many believe is a covert beachhead for spying across the region.

Time and again, Russia has shown a willingness to leverage its sizable military whenever it has felt threatened by the U.S.

In 2008, Moscow sent a pair of Tu-160 nuclear-capable bombers to Venezuela amid tensions with the U.S. over Russia's brief war with Georgia, a deployment followed that year by the arrival of the "Peter the Great" warship.

Russia sent more Tu-160s in 2018 as relations with the West plunged to post-Cold War lows over Ukraine, and the military even hinted it was considering setting up an air base on tiny La Orchilla Island, so small that landing military aircraft there would have been nearly impos-

Even in countries friendlier to the U.S., like Mexico and Colombia, Russia has been accused of spying or engaging in disinformation campaigns to shape elections. A senior Colombian military official recently traveled to Washington to brief U.S. officials on Russian attempts to penetrate the communications of the country's top military command, a person familiar with the visit told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity to discuss the sensitive issue.

On social media, the Spanish-language arm of the Russian state-controlled RT television network has more than 18 million followers on Facebook, 10 times as many as the Spanish-language affiliate of Voice of America, according to the Alliance for Securing Democracy, a think tank that tracks the rise of authoritarianism around the world. It also outperforms most other Spanish-language media on the platform, though it's still dwarfed by CNN en Es-

It's all a far cry from the height of the Cold War, when Nikita Khrushchev in 1962 briefly placed nuclear missiles in Cuba, the Kremlin maintained a listening post less than 100 miles from Florida and the Sandinista government that was fighting a U.S.-backed right-wing insurgency in Nicaragua was building an air base to accommodate Soviet fighter jets.

Nicaragua's Punta Huete airfield is today semi-abandoned and President Vladimir Putin closed the spy station in Cuba two decades ago. With the collapse of its communist sponsor in the early 1990s, Cuba spiraled into a depression marked by widespread hunger known as the "Special Period."

But Russia's more limited support has bought it friends. Recently Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega named a consul in the Crimean peninsula Russia annexed from Ukraine in 2014. It's also allowed Putin to restore some of Russia's former glory in a region that has long resented Washington's far longer history of meddling.

As Putin now looks to repel NATO from what he calls Russia's "near abroad" in Ukraine, he's likely to take at least a symbolic poke at the U.S. in its own sphere of influence, said Evan Ellis, a researcher at the U.S. Army War College who specializes in Russian and Chinese influence in Latin America.

"I'm sure Putin will do something to project toughness on the cheap as he always does," Ellis said. "But he's not going to do anything that costs him a lot of money or get him into deeper trouble down the line like deploying nukes. He knows there are limits."

Russia's closest ally is Venezuela, which has spent billions over the past two decades of socialist rule building up its air defense with Russia's help — everything from Sukhoi fighter jets and attack helicopters to sophisticated radar and shoulder-mounted rocket launchers.

Such an arsenal gives Nicolás Maduro an ability to inflict serious damage in the event of any conflict with neighboring Colombia, the top U.S. ally in the region, said Gen. Manuel Cristopher Figuera, who was the Venezuelan president's spy chief until fleeing to the U.S. in 2019 after a failed putsch against his former boss.

"It's not an ideological relationship. It's a commercial one, but it provides Maduro with a certain amount of protection," said Figuera, who received training in Cuba and from Putin ally Belarus.

As the U.S. and its allies have taken steps to isolate the governments of Cuba, Nicaragua and Venezuela — what Donald Trump's former national security adviser John Bolton called the "troika of tyranny"— Putin has tried to fill the void.

In recent days, he's spoken to Maduro, Ortega and Cuba's Miguel Díaz Canel to explore ways to deepen strategic cooperation. He's also sent a planeload of medical supplies to Cuba to help it fight the coronavirus pandemic.

But the leaders, although expressing gratitude for Russia's continued aid, have so far remained silent on Ukraine — a sign they may be reluctant to be drawn into another geopolitical tussle.

"One of the fundamental legacies for Latin America from the Cold War is that they don't want to be treated as a pawn in someone else's game," said Whitaker, the former ambassador to Colombia. "What Russia is doing shows enormous disrespect for the sovereignty of governments that are supposedly their allies." MDT/AP

1983: British drivers ORDERED TO BELT UP



Drivers and front seat passengers must wear seatbelts under a new law which came into force at midnight.

The Department of Transport says 30,000 people a year are killed or seriously injured in road accidents. It hopes the compulsory wearing of front seatbelts will save 1,000 lives a year.

Evidence suggests six out of 10 drivers currently ignore advice to belt up in the front.

Police are being urged to take a softly softly approach to start with - but drivers could eventually be fined £50 for not wearing their seatbelts.

The row over making front seatbelts compulsory has been going on for 15 years and there have been 11 previous attempts to

Critics have accused the government of operating a nanny state and some drivers have complained their personal freedom is being infringed and they find seatbelts uncomfortable.

The government has been urging drivers to check the position of their seatbelts and make the necessary adjustments before today's law came into effect.

Junior Transport Minister Linda Chalker said: "Nobody likes being told to do something when they haven't seen for themselves the sense of it.

"You can remain in control of a vehicle when you don't get knocked out. If you are held in your seat by a belt you have more chance of stopping your vehicle careering into another vehicle containing other people."

She dismissed claims some people would suffer worse injuries through belting up, saying the evidence suggested only a tiny proportion of front seat passengers would suffer worse injuries if they were restrained by seat belts.

There will be some exceptions to the new law. Taxi drivers will be exempt because of the possible threat to their safety from dangerous passengers. Drivers of electric delivery vehicles such as milk floats will also be exempt.

Figures showed 90% of front-seat passengers began routinely wearing seat belts after it became compulsory

In 1991 it became compulsory for adults to belt up in the back seat. Figures showed an increase from 10% to 40% of backseat passengers wearing seatbelts

Research in 1998 showed 160 lives could be saved a year through belting up in the back - this included 40 drivers or front-seat passengers killed by an unbelted passenger in the back.

A high-profile advertising campaign, launched in July 1998, showed a mother being killed in a car when she was hit from behind by her unbelted

Figures for October 2000 showed the wearing of rear seatbelts had increased to 59% of adults and 91% of children.

Some Vegas Strip casinos to get new facades, familiar names

OME shuffling among owners could result in rebranding, demolition, reconstruction and the addition of familiar names at some of the Las Vegas Strip's most iconic properties.

Caesars Entertainment Inc., owner of the venerable Bally's Las Vegas, announced this week that it plans to rename its heart-of-the-Strip towers the Horseshoe Las Vegas, drawing on a name made famous at a downtown gambling hall that was the original home of the World Series of Poker.

A few blocks down Las Vegas Boulevard, the famed Tropicana Las Vegas could be demolished or renovated, according to the director of the company offering to buy out Rhode Island-based casino owner Bally's Corp. Bally's Corp. is buying the nearly 1,500-room resort — a Rat Pack-era attraction once known for its mob ties.

"We're open to it all," Soohyung



Kim, founding partner of investment firm Standard General, told the Las Vegas Review-Journal, including possibly leveling the tower and redeveloping the 35acre Strip property to give Bally's Corp. a glittery new Las Vegs Strip address.

"It's hard to be a national gaming company without a pre-

sence in Las Vegas," Kim told the newspaper.

At The Mirage Hotel & Casino, the landmark volcano that has spit fire since the hotel opened in 1989 is destined to be snuffed out once Hard Rock International acquires operations of the Polynesian-themed property in a cash deal with MGM Resorts International worth nearly \$1.1 billion.

Hard Rock, owned by the Seminole Tribe of Florida, plans to build a massive guitar-shaped hotel.

At the new Horseshoe, Caesars Entertainment said work will begin this spring to renovate and rename the 2,800-room Bally's, which opened in late 1973 as the MGM Grand Hotel, and then move the World Series of Poker to the Strip for the first time.

The tournament began in 1970 at the Horseshoe Club, a downtown hotel founded by Texas gambler Benny Binion in 1951. It moved in 2005 to the Rio All-Suites Hotel & Casino, where the pandemic-delayed 52nd version of the marquee event was held last November.

This year it will be at the Horseshoe and adjacent Paris Las Vegas from May 31 to July 19, Caesars said Wednesday in a statement.

"As we move WSOP to the Las Vegas Strip for the first time, that it will happen at Horseshoe makes it incredibly special," said Ty Stewart, a Caesars senior vice president and tournament executive director. MDT/AP

TOP-RANKED KREJCIKOVA, SINIAKOVA WIN WOMEN'S DOUBLES

TOP-RANKED Barbora Krej-L cikova and Katerina Siniakova took another major step in a partnership which began in junior ranks when they won the Australian Open women's doubles 6-7 (3), 6-4, 6-4 yesterday from unseeded Anna Danilina and Beatriz Haddad Maia.

The Czech pair claimed their first Australian Open title to go with one Wimbledon and two French Open titles to move a step closer to a career Grand Slam in doubles. They also are Olympic champions.

They were finalists in Melbourne last year but went down 6-2, 6-3 to Elise Mertens and Aryna Sabalenka. Krejcikova also had been in top form in the singles in Melbourne this year before unexpectedly falling to Madison Keys in the quarterfinals.

The top seeds were fully stretched by Danilina of Kazakhstan and Haddad Maia of Brazil who put together their partnership less than a month ago and were unbeaten in nine matches before yesterday. They won the Sydney Classic doubles title before ta-



ckling their first Grand Slam tournament together.

Danilina and Haddad Maia became the first pair to take a set from Krejcikova and Siniakova in Melbourne and kept the final alive for 2 hours and 42 minutes before finally succumbing.

Krejcikova and Siniakova's well--honed partnership was scratchy at times before experience pulled them through. Siniakova was more active in the first two sets while Krejcikova seemed unusually stuck on the baseline and less mobile than usual at the net.

Krejcikova stepped up in the final set and produced many of the key points, hitting strongly through the middle of the court while Siniakova crossed over at the net for clutch volleys.

Siniakova had served for the match at 5-2 in the third set but Danilina and Haddad Maia, not to be denied, broke her serve.

Haddad Maia held serve in front of cheering fans waving Brazil flags before Krejcikova clinched the win on serve.

"You guys have played two great tournaments and I hope you're going to continue together and I hope we're going to have more fights like this because it's a real pleasure to share a court with you," Krejcikova said court-side. 'You're really amazing.

"I want also want to thank my partner for playing with me for a very, very long time. I'm so happy we are still working so well together and our co-operation is only going up so I'm really happy with that and I'm looking forward to the next adventure."

Siniakova thanked Krejcivoka for her support through recent difficult times.

"Thank you for pushing me hard and for helping me and just being on my side on the court," she said.

The top seeds fell behind in the first set when Siniakova's serve was broken in the third game. They leveled, breaking Danilina in the eighth game and Siniakova and Danilina both lost their serves again before the set went to a tiebreak.

Danilina and Haddad Maia won the first six points on the tiebreak and held on comfortably to take the set.

Haddad Maia dropped serve in the opening game of the second set and Krejcikova and Siniakova held that advantage to level the match. They also broke Haddad Maia for an early advantage in the deciding set before their unseeded rivals fought back to extend the match. MDT/AP

France also has a recent victory over New Zealand and is improving quicker than any test nation ahead of hosting next year's Rugby World Cup.

Wales won the 2021 championship out of nowhere and has pedigree with four titles in the last 10 years.

Good luck picking a winner in the upcoming Six Nations.

The northern hemisphere rugby tournament that rarely fails to deliver is rolling around again—this time with fans and less certainty than ever about where the trophy will be heading.

Of course, there are some cast-iron guarantees around the Six Nations: Fiercely sung national anthems, press conference jibes



from Eddie Jones, post-match chaos at railway stations outside Twickenham and the Millennium Stadium. Oh, and it's fairly likely Italy will be limping to the final weekend already sure of the wooden spoon.

But almost everything else seems up in the air, especially given what transpired over the autumn internationals, which ended with European rugby sticking out its chest with pride.

For the first time since 2002, New Zealand, South Africa and Australia were all beaten on the same weekend — by France, England and Wales, respectively. Ireland also devoured Argentina on that statement weekend for the northern hemisphere that provided the perfect set-up for the Six Nations.

The French are the favorites this year. They have the world player of the year in scrumhalf Antoine Dupont, a mighty pack, a sense of togetherness, a coach with a plan in Fabian Galthie, and momentum from a first home win over the All Blacks since 2000.

Galthie called the Nov. 20 victory a "moment of truth" and now is the time to break a drought that feels almost as long. Not since 2010 has France won the Six Nations, a travesty for a country with so much rugby talent.

Les Tricolores have had back-to-back second-place finishes, losing out last year after a final-round loss at home to Scotland when a 21-point win was needed to overhaul Wales.

As for the Welsh, retaining the title just got that much harder with stalwart lock Alun Wyn Jones likely to miss the whole tournament because of a shoulder injury sustained in the autumn tests. Jones is just one of a number of key injury absentees for coach Wayne

Pivac, who is also without George North, Ken Owens and what could have been the starting back row of Josh Navidi, Justin Tipuric and Taulupe Faletau.


The fact the Welsh are starting out at Ireland and also have to visit Twickenham makes their title defense even tougher.

England can never be discounted but this tournament might be filed in the drawer marked "transitional" with Eddie Jones still rebuilding a team for the 2023 World Cup. The absence of Owen Farrell for the whole Six Nations because of injury denies England leadership in the back division and an ice-cool goalkicker, while putting more focus on the rising star of English rugby, flyhalf Marcus Smith. Jonny May, the team's most likely try-scorer, will also likely miss the whole tournament.

Jones survived a fifth-place finish last year, despite it being arguably England's worst ever display in the championship after losing to all three Triple Crown rivals — Scotland, Wales and Ireland — for the first time since 1976 and having their most points conceded in a campaign.

Then again, beating Australia and South Africa in November highlighted the strength in depth available to England, which is something the Irish can also boast. MDT/AP

SPACE SHOULD BE USED FOR INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION

More than 200 space launch missions, mostly carried by the Long March rocket family, were completed over the past five years.

The Beidou navigation system has completed its three-step operation, after launching 30 satellites into space, to provide services for the international community.

The Chang'e 5 spacecraft returned samples from the moon to Earth in 2020, becoming the first to do so since the Soviet Union's "Luna 24" mission in 1976.

Tianhe, the core module for China's space station in low-Earth orbit, was launched in April 2021. Apart from living quarters for crew members, it has a control center and docking hub, which will allow it to link with science modules.

The Tianwen 1 probe, China's first Mars mission carrying the Zhurong rover, was launched in June 2021, with the rover landing on the Utopia Planitia region of the Red Planet, making China only the second country after the US to land a rover on the planet.

These are just a few examples of China's achievements in space exploration from 2016 to 2021, as described in the white paper, "China's Space Program: A 2021 Perspective", released on Friday.

As the white paper says, cooperation with Russia to build an international lunar research station will be one of China's key space missions in the next five years, and China welcomes international participation in the mission at all phases and all levels.

The white paper also calls on all countries to conduct in-depth exchanges and cooperation in outer space on the basis of equality, mutual benefit and peaceful utilization.

Yet, as more than one foreign media outlet has highlighted, the United States tends to view outer space more as an area of competition. For instance, the US has established a Space Force, the first of its kind in the world, which was "rapidly developed from a theoretical concept to an operational service fully engaged in many activities", as Thomas E. Ayres, general counsel of the US Department of the Air Force, wrote in an article published on West Point's official website.

In May 2020, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration even drafted the Artemis Accords, which, contrary to the 1979 Moon Agreement declaring the moon as "common heritage of mankind", invented the concept of "safety zones" around lunar operations, allowing governments, even companies, to protect their research sites from "harmful interference". So far, 12 other countries have signed it.

In contrast, China, as the white paper emphasizes, calls for cooperation with other countries in astronaut selection and training, joint flights and other areas of space research and exploration.

It's time the US woke up and smelled the coffee. The world is no longer interested in its divisive, hegemonic schemes; instead, it is crying out for cooperation in every field, from fighting climate change, containing the COVID-19 pandemic to exploring outer space.

BEIJING SEALS OFF MORE RESIDENTIAL AREAS, REPORTS 12 CASES

Beijing officials said yesterday they sealed off several residential communities in the city's northern district after two cases of COVID-19 were found.

Residents in the Anzhenli neighborhood in Chaoyang district were sealed off on Saturday, and will not be allowed to leave their compound.

Beijing is on high alert as it prepares to host the Olympic Games opening on Friday.

While the cases are low compared to other countries in the region, China has double down on its "zero-tolerance" policy, which includes breaking the chain of transmission as soon as it is found.

The city is also setting up 19 points in the area to test residents every day until Friday, officials said at a briefing on the pandemic, according to state-backed Beijing News.

The Chinese capital reported a total of 12 cases of COVID-19 between 4 p.m. Saturday and 4 p.m. Sunday. All those cases came from people who were already under some kind of pandemic control measures.

The city conducted multiple rounds of testing for millions of residents this past week in Fengtai district, where some residential compounds were locked down.

PORTUGAL PICKS NEW GOVERNMENT WITH \$50B OF EU FUNDS ON TABLE

PORTUGUESE voters went to the polls yesterday in an early election that looked set to produce another vulnerable minority government, just as the country is poised to start spending a huge windfall of European Union funds.

That outcome would leave Portugal back where it started two months ago, when lawmakers rejected the minority Socialist government's spending bill and the country's president dissolved parliament.

The center-left Socialists and their main rivals, the center-right Social Democratic Party, were in a tight race, opinion polls suggested.

Those two parties traditionally collect around 70% of the vote and have for decades alternated in power in Western Europe's poorest country.


The landslide victory needed to form a majority government, which can pass most legislation despite opposition in parliament, is rare. Portugal has had just three majority governments in the past half-century.

That means one of the two main parties likely will have to form parliamentary alliances by cutting deals with smaller parties.

The stakes are high: Portugal, a country of around 10.3 million people, is poised to begin deploying some 45 billion euros (\$50 billion) of aid as a member of the EU to help spur the economy after the CO-VID-19 pandemic.

Two-thirds of that sum is intended for public projects, such as major infrastructure, giving the next government a financial bonanza. The other third is to be awarded to private companies.

The ballot took place amid a surge in COVID-19 cases blamed on the omicron variant, with about



1.2 million people confined at home but allowed to go to polling stations to cast their vote.

President Marcelo Rebelo de Sousa, in an election-eve address to the nation, urged people to vote, saying it is "a way of saying that ... nothing, and nobody, can silence our voice."

He said the coming years would be marked by "leaving behind a painful pandemic (and) an urgent rebuilding of the economy."

Miguel Morgado, a 49-year-old company manager voting in Lisbon, the capital, said he wasn't worried by the high coronavirus infection rate and hoped the country would soon be back to normal.

"Above all it is our civic duty to vote, the country needs it," he said. "No matter what we believe in, we must vote."

Since it came to power in 2015, the Socialist Party had relied on the support of their smaller allies in parliament — the Left Bloc and the Portuguese Communist Party — to ensure the annual state budget had enough votes to pass.

But last November their differences, especially over public health spending and workers' rights, were insurmountable, leaving Socialist Prime Minister António Costa short of votes to pass his party's plan. Costa could seek to resurrect the left-of-center alliance, despite some acrimonious exchanges during the election campaign.

The Social Democrats, meanwhile, may have to deal with a surge in support for the Chega! (Enough!) populist party, whose policies Social Democratic Party leader Rui Rio finds distasteful.

The Social Democrats have also in the past joined forces with the smaller Popular Party.

The Socialist Party promises to increase the minimum monthly wage, earned by more than 800,000 people, to 900 euros (\$1,020) by 2026. It is currently 705 euros (\$800). Low wages are a common grievance among voters.

The Socialists also want to "start a national conversation" about working four days a week instead of five.

The Social Democratic Party is promising income tax cuts and more help for private companies, cutting corporate tax from the current 21% to 17% by 2024.

The winner will also have more deep-rooted problems to address, including an economy that can't get traction.

According to Portuguese media, by 12-noon, the participation rate was slightly higher than in the previous legislative polls, in 2019. MDT/AP



naval exercises off the coast of Ireland after Dublin raised concerns about them amid a tense dispute with the West over expansion of the NATO alliance and fears that Russia is preparing to invade Ukraine. The Feb. 3-8 exercises were to be held 240 kilometers off southwestern Ireland — in international waters but within Ireland's exclusive economic zone. Ireland is a member of the 27-nation European Union but not a member of NATO.

Kuwait suspended flights to Iraq for a week starting yesterday citing security fears after a rocket attack targeted Baghdad international airport. Iraqi authorities, meanwhile. announced an attacker had been apprehended. Kuwait Airways, the country's main carrier, said in a statement Saturday that flights to Iraq were temporarily suspended based on instructions from the Kuwaiti Civil Aviation Authority due to "current conditions.



Italian President Sergio Mattarella was pulled away from his impending retirement and reelected Saturday to a second seven-year term as the country's head of state, ending days of political impasse by party leaders that risked eroding the nation's credibility. Earlier on Saturday, lawmakers entreated Mattarella, 80, who had said repeatedly he didn't want a second mandate, to change his mind after lawmakers in Parliament and regional delegates voted fruitlessly for days, trying to reach a consensus on other possible candidates.
