INT'L SCHOOL IN ZHUHAI ANTICIPATES MORE SAR STUDENTS ALONGSIDE REGIONAL INTEGRATION

AN international school in Zhuhai is expecting an increase in its enrolments from Macau and Hong Kong students, contributing to the further integration of neighboring regions.

Relocated to Hengqin in 2021, the Dulwich International High School Zhuhai campus is about a 15-minute drive from the Hengqin Port, 30 minutes from the Qingmao Port and Gongbei Port, and 40 minutes from the Hong Kong-Zhuhai--Macau Bridge Zhuhai Port.

Currently, students from Macau and Hong Kong make up around 17% of the current enrolment for the 2022-23 academic year at Dulwich International High School Zhuhai, located in the Guangdong-Macau In-depth Cooperation Zone.

In a recent media familiarization trip to the campus, school director Matthew Conn said that in its first year in 2010, the school already had students travelling to Zhuhai from Macau and Hong Kong to study on a daily or weekly basis.

According to Conn, there were "increasing interests for universities



in Macau and Hong Kong among our students during the pandemic."

"We plan to have more collaboration and connection with the universities in Macau to offer more opportunities for our students in both academic projects or experience in wider topics, such as sustainability," Conn told the press.

Data from the school shows that Macau students go to various university destinations, including UK, Australia, Hong Kong and Macau itself.

Currently the school has Macau graduates studying at the University of Manchester, University of Macau, Macau University of Science and Technology and Chinese University of Hong Kong.

Founded in 2010, Dulwich Zhuhai can trace its roots to Dulwich College, the first British independent school to bring its practices and ethos to China in 2003.

The school is the only international program in Zhuhai that has been ranked Top 100 in the "Hurun Education Top International Schools in China" for five consecutive years.

The SAR government has been developing the Guangdong-Macau in-depth cooperation zone in Hengqin.

The local government has previously pledged that it will continue to promote mutual access of infrastructure in the cooperation zone to gradually link it with Macau's public service and social security systems, covering education, medical care and social services. LV

Over 2,000 volunteers already registered for the National Games

VER 2,000 people have already filled out applications to become volunteers for Macau's hosting of the 15th National Games of China in 2025, the president of the Sports Bureau (ID), Pun Weng Kun, said yesterday on the sidelines of the meeting of the Sports Committee held at the Macao East Asian Games Dome.

Pun said that the preparations ahead of the games, which will be co-hosted by Guangdong province and the Special Administrative Regions of Hong Kong and Macau, are going smoothly, noting the enthusiastic res-



ponse from the volunteers, with applications gathered from over 2,000 interested parties in just five days.

According to information published previously, a total of 10,000 volunteers aged 16 and above will be recruited for the National Games in Macau. After verification of

their information, applicants will be able to participate in various training courses and activities conducted by the Organising Committee, which will commence this year. On completion of the training, volunteers will be arranged to fill different positions within the games

and events.

The volunteer training program is expected to be completed in the second quarter of 2025 and includes a series of theoretical and practical courses.

The ID president also added that, to train for the National Games, a delegation of Macau athletes will participate this year in the Asian Games to be held in Hangzhou.

Remarking on the hosting of the 70th Macau Grand Prix in November this year, one of the topics in discussion at the meeting, Pun confirmed that the plan is to follow a similar model to the one used in the 60th edition, with races and other complementary activities taking place over the course of nine days, including two weekends.

The president of ID and Coordinator of the Macau Grand Prix Organizing Committee also said that events such as a "Fun Run" on the Guia Circuit are part of the plans of the organizers, who are now focusing most of their attention on securing the return of the FIA events, namely the FIA Formula 3 World Cup.

Economic prosperity index to rally

HE Prosperity Index for January is expected to rally by over one point, with tourists again flocking to the city after three years, the Macau Economic Association (MEA) announced.

Although China began easing Covid-19 restrictions some time before January, the index in December did not perform well, the MEA noted. The December index scored only 2.2 points.

In contrast, the association estimated that the January index will reach 3.4 points, 1.2 points higher than the December figure. Moreover, the group expects the index to further climb in the coming three months, bringing the score from Unsatisfactory levels to Stability levels.

The MEA pointed out that this optimistic forecast is due to several factors.

On one hand, the revival in tourism began almost immediately after the easing of Covid-19 restrictions. On the other hand, the city's gambling industry has



also been given a degree of certainty with the enactment of the updated Gambling Law at the end of last year.

It pointed out that, according to the updated law, each casino licensee must possess capital of MOP5 billion. They have also promised to make investments totaling MOP118.8 billion in the coming decade.

Moreover, the M2 currency supply, which the MEA identifies as a leading indicator for the index,

started warming up in Dec. 2022 and achieved a 4.4% rise year-over-year.

What is more auspicious for the city, according to the MEA, is that gross gambling revenue (GGR) has increased following the tourism industry returning to normal settings. Alongside several projects proposed by the government, the MEA considers further improvement in the economy likely.

The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has also become optimistic in its estimate of the global economic trend.

At the same time, the US has also slowed down the increase in interest rates. This is reflected in the Hong Kong Interbank Offered Rate (HIBOR), which has fallen over 50% since the end of last year, showing that the supply of capital is larger than the demand.

However, the group warned of several risks that may cause fluctuations to the index.

For example, the MEA pointed out that geopolitical concerns, such as the Russian-Ukraine War and the pressure from inflation, may linger for some time and cause instability. Other risks may be entailed in the interest rates of the US Treasury Securities.

Meanwhile, although the increase in US interest rates has slowed down, unless its inflation eases, the inclination to increase will remain, posing risks for both Macau and Hong Kong.

The index for Jan. to Apr. is expected to gradually increase from 2.4 to 3.9 points, the MEA forecast.

MAN ARRESTED OVER CHANGING-ROOM PHOTOGRAPHY ALLEGATIONS

Alocal 45-year-old man has been arrested on allegations of secretly taking pictures of other people in the changing room of a clubhouse, the Judiciary Police (PJ) reported recently.

The suspect, who is named Lei, and is unmarried, is being charged with intrusion into the private lives of others.

At about 4 p.m. on Feb. 8, the police received a report from a male resident at a residential estate in Coloane who said that he had seen a bag containing an operating video camera in the change room. This led the man to suspect that he was being secretly videotaped.

At 8 a.m. the following day, the PJ intercepted the suspect at the residential estate. The suspect admitted to living in the estate and confessed that he started videotaping or photographing other males walking on the street.



The suspect reportedly settled in the estate in Dec. 2021 and later started secretly filming people while they were changing in the changing room.

After searching through his cellphone, the police found over 1,100 photographs and over 500 videos taken on the street as well as over 40 photographs and over 500 videos taken in the changing room.

On the day of the report, six men had been videotaped. They were either in the process of getting changed or wearing only their underwear. Some faces were seen in the videos. Two of the men pictured have decided to press charges.

TN cooperation with the Ma-Lcau Federation of Trade Unions (FAOM), the Labour Affairs Bureau (DSAL) will organize three job-matching sessions for specific sectors next week (February 23 and 24), providing a total of 266 job vacancies, the DSAL reported.

Vets will be allowed to operate in hotel establishments

parliamentary meeting, the government has agreed to allow veterinary services to operate in hotel establishments, the head of a parliamentary committee has said.

Lawmaker Vong Hin Fai, president of the Third Standing Committee of the parliament, pointed out that the government had agreed to eliminate the relevant proposal in the bill concerning veterinary services and animal-oriented businesses.

The proposal was set to ban veterinary services in hotel establishments.

The original proposal related to the venues in which animal-oriented businesses was drafted that such businesses must not be established in realty in-

consistent with the use of the businesses, particularly not in residences, industrial buildings, hotels, public facilities or parking lots.

The change was made after some Committee members raised concerns over tourists staying at hotels with their pets. The same concern was also expressed at the first reading of the bill but due to the nature of discussion, the question was deferred.

Meanwhile, changes to the ownership of animal-oriented businesses have also been made. The current version of the bill proposes that such businesses will be allowed to be carried out by individuals or legal persons. In addition, the term legal persons here will not only include commercial companies, but also associations, consortia and foundations.

According to Vong, if the bill enters into force, people with a Bachelor's degree in medicine will be allowed to practice veterinary services, provided that they also have Master's or Doctorate degree in the discipline. The reason behind the change is in consideration of differences in curricula in different places.

The bill also proposes the establishment of a veterinary professional committee that will comprise seven members with established knowledge in the area. Although the government hopes that at least half of the members will be from outside the civil service structure, this "hope" has not been stated as a requirement in the bill. The reason is that the government fears there will not be a sufficient number of veterinarians.

The bill, if passed, will come into force on Apr. 1.

FLIGHTS TO AND FROM OSAKA AND SOUTHEAST ASIA TO RESUME

LIGHTS to and from PDa Nang will resume on March 2, while the Singapore route will restart on March 23. A total of nine round-trip flights are scheduled for Southeast Asia, including Hanoi, Da Nang, Bangkok, and Singapore, which is subject to increase according to the reaction and ground support equipment capacity of the destinations, according to Air Macau.

With Taiwan reopening to Macau and Hong Kong residents, Air Macau will increase the frequencies to Taipei to one flight per week, whereas those to Kaohsiung will extend to four flights.

Routes to Osaka will resume with two flights

a week at the beginning of March, when flights to Tokyo will increase to the same frequency, as Air Macau faces the possibility of the cancellation of Japan's entry requirements for Macau and mainland visitors. Further, flights to Seoul will be increased to two per week.

It is expected that Air Macau will resume flights to almost all of its outgoing destinations after the adjustments next month.

Also, routes to and from Southeast Asia operated by various airlines are resuming. Flights between Macau and Malaysia have resumed, and direct flights to Thailand and the Philippines are expected to resume within the next two months.

Macau's international banking industry grows in 2022

THE proportion of in-L ternational business in the local banking sector rebounded in the fourth quarter (Q4) of 2022, as revealed by Monetary Authority of Macao (AMCM) statistics. At end of December 2022, the share of international assets in total banking assets increased by 0.6% to 85.3% compared to the end of September 2022, while the share of international liabilities in total banking liabilities fell by 0.5% to 81.9% in the same period, the AMCM stated in a statistical report.

According to the same report, the International Banking Assets at the end of December 2022 increased by 6.3% from the previous quarter (Q3) to MOP2,209.1 billion (USD275.1 billion).



Within this total, external assets rose by 2.5% from Q3 to MOP1,598.9 billion, while local assets in foreign currencies expanded by 17.9% to MOP610.2 billion.

As a major component of international assets, external non-bank loans decreased by 5.4% to MOP701.7 billion.

At the same time, the total international banking

liabilities also increased by 4.9% from September to MOP2,120.9 billion (USD264.1 billion). Of this total, external liabilities and local liabilities in foreign currencies grew by 0.9% quarter-to-quarter to MOP1,201.6 billion and 10.8% to MOP919.3 billion respectively.

Foreign currency deposits held by residents and the Macau government in

local banks constituted a major component of international liabilities. This type of deposit dropped by 0.3% to MOP667.2 billion at the end of 2022.

The majority of external assets and liabilities in the local banking sector were related to Asia with claims on the mainland and Hong Kong occupying, respectively, 40.4% and 24.9% of total external assets.

Claims on Portuguese-speaking countries and countries along the "Belt and Road" had shares of 0.8% and 12.4%, respectively.

As for external liabilities, Hong Kong and the mainland accounted for 41.0% and 38.2% of the total, respectively, while the Portuguese-speaking countries and countries along the "Belt and Road" represented 0.6% and 6.4%, respectively.

Visitor spending in 2022 plunges 25% to MOP18 billion

Total spending from visitors to Macau amounted to MOP18.17 billion in 2022, down 25.7% year-on-year, as the city battled with unstable border restrictions due to a series of Covid outbreaks, as recorded by the Statistics and Census Service (DSEC).

Total spending from overnight visitors (MOP14.91 billion) declined by 30.0% year-on-year, whereas that of same-day visitors (MOP3.25 billion) rose 3.7%.

Last year, the SAR saw a total of 5,700,339 visitor arrivals, down 26.0% year-on-year.

Data shows that the number of overnight visitors last year fell 32.8% to 2,484,028, while same-day visitors fell 19.8% to 3,216,311.

Per-capita spending of visitors edged up by 0.4% year-on-year to MOP3,187 in 2022, with that of overnight visitors (MOP6,004) and same-

-day visitors (MOP1,011) rising 4.1% and 29.3%, respectively.

Concerning the type of spending, per-capita spending from visitors on the category of shopping (MOP2,110) rose 2.6% year-on-year, while spending on food & beverages (MOP488) and accommodation (MOP428) decreased by 4.3% and 9.4%, respectively.

A survey conducted by Visa shows that the pandemic has changed both means of travel as well as the aims and expectations of travelers in visiting their chosen destinations.

Throughout mainland China, Hong Kong and Macau, 44% of consumers placed more emphasis on cleanliness and hygiene during travel, while 39% were interested in "wellness experiences". 32% of respondents named shopping locally as a goal, while a considerable 30% sought "once-in-a-lifetime experiences."



COVID

China says 200 million treated, pandemic 'decisively' beaten

CHINA says more than 200 million of its citizens have been diagnosed and treated for COVID-19 since it lifted strict containment measures beginning in November.

With 800,000 of the most critically ill patients having recovered, China has "decisively beaten" the pandemic, according to notes from a meeting of the ruling Communist Party's all-powerful Politburo Standing Committee presided

over by President and party leader Xi Jinping.

China enforced some of the world's most draconian lockdowns, quarantines and travel restrictions and still faces questions about the origins of the virus that was first detected in the central Chinese city of Wuhan in late 2019. Heavy-handed enforcement prompted rare anti-government protests and took a heavy toll on the world's second-largest economy.

The official Xinhua News

Agency quoted Xi as saying that policies to control the outbreak had been "entirely correct." The abrupt lifting in November and December of the "zero COVID" policy that had sought to eliminate all cases of the virus led to a surge in infections that temporarily overwhelmed hospitals.

Case numbers have since peaked and life has largely returned to normal, although international travel in and out of China has yet to return to pre-pandemic levels.

China is now transitioning to a post-pandemic stage after a fight against the outbreak that was "extraordinary in the extreme," Xinhua said.

The government will continue to "optimize and adjust prevention and control policies and measures according to the times and situations with a strong historical responsibility and strong strategic determination," Xinhua said. MDT

HONG KONG

Population drops for third year under Covid shadow

Vernment annou-**JONG** Kong's gonced yesterday that 4 the territory's population dropped for a third straight year as deaths rose during the pandemic and anti-virus measures reduced the number of arriving workers, but did not mention an exodus of residents sparked by a crackdown on the pro-democracy movement.

The city's population declined 0.9% to 7.3 million at the end of 2022 from a year earlier, according to provisional data released by the Census and Statistics Department. It said there was a net



outflow of 60,000 residents, with 21,200 new residents arriving.

For much of the pandemic, Hong Kong followed mainland China's stringent "zero COVID" strategy, deterring professionals from moving into the

international financial hub. Its population decline has been exacerbated by a growing number of young professionals leaving for Britain, the United States and other countries in response to the erosion of Hong Kong's

Western-style civil liberties after a harsh new National Security Law silenced or jailed dissidents.

The announcement gave no clue regarding how many people had left for political reasons but said there was a slight rebound in inflows near the end of last year after officials gradually relaxed anti-virus controls.

"We noticed that the population decrease in the second half of 2022 has narrowed when compared to that in the first half, reflecting that movement of the Hong Kong population has begun to resume normal gradually," the statement said.

The government predicted that factors hindering workers from moving to Hong Kong will dissipate after the resumption of restriction-free travel with mainland China and elsewhere.

Hong Kong Chief Executive John Lee has rolled out various measures aimed at attracting at least 35,000 professionals each year between 2023 and 2025. MDT/AP

TAIWAN

PARAGUAY LEADER PRAISES ISLAND AS 'LIGHTHOUSE OF DEMOCRACY'

THE outgoing president of Paraguay, whose country is one of Taiwan's few remaining diplomatic allies, spoke of his admiration for the island democracy while on a state visit to Taipei yesterday.

Mario Abdo Benitez was welcomed with an honor guard as he walked alongside Taiwan's leader Tsai Ing-wen on a red carpet in front of the Presidential House. Abdo arrived in Taiwan on Tuesday on a five-day visit

Taiwan is closely watching as Paraguay is set to hold presidential elections in which the opposition party candidate has said he would break diplomatic ties with Taiwan if elected, according to local media reports.

Since Tsai was elected in 2016, China has been on a pressure campaign to poach the island's remaining diplomatic allies. China claims self-ruled Taiwan as part of its territory and opposes any form of exchange between Taiwan and the governments of other countries. Taiwan currently has 14 diplomatic allies.

"I want to express my deepest and most sincere respect to the Taiwanese people for not giving up their brave struggle for freedom and the safeguarding of their sovereignty," Abdo said. "In the face of continued threats and the tense situation, Taiwan's people have not given up their resolution for peace, continuing to play the role of a lighthouse of democracy in the region."

Abdo also thanked Taiwan for its help during the COVID-19 pandemic and said his country's economy suffered the least of Latin American countries during the pandemic as a result of that assistance.

Tsai did not speak about the possible loss of Paraguay as a diplomatic ally, instead thanking Abdo for his visit and speaking of deepening economic cooperation between the two sides.

"I want to thank President Abdo for speaking in support of Taiwan's participation in international forums many times," said Tsai in a speech ahead of a private meeting with the Paraguayan president.

In December 2021, Taiwan lost Nicaragua as a diplomatic ally after the Central American country's president won re-election in a vote the White House said was rigged. Nicaragua then said it would officially recognize only China.

In 2022, Honduras, another Taiwan ally, also made Taiwan and China part of its presidential campaign. As a candidate, Xiomara Castro said she would switch diplomatic recognition to China if elected. But after Castro assumed power, her administration said the government would continue to maintain ties with Taiwan for now.

Though Taiwan has lost allies, it has also stepped up official exchanges with countries such as Lithuania and Slovakia, which do not formally recognize Taiwan as a country.

As part of his visit, Abdo met with Taiwan's Foreign Minister Joseph Wu and attended a conference on women's empowerment with Tsai. MDT/AP

China, Iran call on Afghanistan to end restrictions on women

HINA and Iran have urged mutual neighbor Afghanistan to end restrictions on women's work and education.

The call came in a joint statement yesterday issued at the close of a visit to Beijing by Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi during which the two sides affirmed close economic and political ties and their rejection of Western standards of human rights and democracy.

Since taking over Afghanistan in August 2021, the Taliban has banned women and girls from universities and schools after the sixth grade and forced out those in elected offices and other prominent positions.

"The two sides ... called on the Afghan rulers to form an inclusive government in which all ethnic groups and political groups actually participate, and cancel all discriminatory measures against women, ethnic minorities and other religions," the statement

said, adding that the U.S. and its NATO allies "should be responsible for the current situation in Afghanistan."

The U.S. had backed Afghanistan's elected government against the Taliban, but withdrew amid the rising costs and dwindling domestic support for a government that was unable to counter a Taliban revival.

The call for women's rights is notable coming from Iran's hardline Shiite Muslim regime, which has been challenged by months of protests sparked by the death of a young woman in police custody for allegedly violating clothing requirements.

The country's theocracy has

executed at least four men since the demonstrations began in September over the death of Mahsa Amini. All have faced internationally criticized, rapid, closed-door trials.

The bulk of the China-Iran joint statement emphasized strong political and economic ties, the quest for peace and justice in the Middle East and denuclearization in spite of Tehran's alleged drive to produce atomic weapons.

In a meeting earlier with Chinese leader Xi Jinping, Raisi expressed support for China's crackdown on democracy in Hong Kong and claim to self-ruling democratic Taiwan.

China and Iran portray themselves, alongside Moscow, as counterweights to American power, and have given tacit, and in Iran's case, material support to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

"China supports Iran in safeguarding national sovereignty" and "resisting unilateralism and bullying," Xi said in a statement carried by Chinese state TV on its

Xi and Raisi attended the signing of 20 cooperation agreements including on trade and tourism, the Chinese government announced. Those add to a 25year strategy agreement signed in 2021 to cooperate in developing oil, industry and other fields.

China is one of the biggest buyers of Iranian oil and a major source of investment.

Iran has struggled for years under trade and financial sanctions imposed by Washington and other Western governments. The U.S. government cut off Iran's access to the network that connects global banks in 2018. MDT/AP

BEIJING BLASTS US OVER RESPONSE TO CHINESE **BALLOON INCURSION**

THINA'S ceremonial par-**∪**liament has accused American lawmakers of trampling on the sovereignty of other nations after the U.S. passed a measure condemning a suspected Chinese spy balloon's intrusion into U.S. airspace.

The statement issued yesterday by the National People's Congress's Foreign Affairs Committee repeated Beijing's insistence that the balloon was an unmanned civilian weather research airship, a claim the U.S. has dismissed citing its flight route and payload of surveillance equipment.

While China at first expressed regret over the Feb. 4 incident, it has toughened its rhetoric in a further sign of how badly relations between the sides have deteriorated in recent years.

On Wednesday, the Foreign Ministry said it will take measures against U.S. entities somehow related to the downing of the balloon, without giving details.

The resolution earlier passed unanimously by the U.S. House of Representatives "deliberately exaggerated the 'China threat,'" the Foreign Relations Committee statement said.

That was "purely malicious hype and political manipulation," it said. "Some U.S. Congress politicians fanned the flames, fully exposing their sinister designs to oppose China and contain China."

"In fact, it is the United States that wantonly interferes in other countries' internal affairs, violates their sovereignty, and conducts surveillance on other countries," it said.

A range of Chinese government departments have issued daily protests over how the U.S. handled the issue, accusing Washington of overreacting and violating "the spirit of international law." Beijing has offered no details on what company or government department was responsible for the

giant balloon, the remnants of which are being sent to an FBI lab for analysis.

Along with Congress's passing of the resolution, the U.S. has sanctioned six Chinese entities it said are linked to Beijing's aerospace programs. Secretary of State Antony Blinken also canceled a visit to Beijing, putting an abrupt freeze on what some had seen as momentum for a stabilization in relations that have plunged to their lowest in decades amid disputes over trade, human rights, Taiwan and China's claim to the South China Sea.

The House resolution condemned China for a "brazen violation" of U.S. sovereignty and efforts to "deceive the international community through false claims about its intelligence collection campaigns."

U.S. officials have said China operates a fleet of such balloons, which are a relatively inexpensive and difficult-to-detect method of gathering intelligence. The U.S. government determined the balloon posed little risk to national security and allowed it to fly across the continent before bringing it down with a missile off the coast of South Carolina. MDT/AP

Ruling Taliban display rare division in public over bans

RARE public show of division within the ranks of Afghanistan's ruling Taliban emerged in recent days when Interior Minister Sirajuddin Haqqani, a powerful government figure, gave a speech seen as implicit criticism of the movement's reclusive supreme leader.

The Taliban leadership has been opaque since the former insurgents' takeover of the country in August 2021, with almost no indication of how decisions are made.

In recent months, the group's supreme leader, Hibatullah Akhundzada, has appeared to take a stronger hand in directing policy. In particular, it was on his orders that the Taliban government banned women and girls from universities and schools after the sixth grade.

The bans raised a fierce international uproar, increasing Afghanistan's isolation at a time when its economy has collapsed — and worsening a humanitarian crisis. The bans also appeared to contradict previous policies by the Taliban government.

Between the Taliban takeover until the December ban on attending universities, women had been allowed to continue their studies. Taliban officials repeatedly promised that girls would be allowed to attend secondary school, but a decision to allow them back last year was suddenly reversed.

Haqqani made his comments in a speech over the weekend to a graduation ceremony at an Islamic religious school in the eastern province of Khost.

"Monopolizing power and hurting the reputation of the entire system are not to our benefit," Haqqani said, according to video clips of the speech released on social media by his supporters. "The situation cannot be tolerated," he added.

Haqqani said now that the Taliban have taken power, "more responsibility has been placed on our shoulders and it requires patience and good behavior and engagement with the people." He said the Taliban must "soothe the wounds of the people" and act in a way that the people do not come to hate them

and religion.

Haqqani did not refer to Akhundzada, but the remarks were seen by many commenting on social media as directed at him. Haqqani also did not mention the issue of women's education, but he has said publicly in the past that women and girls should be allowed to go to school and universities.

Zabihullah Mujahed, the top spokesman for the Kabul government, said in an apparent reaction to Haqqani's comments — without naming him — that criticism is best voiced privately.

"If someone criticizes the emir, minister, or any other official, it is better — and Islamic ethics also say — that he should express his criticism directly and secretly to him," not in public, he said.

Akhundzada, an Islamic scholar, almost never appears in public and hardly ever leaves the Taliban heartland in southern Kandahar province.

He surrounds himself with other religious scholars and tribal leaders who oppose education and work for women. Only one known photo of him, years old, exists. Akhundzada came to Kabul only once since the Taliban takeover to give a speech to an assembly of pro-

-Taliban clerics, though he was not shown in media coverage at the closed event.

The Taliban have typically dealt with internal differences behind the scenes, and Haqqani's comments "are a major escalation," said Michael Kugelman, the deputy director of the Asia program and senior associate for South Asia at the Wilson Center. The Taliban leaders have the same broad vision, but "in Kandahar, they're hermits, they're not involved in the day-to-day," said Kugelman. In Kabul, they have to govern and provide services, he added.

Haqqani leads a faction of the Taliban known as the Haqqani network, built around the family of the same name centered in Khost. The network battled U.S.-led NATO troops and former Afghan government forces for years and was notorious for attacks on civilians and suicide bombings in Kabul. The U.S. government maintains a \$10 million bounty on Sirajuddin Haqqani for attacks on American troops and Afghan civilians.

His comments pointed to an apparent difference between some senior Taliban, who have had to rapidly adjust to the demands of government after two decades of fighting as insurgents.

When they took power in 2021, Taliban officials said they wanted better ties to the world. They said they would not return to the social restrictions on women or punishments, such as public lashings, that they imposed during their first time in power in the 1990s.

But over the nearly 20 months since, the Taliban have barred women from most jobs, middle school and high school as well as from parks. They've also ordered women to wear head-to-toe clothing in public.

The deputy prime minister in the Taliban government, Abdul Salam Hanafi, indirectly criticized the ban on education for women and girls in a speech in Kabul this week.

"If we don't improve the quality and quantity of the education system and do not update it, we will never succeed," he said. He added that the duty of Islamic scholars requires more than prohibiting a behavior or practice — they must also offer a solution and a path forward.

Ahmed Rashid, a veteran Lahore-based journalist who wrote several books about the Taliban, said he didn't expect change from Akhundzada and his Kandahar-based supporters. MDT/AP

1992 CANNIBAL KILLER JAILED FOR LIFE



Serial killer Jeffrey Dahmer has been sentenced to life in prison by a court in Wisconsin for murdering and dismembering 15 young men and boys.

Dahmer, 31, was unable to convince the jury that his cannibalism and necrophilia were the result of madness.

He was given 15 consecutive life sentences and will never be eligible for parole.

Dahmer's trial, which ended in Milwaukee on Saturday night, included some of the most gruesome evidence ever heard in a US courtroom.

It also became a test case of the insanity defence seldom used in America.

He has escaped the death sentence because Wisconsin is one of the few states which does not have capital punishment.

After sentence was passed, Dahmer read a statement to the court. In a calm voice he said: "I never wanted freedom. Frankly, I wanted death for myself. I knew I was sick or evil or both.

"Doctors have told me about my sickness and now I have some peace. I know how much harm I have caused. I feel so bad for what I did to those poor families."

Victims' families were in court and some lashed out at the bullet-proof screen, which was all that separated them from the man described by his own lawyer as "a steamrolling, killing machine".

Rita Isbell, sister of victim Errol Lindsey, lunged at Dahmer screaming: "You are Satan. I want to kill you."

Tears rolled down the face of Donald Bradehof, brother of another victim, as he said: "We lost the baby of our family - I hope you go to hell."

Dahmer tended to prey on young gay black men. The court was told how he drugged them with sleeping pills and practised crude lobotomies on the brains of three of them. Various body parts were found in his flat.

His lawyers argued he suffered from necrophilia, a compulsive desire to have sex with corpses. But the prosecution claimed Dahmer had chosen his victims carefully and had not intended to kill them all

There has been criticism of the Milwaukee police for failing to realise there was a serial killer operating in the city.

In context

Dahmer was convicted of 15 murders but confessed to 17 killings.

He became increasingly religious in prison and was baptised.

On 28 November 1994 he was murdered by a fellow inmate, who bludgeoned him to death with a metal bar.

His killer Christopher Scarver was a black man with a diagnosed mental illness, who was later convicted of the murder.

Before his death Dahmer talked to NBC about religion.

The interview - broadcast the day after his murder - revealed how he had previously believed he was accountable to no-one for his behaviour but since finding Christianity that had changed.

In his will, Dahmer requested no funeral or service of any kind.







RAQUEL Welch, whose emergence from the sea in a skimpy, furry bikini in the film "One Million Years B.C." would propel her to international sex symbol status throughout the 1960s and '70s, has died. She was 82.

Welch died yesterday [Macau time] after a brief illness, according to her agent, Stephen LaManna of the talent agency Innovative Artists.

Welch's breakthrough came in 1966's campy prehistoric flick "One Million Years B.C.," despite having a grand total of three lines. Clad in a brown doeskin bikini, she successfully evaded pterodactyls but not the notice of the public.

"I just thought it was a goofy dinosaur epic we'd be able to sweep under the carpet one day," she told The Associated Press in 1981. "Wrong. It turned out that I was the Bo Derek of the season, the lady in the loin cloth about whom everyone said, 'My God, what a bod' and they expected to disappear overnight."

She did not, playing Lust for the comedy team of Peter Cook and Dudley Moore in their film "Bedazzled" in 1967 and playing a secret agent in the sexy spy

spoof "Fathom" that same year.

Her curves and beauty captured pop culture attention, with Playboy crowning her the "most desired woman" of the '70s, despite never being completely naked in the magazine. In 2013, she graced the No. 2 spot on Men's Health's "Hottest Women of All Time" list. In the

film "The Shawshank Redemption," a poster of Welch covers an escape tunnel — the last of three that character Andy Dufresne (Tim Robbins) used after Rita Hayworth and Marilyn Monroe.

Admirers took to Twitter to mourn the star, including TV host Rosie O'Donnell, actor Chris Meloni and writer-director Paul Feig, who worked with Welch on "Sabrina the Teenage Witch" and called her "Kind, funny and a true superstar whom I was pretty much in love with for most of my childhood. We've lost a true icon."

In addition to acting, Welch was a singer and dancer. She

surprised many critics — and won positive reviews — when she starred in the 1981 musical "Woman of the Year" on Broadway, replacing a vacationing Lauren Bacall. She returned to the Great White Way in 1997 in "Victor/Victoria."

She knew that some people didn't take her seriously because of her glamorous image. "I'm not Penny Marshall or Barbra Streisand," she told the AP in 1993. "They'll say, 'Raquel Welch wants to direct? Give me a break."

Welch was born Jo-Raquel Tejada in Chicago and raised in La Jolla, California. (The Jo in her name was from her mother, Josephine). Welch was a divorced mother when she met ex-actor turned press agent, Patrick Curtis.

"The irony of it all is that even though people thought of me as a sex symbol, in reality I was a single mother of two small children!" she wrote in her autobiography, "Raquel: Beyond the Cleavage."

Curtis became her manager and second husband and helped shape her into a glamor-girl with hundreds of magazine covers and a string of movies, plus exercise videos and books like "The Raquel Welch Total Beauty and Fitness Program." MDT/AP



CHINA'S ECONOMY AND FOREIGN TRADE IN 2023

China's relevance in international trade has been steadily increasing. In addition to its major import position in commodities, the increase in disposable income, especially of the urban middle class, has positioned China as an important market for exporters of consumer and industrial goods. On the other hand, China's export sector has also grown significantly, employing circa 180 million people - one quarter of the labor force of urban China.

In 2022, China's exports rose by 7% to a new high of \$3.59 trillion, beating the 2021 record of \$3.36 trillion, according to data released recently by China's General Administration of Customs. Imports increased by 1.1% in 2022. That translated into an annual trade surplus of \$877.6 billion, surpassing the previous high of \$676.43 billion in 2021. With China benefiting from a record trade balance surplus, net exports are expected to have contributed one third (+1%) to China's GDP growth in 2022.

This record surplus in China's trade balance is due to strong exports that have propelled the country's economy for most of the year. But last quarter, the situation was inverted; exports shrank by 9.9% in December, following an 8.7% drop in November, according to recent customs data. This drop (accompanied by a similar decline in imports) was the worst since February 2020. This trend is expected to continue into 2023. Not only is external demand likely to remain weak, but problems in exporting sectors arising from successive waves of covid infections are also likely to have a major impact on the output of many exporting companies. The perceived risks of a recession or a major global slowdown, especially in the EU and the US, exacerbate the trend. Therefore, it is unlikely that China will be able to maintain a trade balance surplus as high as 2022. Admittedly, there are very uncertain exogenous variables (e.g. the price of oil). But most likely, China's export growth will continue to slow and net exports will contribute to Chinese GDP growth by a mere +0.5-1%.

In short, the export sector cannot be expected to be the main growth factor for the Chinese economy this year. Maintaining the existing penetration or having a small reduction in the main destination markets of Chinese products would still be a good result. And a reduced demand for Chinese products in the main destination markets may also have repercussions on (un)employment in the companies in this sector.

Nevertheless, both the central and provincial governments in China seem committed to prioritizing GDP growth above 5% in 2023. For this to happen, the Chinese government is likely to adopt measures to increase domestic demand - including more public spending - and suspend restrictive policies on real estate, technology, and income redistribution. Given the international relevance of the Chinese economy, such policies are especially important for other economic blocs, such as the EU, to also achieve higher

JUDGE SLAPS \$335K PENALTY ON RONALDO ACCUSER'S VEGAS LAWYER

A Las Vegas lawyer has been hit with a \$335,000 penalty for pressing a bid in U.S. courts to force Cristiano Ronaldo to pay millions of dollars more than the \$375,000 in hush money he paid to a Nevada woman who claimed the international soccer star raped her in Las Vegas in 2009.

"I find that Ronaldo would not have incurred a majority of the fees and costs that he spent on this litigation absent plaintiff's counsel's bad faith," U.S. District Judge Jennifer Dorsey said in a scathing, 18page ruling.

The judge in Las Vegas held plaintiff Kathryn Mayorga's attorney, Les-

lie Mark Stovall, personally responsible for paying Ronaldo's attorneys led by Peter Christiansen and Kendelee Works.

Stovall and associates in the case, Ross Moynihan and Larissa Drohobyczer, did not immediately respond yesterday [Macau time] to email and telephone messages about the ruling issued earlier this week. In a related case, a Nevada state court judge who nearly made long-

-sealed and long-fought documents public by mistake in August rejected Stovalls bid for a court order to unseal crucial documents.

REVELERS CELEBRATE STREET CARNIVAL ACROSS GERMAN RHINELAND

TENS of thousands of revelers danced in the streets of Cologne, Duesseldorf. Bonn and other cities and towns across the Rhineland yesterday as they celebrated the traditional start of Carnival in Germany.

Dressed up in bright colors and creative costumes, they sang loudly and swayed to familiar tunes of brass bands and folklore music, and drank lots of beer.

It is the first time since the start of the pandemic that Carnival is being celebrated in Germany without any coronavirus restrictions.

The first day of Carnival in Germany is also traditionally dedicated to women taking over the power in city halls across the

Rhineland for a day. They symbolically take away the keys from the - mostly male - mayors, and cut off men's ties and shoelaces in return for kisses.

In Duesseldorf, costumed elderly women known as Moehnen stormed city hall at 11:11 a.m, German news agency dpa reported.

"For two years you had your peace, but today it's all about women power. We want the power," shouted Carnival princess Uasa Maisch. "We'll cut off your ties. You're in for it. We want in."

In Cologne alone, tens of thousands of people were expected for the festivities. Police deployed more than 2,000 officers, and the interior minister of North Rhine-Westphalia, where Cologne is located, warned revelers not to drink too much "Koelsch" — the typical, honey-colored beer of Cologne.

"Everyone should know when there's been enough Koelsch," Herbert Reul told Cologne daily paper Koelner Stadt-Anzeiger.

At the same time, the minister acknowledged that "it's all the more important that there are these days when you can switch off for a few hours and put your worries aside" when concern about war and inflation are on many people's minds most of the time.

Around noontime, Cologne police blocked off the Zuelpicher Viertel neighborhood because it was overflowing with people, dpa reported. No more revelers were allowed to enter the district close to the city's main university that's dotted with many popular bars and pubs.



Philippines

A strong earthquake rocked a central Philippine province yesterday, sending people out of their homes at night, prompting dozens of patients to be evacuated from a hospital and causing minor damage to a government coliseum and business establishments, officials said. There were no immediate reports of injuries or major damage from the magnitude 6 quake.



Kosovo is celebrating 15 years of independence with a month of celebrations starting today while still facing serious challenges with Serbia, which refuses to recognize the autonomy of its former province.
