Shanxi, a major coalproducing region.



THE draft plan for a land plot in Praia Grande has returned for further review as six Urban Planning Committee (CPU) members and four members of the public expressed opposing opinions.

These opinions concerned the permitted use of the land. The Urban Construction Bureau (DSSCU), the authority that issues draft development plans, has designated the land to be used for commercial purposes C1 and C2, pursuant to legal definitions.

However, at a recent CPU meeting, six members expressed different opinions. In addition to the four opinions from the public received prior to the meeting, DSS-CU director and CPU president Lai Weng Leong proposed to withdraw the plan for further review.

The four opinions from the public were drafted in similar fashion. All of them proposed that the use of the land be expanded to allow for "tourism and entertainment."

Their reasons provided echo the government's calls to develop tourism and support economic progress. The public opinions added that there are several three to four-star hotels in the neighborhood, proving that the expansion of use will not have significant impact on the planning and general environment of the area. The land plot's close proximity to

the tourism area makes it suitable for hotel use, they added.

Based on the land plot's location in between Avenida de Praia Grande and Rua de Formosa and the fact that the latter is filled with residential buildings, some members questioned whether, should other land plots in that area be

redeveloped in the future, they would be allowed for commercial use only.

In response, Leong Io Hong, DSSCU department head for urban planning, pointed out that land for commercial use is scarce as per the Master Urban Plan. Identifying this land plot for com-

mercial use was done in consideration of the broader social development in the area. In addition, he emphasized the need for a wider range of offerings given that the area is densely populated with residential buildings.

Meanwhile, the lack of commentary on preservation from the Cultural Affairs Bureau (IC), appeared to imply that the building on No 106 Rua das Estalagens, built in the early 20th century, may be dismantled.

IC official Sou Kin Meng explained that the quality of the building does not meet the legal threshold for heritage recognition.

Survey reveals secondary students' lower happiness scores

THE Happiness Score calculated by a recent survey has shown that local secondary school students are not happy with their lives, with a score of 2.97 out of 5 points.

The survey was conducted via questionnaires. A total of 2,015 questionnaires were issued, with 1,655 valid responses received. Among responding students, 725 were boys and 930 were girls. Students across varying educational levels were surveyed, with percentages ranging from 11% in Form 6 to 22% in Form 5. The survey was commissioned by the General Association of Chinese Students of Macao and carried out by the University of Saint Joseph (USJ).

The Happiness Score was calculated through five statements measuring students' reported feelings of happiness or satisfaction. Two statements received below-average scores, i.e. 3 points. Lower scores indicated lesser agreement with the statements. The two statements that received below-average scores were: "My current life is generally close to my ideals" and "I would want to change almost nothing if I had the chance to relive my life." The former statement had an average score of 2.74, and the latter had a score of 2.49.

The qualitative section of the survey also revealed that relationships were ranked as the most stressful aspect of life by responding students. They expressed concerns about their abilities relative to their peers, and worried that they lacked common topics for conversations with friends.

Nonetheless, the qualitative response section also discovered that respondents usually sought emotional support from their friends. As such, the research team likened friendship to a two--sided coin.

The association urged parents and teachers to foster confidence in children and pupils, and to play a supporting role in helping students face challenges rather than imposing undue pressure due to concerns about potential failures. AL

State secret and CE election laws pass unchallenged

HE bills on the state secret and election for the Chief Executive (CE) passed unanimously and unchallenged yesterday in their final reading at the Legislative Assembly.

The two bills passed with minimal commentary from lawmakers, who opted to commend the bills and their anticipated benefits to Macau's governance.

The first bill relates to the National Security Law, and includes provisions concerning potential state secrets, as well as measures to ensure confidentiality and to establish penalties for potential breaches.

This law will come into effect on June 1 next year and only prompted brief comments on the systems used to classify different levels of confidentiality. Some lawmakers called for clearer disclosure on the symbols used to classify confidential information to avoid confusion.

The Secretary for Administration and Justice, André Cheong, said that such symbols and their meaning will be officially announced via a publication in the government's official gazette, following further directives from the CE.

He also explained that the legal provisions would govern situations where

state secrets were at risk of being exposed due to the person in possession of such secrets being involved in legal procedures.

Also approved in the same plenary session, the CE Election Law will also take effect next year. As intended since its inception the upcoming procedures for the election of a new CE late next year will fall under the new provisions. These revisions aim to ensure a higher degree of patriotism from potential candidates as well as for voting members of the restricted college involved in the election.

Cheong also noted that the primary focus of the revised law is to tighten regulation around the candidate qualifications and legalize the requirements of those aspiring to be in a CE role.

Among the differences to the current law is the establishment that the National Security Commission will be responsible for reviewing all candidates' qualifications. If, during this review, the Commission identifies evidence of certain facts or behaviors that prove, in the Commission's opinion, that the candidate is not loyal to the People's Republic of China and the Macau Special Administrative Region, this candidate will be considered ineligible.

As previously reported, decisions made by the Commission regarding candidate eligibility are not subject to objection or judicial appeal.

LAWMAKERS AGENDA

NICK LEI CRITICIZES LRT OPERATION, CLAIMS MOST OF THE WORK IS YET TO BE DONE

Lawmaker Nick Lei Etook the opportunity during the period before the agenda of Wednesday's session at the Legislative Assembly (AL) to criticize the "lack of proactivity" from the government in solving the problems related to the Light Rapid Transit (LRT).

Following the recent opening of the Barra Station and the extension of the Taipa line to the Peninsula, Lei listed several concerns that in his opinion, are contributing to the persistent inefficiency of the public transport system.

"Although the extension of the [Taipa] line makes it easier for residents to travel, unresolved problems persist even after this new station comes into operation. For example, at the moment, it is only possible to use the Macau Pass and the LRT Pass to enter the stations through access channels [gates]. It is not possible to use other means of electronic payment, and the Macau Pass top-up service is not available at the stations. This inconveniences the public and fails to meet societal expectations about the system," Lei said.

Lei added, "Furthermore, the signage at Barra Station is not clear. There are no mobile phone applications to check the frequency of the trains in real time, and the content displayed on



the information screen in the train is rudimentary."

Lei also complained about the lack of Wi-Fi networks at the stations and the absence of interconnectivity between the LRT and other public transport methods such as buses.

The same lawmaker said, "All these factors will impact the public's experience and willingness to use the LRT."

In a recent report by the Times, some of the aspects mentioned by Lei were also noted by the Times, which reported difficulties in using the Macau Pass for direct access to the trains via the gates.

The same report reiterated concerns that information screens within the train carriages are basic and "old-fashioned," only displaying the name of the next station. This is in contrast to the bus system, where detailed information on which

stops to use to access popular tourist spots, integrated resorts and other venues of interest is displayed.

Lei also remarked that according to the 2022 Annual Report of the LRT, only 0.22% (MOP1.5 million) of LRT receipts resulted from operations (i.e. tickets sold), while 96.8% of these receipts came directly from government injections of funds, representing a significant burden on the public purse.

Lei expressed the hope that the link to Barra, an area rich in tourist attractions, would ensure greater utilization and update of the LRT system, particularly by visitors. Notwithstanding this, the lawmaker called on the government to improve itineraries and pedestrian routes in the area to allow the best possible experience for those using the LRT.

MACAU-HKIA FERRIES TO RELOCATE TO **MACAU TERMINAL**

The Macau berthing point for the ferry services between Macau and the Hong Kong airport will be relocated to the Macau Ferry Terminal from today, the government announced yesterday in a statement. The services will be available on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Fridays, offering two departures per day from each terminal. Departure times are typically scheduled for 10:45 a.m. from Macau and 12:30 a.m. from Hong Kong. However, passengers are advised to confirm the schedule with the ferry operator before their trips.

GOV'T TO HOST **COMPETITION TO** NAME THE NEW HARBOR BRIDGE

Details will be announced at 11 a.m. today regarding a competition to determine the naming right of the new Macau-Taipa Bridge, connecting New Urban Zone A with Pak On, the Public Works Bureau (DSOP) announced yesterday. The government has so far been referring to the bridge as the Fourth Macau-Taipa Connection. A social media page has speculated on potential names for the new bridge, based on existing bridge-naming conventions. Proposed names so far have included Eastern Bridge, Pak On Bridge, New Urban Zone Bridge or Shizimen Bridge, among others.

CONTACTLESS PAYMENT FOR HK MTR RIDES FROM DEC. 23

Contactless bank card payment for MTR in Hong Kong rides will be launched in phases from Dec. 23, MTR Corporation announced. Passengers will initially be able to use the new service using Visa at designated gates. Additional bank cards will be accepted for payment in the third quarter of 2024. The corporation also aims to upgrade the entry/exit gates of the Airport Express and launch contactless bank card payment by 2026 at the earliest. The entire asset renewal plan for the automatic fare collection system is expected to be completed in 2028.

CATALOG ON CHINA AND EUROPE TO LAUNCH TODAY

A catalog titled "China seen from Europe, 16th-19th centuries" will be launched today in Lisbon, Portugal. The catalog features Portuguese cartography and travel literature, which played an important role in disseminating a fresh image of China across various parts of Europe. An exhibition accompanying the catalog kicked off late last month and will run until March 2, 2024. Through this exhibition, which encompasses maps and itineraries, and literary works, as well as art and digital images, the public can trace some of the most important moments in the European construction of the Chinese image

Ma lo Fong calls for gov't to unveil details on the 250,000 'gifts' plan to benefit SMEs

AWMAKER Ma Io LFong is concerned about the sustainability of local Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs), which he said are still struggling to recover from the pandemic.

In a spoken inquiry delivered at the Legislative Assembly (AL) on Wednesday before the agenda, Ma said that SMEs still have a long way to go to recover from the lasting damage caused by the pandemic, and urged the government to extend support measures for SMEs.

PEKING OPERA: SCHOOL CURRICULA SHOULD INCLUDE EDUCATION IN PLAYS AND DRAMAS

TWO major Peking Opera ac-**L** tors assured the press yesterday that when young people are introduced to Peking opera, they will gain a deeper understanding of and attraction to this art form.

On tour in Macau, two leading Peking Opera actors - Yu Kuizhi and Li Shengsu - both leaders at the China National Peking Opera Company, met with the press yesterday despite a busy schedule that included visits to local schools.

Yu said that on Wednesday, they visited the Tong Sin Tong Secondary School and yesterday afternoon, they were set to visit the Sam Yuk School.

Yu added that many students fell in love with the art form after close engagement with it. Li added that school visits often involved applying traditional make-up on the students and transforming them into various roles.

Yu disclosed that some students expressed an interest in attending shows after school visits. When students embraced Peking opera,



they became more receptive to this classic art form. Li suggested that nurturing a seed of interest in students' hearts is crucial for the regeneration of Peking opera.

The Company conducts 40 to 45 campus visits each year and currently comprises about 70% of members born in the third millennium, according to Yu, who

explained that the Company is bringing the art forward to new generations.

Regarding the preservation of the artform, Yu suggested that school curricula should include education in plays and dramas, including all forms of opera across China. This is the fifth year and marks the fourth time that the

Newest, bluest resort on Las Vegas Strip aims to bring Miami Beach vibe to southern Nevada

developer's drive to open a Las Vegas Strip resort with a vibe echoing Miami Beach's venerable Fontaine-bleau reaches reality this week, with the opening of a 67-story hotel-casino tower that became famous as it sat unfinished for more than a decade.

"Bringing Fontainebleau Las Vegas to life has been an extraordinary journey," said Jeffrey Soffer, who started the project, lost it and reacquired it to finish it. "Opening a resort of this size and scope is a once-in-a-lifetime experience."

The Fontainebleau is the tallest, newest and bluest hotel in southern Nevada's glittery resort corridor. At \$3.7 billion, it's second in cost to the \$4.3 billion, 66-story Resorts World that opened in June 2021 a short walk down Las Vegas Boulevard.

The name of the 3,644room Fontainebleau recalls Miami Beach's icon among destination resorts, which Soffer's family acquired in 2005. But the project in the Mojave Desert has its own lore about starts, stops and changing ownership since work began in 2007.

Soffer, the Miami-based chairman of Fontainebleau Development, lost funding during the Great Recession and walked away from the project in 2009 with the building about 70% complete.

Various new owners stepped in, including famous financier Carl Icahn and New York developer Steven Witkoff. The latter announced plans in 2018 to redesign and rename the resort The Drew, but progress stalled again during the pandemic.

Meanwhile, sitting idle, the hulking shell of a building with an incomplete street-front facade was occasionally used by area firefighters for high-rise rescue training. Last July, with work progressing toward opening, a smoky rooftop fire raised alarm but caused little damage.

Soffer and Fontainebleau Development reacquired the project in 2021 and partnered with Koch Real Estate Investments to finance and finish it.

He called completion "the fulfillment of a longheld dream and a testament to the spirit of our brand, which has stood for seven decades."

The resort that opened to guests and gamblers just before yesterday [Macau time] includes a bowties theme that is an homage to the standard neckwear of Morris Lapidus, architect of the Miami resort that opened in 1954.

"Art, architecture, and design are key components of our Fontaine-bleau culture and guest experience," Brett Mufson, Fontainebleau Development president, said in a statement ahead of the opening.

Mark Tricano, Fontainebleau Las Vegas president, told state gambling regulators last month that the resort will employ more than 7,000 workers. The property has 1,300 slot machines, 128 gambling tables and more

than 36 bars and restaurants — some featuring chefs with Miami roots. Officials said hotel room rates for the opening started around \$300 nightly.

The structure is the tallest occupiable building in Nevada and second-tallest in Las Vegas, behind the nearby Strat tower observation deck at 1,149 feet (350 meters).

The Fontainebleau was built on the site of the El Rancho hotel, which dated to 1948 and was imploded in 2000 after Soffer and condominium developer Turnberry Associates bought it. Plans to build a British-themed hotel-casino hotel with Tower of London and Buckingham Palace replicas were shelved after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks.

Fontainebleau is adjacent to the newest section of the Las Vegas Convention Center, a \$1 billion expanse that opened in January 2021, and has a down-the-Strip view of the brightly lit Sphere concert and entertainment venue that opened in September. MDT/AP



A LEADER OF NATIONALIST PARTY VISITS CHINA AS TAIWAN'S ELECTION LOOMS

A leader of Taiwan's main before the self-governing island holds elections for its leader and the legislature under pressure from Beijing.

In a news release yesterday, the party — also known as the Kuomintang or KMT — said vice chair Andrew Hsia and his delegation departed for China on Wednesday at the invitation of Taiwanese businesspeople. It called the trip a mission to maintain contacts and contribute to "peace, stability and prosperity between the two sides."

Though the party said the invitation was accepted in October, the visit comes at a sensitive time as the Nationalists seek to regain the executive and the legislative bodies from the ruling Democratic Progressive Party, which has been shunned by China for its insistence that Taiwan "is an independent country."

Taiwan is part of China's territory, to be brought under Beijing's control by military force if necessary. The Nationalists ruled Taiwan under martial law for almost four decades after fleeing to the island amid the Communist takeover of mainland China in 1949 and formally agree with Beijing that both sides are part of a single Chinese nation.

Most surveys show the party's ticket of former national police chief Hou You-yi and his running mate, ex-legislator Jaw Shaw-kong, are well behind the DPP's William Lai, currently No. 2, and Bi-khim Hsiao, Taiwan's former representative to the United States. That appears to reflect the prevailing sentiment among Taiwanese of maintaining their current status, even while maintaining close economic ties with China.

On Wednesday, China's Taiwan

Affairs Office denounced Lai as a "troublemaker" and "war-maker." Spokesperson Zhu Fenglian said Taiwanese should reject independence "for the sake of their peace, stability and well-being."

In its statement, the Nationalist Party said it is committed to Taiwan's security and democracy, and to peace and stability between the two sides of the Taiwan Strait. It accused the DPP of generating "fake news" concerning contacts between Nationalist officials and the ruling Chinese

Communist Party, saying that was an attempt to smear a "normal and appropriate agenda to conduct exchanges on the mainland to serve Taiwan compatriots and Taiwan businesspeople."

The statement said Taiwanese on the mainland needed particular care "at a time of heightened tensions between the U.S. and Beijing authorities," and leaders must maintain channels of communication.

That appeared to cast Hsia in the role of go-between, although there was no indication he had been entrusted with carrying any specific messages to the Chinese authorities. The statement did not say whether Hsia would be meeting any high-ranking Chinese officials.

Contacts between Taiwan politicians and China have come under particular scrutiny in the run-up to the election amid concerns Beijing will seek to "influence the vote by offering favors and spreading disinformation." Prosecutors have been looking into trips to China by grassroots ward chiefs during which their expenses were allegedly covered by the Chinese government, saying that is part of a long-term "united front" strategy of steering votes toward pro-unification politicians.

The Nationalists said Hsia was due to visit cities including Chengdu, Nanchang, Zhongshan, Xiamen, and Chongqing on what it termed a listening tour.

It's at least his second trip to China in 2023; a visit in February included a meeting with the head of China's Taiwan Affairs Office, Song Tao.

Since leader Tsai Ing-wen first took office in 2016, China has refused all contact with Taiwan's government over her refusal to recognize the "One China" principle embodied in an earlier agreement brokered by the Nationalists and mainland Communists known as the "92 Consensus."

The vast majority of Taiwan's 23 million people support the current status quo. Tsai, who is limited to two four-year terms, says there is no need to make a formal declaration that would likely spark a military response from China. MDT/AP

World Bank forecast economy to slow sharply in 2024

CHINA'S economy will slow next year, with annual growth falling to 4.5% from 5.2% this year despite a recent recovery spurred by investments in factories and construction and in demand for services, the World Bank said in a report issued yesterday.

The report said the recovery of the world's second-largest economy from setbacks of the COVID-19 pandemic, among other shocks, remains "fragile," dogged by weakness in the property sector and in global demand for China's exports, high debt levels and wavering consumer confidence.

The estimate that growth would be around 5% this year but then fall in



coming months was in line with other forecasts. Growth is expected to slow further in 2025, to 4.3% from 4.5% next year, the

World Bank said.

The economy has yoyoed in the past few years, with growth ranging from 2.2% in 2020 to 8.4%

in 2021 and 3% last year. Stringent limits on travel and other activities during the pandemic hit manufacturing and transport. Job losses due to those disruptions and to a crackdown on the technology sector, combined with a downturn in the property industry, have led many Chinese to tighten their purse strings.

Most of the jobs created during China's recovery have been low-skilled work in service industries with low pay, it noted. Chinese also are cautious given the threadbare nature of social safety nets and the fact that the population is rapidly aging, putting a heavier burden for supporting elders on younger generations.

The report highlights the need for China to pursue broad structural reforms and said moves by the central government to take on the burden of supporting cash-strapped local governments also would help improve confidence in the economy.

China's leaders addressed such issues in their annual Central Economic Work Conference earlier this week, which set priorities for the coming year, but state media reports on the gathering did not provide specifics of policies.

Real estate investment has fallen by 18% in the past two years and more needs to be done to resolve hundreds of billions of dollars in unpaid debts of overextended property developers, the report said.

It said the value of new property sales fell 5% in January-October from a year earlier while new property starts dropped more than 25%. The slowdown was worst in smaller cities that account for about 80% of the market in the country of 1.4 billion people.

Some of that weakness has been offset by strong investment in manufacturing, especially in areas such as electric vehicles and batteries and other renewable energy technologies and in strategically important areas such as computer chips that are receiving strong government support. MDT/AP

Yellen says the Trump administration's policies left the US more vulnerable

Janet Yellen says former President Donald Trump's policies toward China left America "more vulnerable and more isolated" in the global economy, a rare jab by her at the front-runner for the Republican presidential nomination.

Yellen, in prepared remarks to be delivered at a U.S.-China Business Council event today [Macau time], says the Trump administration "failed to make investments at home in critical areas like infrastructure and advanced technology, while also neglecting relationships with our partners and allies that had been forged and strengthened over decades."

Her comments come as the U.S. rebuilds its relationship with the Asian superpower, including a November meeting between U.S. President Joe Biden and Chinese President Xi Jinping in San Fran-

cisco. The two nations agreed to curb the production of illicit fentanyl, a deadly component of drugs sold in the United States, and agreed to resume military-to-military communications.

Yellen, who rarely comments on the previous administration's approach on trade, said Trump-era policies on China "left America more vulnerable and more isolated in a competitive global economy that demands that nations take exactly the opposite approach."

"It damaged our global stan-

ding and meant significant missed economic opportunities for American firms and workers," she says.

In her speech, previewed for the press ahead of the event, Yellen highlights the Biden administration's strategy of strengthening relationships with like-minded nations through "friend shoring" with South Korea, Vietnam, Japan, India and Indonesia.

"Over the past three years, the Biden administration has course-corrected," she says. "We're investing at home through President Biden's Investing in America agenda," citing new laws on infrastructure, climate and semiconductors, among others.

The Biden administration has, however, kept in place some major Trump-era policies that are punishing to China, including tariffs on select Chinese goods imported into the United States.

In an interview with The Wall Street Journal in May, Yellen said the U.S. wouldn't likely lower the tariffs.

"I can imagine some adjustments taking place to rationalize the tariff structure, but my sense is the general feeling in the administration is that it's not appropriate to lower the tariffs," she said.

In addition, Biden signed an executive order over the summer designed to regulate and block high-tech U.S.-based investments going toward China, a move his Democratic administration said is based on protecting national security. And in 2022, the U.S. mo-

ved to block exports of advanced computer chips to China.

Eswar Prasad, a Cornell trade policy professor, said there are major differences between the way the two administrations have approached the U.S-China economic relationship.

"The Biden administration has maintained a tough but constructive approach toward China, prioritizing national security considerations but also seeking avenues of cooperation and progress in areas with mutual benefits," Prasad said. "The Trump administration took a more hostile and aggressive approach that was not tempered by a recognition of shared interests between the two countries."

Goods and services traded between the two nations totaled a massive \$758.4 billion in 2022, according to the U.S. Trade Representative. However, Chinese investment in the U.S. is decreasing, to \$28.7 billion in 2022, down 7.2% from the prior year. MDT/AP

ELECTED PROGRESSIVE LAWMAKER SENTENCED TO SIX YEARS FOR DEFAMING THE MONARCHY

Acourt in Thailand convicted and sentenced a recently elected lawmaker this week to six years in prison for defaming the monarchy under a controversial law that guards the royal institution.

Human Rights Watch decried the ruling, saying it "violated her rights to freedom of expression protected under international human rights law."

Rukchanok Srinork arrived for her court hearing in the capital, Bangkok, as her fellow lawmakers were convening in Parliament.

"I submitted a request to postpone (the hearing) because today the new parliament convenes for its first session, but the court refused. So I came to hear the verdict," she told reporters, standing next to her party leader who was there to lend support.

She was charged over two posts she allegedly shared two years ago on X, the social media platform then known as Twitter. One tweet reportedly defamed

the monarchy over links to a coronavirus vaccine and an anti-monarchy quote by 18th-century French philosopher Denis Diderot was allegedly retweeted.

Rukchanok was sentenced to three years on each count under Article 112 of Thailand's Criminal Code, known as lese majeste, which protects the monarchy. She was also convicted under the Computer Crime Act, whose broad provisions covering online activities have been criticized as a threat to freedom of expression.

Late Wednesday, the court granted her release on bail of 500,000 baht (\$14,200). If it had been denied, she would have lost her lawmaker status immediately.

The parliamentarian denied she posted the tweets, calling the case against her "weak." The plaintiff reportedly provided screenshots of the posts, but the police couldn't find the links.

Rukchanok, 29, won a seat in May's general election, part of a surprise victory for the progressive Move Forward Party that shook Thai politics. The win did not translate into power due to the party being ultimately out-maneuvered by influential conservative forces. She was initially a defender of the conservative establishment before switching sides and joining the progressive movement.

"The prosecution of an opposition member of parliament for two tweets is not only an appalling violation of free expression, but sends a chilling message to other outspoken opposition party members to

keep silent," Elaine Pearson, Asia director at Human Rights Watch, said Thursday in an emailed statement. "The Thai authorities should quash this sentence, and cease prosecuting other cases under the lese majeste law."

Critics say the lese majeste law is often used to suppress political dissent. The law makes insulting the monarch, his immediate family and the regent punishable by up to 15 years in iail

The monarchy and the laws that protect it have come under pressure in recent years. In 2020, tens of thousands of predominantly young people marched in several Thai cities, demanding constitutional reform and the abolition of the law against royal defamation. The government's response was an unprecedented slew of prosecutions.

The advocacy group Thai Lawyers for Human Rights says that since early 2020, more than 200 people — many of them student activists — have been charged with violating Article 112. MDT/AP

Japan, UK and Italy formally establish a joint body to develop a new fighter jet

HE defense ministers of Japan, Britain and Italy signed an agreement yesterday to establish a joint organization to develop a new advanced jet fighter, as the countries push to strengthen their cooperation in the face of growing threats from China, Russia and North Korea.

The three countries had agreed last year to merge earlier individual plans — for Japan's Mitsubishi F-X to succeed the retiring F-2s developed with the United States and Britain's Tempest – to produce the new combat aircraft for deployment in 2035.

Japan, which is rapidly building up its military.

Defense Minister Minoru Kihara said at a joint news conference with his British and Italian counterparts, Grant Shapps and Guido Crosett, that co-developing a high-performance fighter aircraft is "indispensable to securing air superiority and enabling effective deterrence" at a time that Japan faces an increasingly severe security environment.

Kihara said no individual nation can defend itself today, adding that securing the technology

and funding to develop an advanced fighter jet involves large risks. He said the joint trilateral Global Combat Air Program is a "historic program" enabling the countries to work together to create a new fighter jet while reducing risks.

Shapps said the joint project will develop cutting-edge technology as well as "a new era of prosperity" involving thousands of people working on the project. "It will strengthen our collective security," he said. "The risks and problems from Europe to Indo-Pacific are clear for all to see."

Under the plan, a joint body called the GCAP International Government Organization will manage the private sector joint venture — which includes Japan's Mitsubishi Heavy, Britain's BAE Systems PLC and Italy's Leonardo — to oversee the aircraft's development. The organization, which will be staffed by several hundred people from the three countries, is tasked with distributing work in different areas, such as the engine and avionics.

The organization will be headquartered in Britain and headed by a Japanese official, and the joint venture will be led by an Italian representative, Kihara said. The top posts will rotate every few years, Japanese defense officials said.

The project, however, hinges on Japan easing its postwar ban on exporting jointly developed lethal weapons to third countries. It said before yesterday's signing it was working to do so, but the process has been delayed.

Shapps said he expected Japan would approve the changes as soon as possible.

"We are working within the

three of us. It needs updating. Otherwise, who will be able to take the project forward at all?" he said. "We couldn't live with this program without updating those principles of yours. So, clearly that time is coming now."

Japan is moving ahead despite delayed approval at home in easing its current policy that bans the export of lethal weapons to a third country. The restriction under Japan's postwar pacifist Constitution does not allow the country to sell a jointly developed fighter jet and possibly complicates the project, since Britain and Italy hope to be able to sell the new aircraft.

A Japanese government panel has been discussing the easing of military sales and has agreed to relax restrictions on the transfer of licensed technology and equipment. But it recently postponed a decision on easing the policy for the joint fighter jet until early next year.

Japanese defense officials refused to discuss how the situation would affect the joint project.

The project is the first time that Japan will participate in a multinational organization to jointly develop new military equipment. MDT/AP

Editor says authorities arrested two local journalists from online news service

MYANMAR'S military government has arrested two journalists with a local online news service, their editor said this week, in its latest crackdown on media freedom since seizing power nearly three years ago.

The chief editor of Dawei Watch, who spoke on condition of anonymity for fear of reprisals from authorities, told The Associated Press that Aung San Oo and Myo Myint Oo were arrested late Monday at their homes in the coastal town of Myeik. The town is about 560 kilometers south of Yangon, the country's biggest city.

The editor said they were arrested three days after re-

turning home from hiding and that security forces told family members they were arrested for reports they had filed. The computers and mobile phones of the reporters and their family members were confiscated by police, and the journalists are being held in an interrogation camp, the editor said.

Dawei Watch mostly covers news in southern Myanmar.

"Journalists are writing the news reports and producing it in line with journalism ethics. Writing reports is not a crime," the editor said. "Arresting, interrogating, and taking actions against the journalists in the same manner as done to people who committed crimes should not

be allowed. So I want to say: Release the detained journalists as soon as possible."

Dawei Watch's chief editor said a total of five reporters and a columnist have been arrested since the army began cracking down on independent media after seizing power from the elected government of Aung San Suu Kyi in February 2021.

Myanmar is one of the world's biggest jailers of journalists, second only to China, according to Reporters Without Borders, and it is ranked near the bottom of the watchdog group's Press Freedom Index at 173rd out of 180 countries this year.

At least 14 media outlets have had their licenses revoked and at least 163 journalists have been arrested since the coup, with about 49 of them still detained, according to media workers in Myanmar who track the situation. More than half of those still in custody have been convicted and sentenced.

Most of the detained journalists were charged with incitement for allegedly causing fear, spreading false news or agitating against a government employee.

At least four media workers have been killed and others tortured while in detention, the researchers said.

Most media outlets, including Dawei Watch, now operate semi-clandestinely, publishing online as staff members try to avoid

arrest. Others operate from exile.

Last month, the military government amended the broadcasting law to place the Television and Radio Broadcasting Council under the ruling military council's direct control. The law previously allowed the council to operate freely without the influence of any government organization. MDT/AP

Israel vows to fight on despite deadly ambush, rising international pressure

SRAEL has vowed to keep fighting in Gaza until it crushes Hamas after one of the deadliest single battles of the war for its soldiers, even as it faces mounting international calls for a cease-fire and unease on the part of its closest ally, the United States.

The ambush in Gaza City showed Hamas is still able to fight in some of the hardest-hit areas more than two and a half months into a massive air and ground war aimed at destroying its military capabilities. Israel has imposed a total siege on northern Gaza and flattened much of it, forcing most of the population to flee south several weeks ago.

Hamas' resilience has called into question whether Israel can defeat it without wiping out Gaza. Support for Hamas has surged among Palestinians — in part because of the militant group's stiff resistance to a far more powerful foe — while Israel's most important ally, the U.S., has expressed growing discomfort over civilian deaths in what is already one of the 21st century's most devastating military campaigns.

"We are continuing until the end, there is no question," Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said yesterday [Macau time]. "I say this even given the great pain and the international pressure. Nothing will stop us."

U.S. National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan was set to visit Israel today [Macau time]. The U.S. has pressed Israel to take greater measures to spare civilians, and President Joe Biden said earlier this week that Israel was losing international support because of its "indiscriminate bombing."

The ambush took place Tuesday in the dense Gaza City neighborhood of Shijaiyah, which was also the scene of a major battle during the 2014 war between Israel and Hamas. The dead included two high-ranking officers. A total of 116 soldiers have been killed in the ground offensive, which began Oct. 27.

Heavy fighting has raged for days in Shijaiyah and other areas in and around eastern



Gaza City that were encircled earlier in the war. Tens of thousands of people remain in the north despite repeated evacuation orders, saying they don't feel safe anywhere in Gaza or fear they may never return to their homes if they leave them.

A HEAVY CIVILIAN TOLL

Israel's air and ground assault, launched in response to Hamas' unprecedented attack into southern Israel on Oct. 7, has killed more than 18,600 Palestinians, according to the Health Ministry in Hamas-run Gaza.

The ministry does not differentiate between civilian and combatant deaths. Its latest count did not specify how many were women and minors, but they have consistently made up around two-thirds of the dead in previous tallies. Thousands more are missing and feared dead beneath the rubble.

Nearly 1.9 million Palestinians have been driven from their homes, with most seeking refuge in the south, even as Israel has continued to strike what it says are militant targets in all parts of the territory, often killing women and children.

Residents reported Israeli airstrikes overnight in Rafah, the southernmost town along the Egyptian border. An Associated Press reporter saw 27 bodies brought into a local hospital yesterday.

One woman burst into tears after recognizing the body of her child.

"They were young people, children, displaced, all sitting at home," Mervat Ashour said as she and others mourned their relatives. "There were no resistance fighters, rockets, or anything."

A neighbor who helped pull bodies from the rubble of one strike said there were no survivors. "We saw people in pieces," Hassan Abdulaal said.

New evacuation orders issued as troops pushed into the southern city of Khan Younis earlier this month have pushed U.N.-run shelters to the breaking point and forced people to set up tent camps in even less hospitable areas. Heavy rain and cold in recent days has compounded their misery, swamping tents and forcing families to crowd around fires to keep warm.

Israel has sealed Gaza off to all but a trickle of humanitarian aid, and U.N. agencies have struggled to distribute it since the offensive expanded to the south because of fighting and road closures. Almost no aid has reached the north since the start of the war.

RISING SUPPORT FOR HAMAS

Israel might have hoped that the war and its hardships would turn Palestinians against Hamas, hastening its demise, but as with previous rounds of violence, it seems to be having the opposite effect.

A poll conducted by the Palestinian Center for Policy and Survey Research found 44% of respondents in the occupied West Bank said they supported Hamas, up from just 12% in September. In Gaza, the militants enjoyed 42% support, up from 38% three months ago.

That's still a minority in both territories. But even many Palestinians who do not share Hamas' commitment to destroying Israel and oppose its attacks on civilians see it as resisting Israel's decades-old occupation of lands they want for a future state.

The poll meanwhile showed overwhelming rejection of Western-backed Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas, with nearly 90% saying he must resign. The 88-year-old leader's administration, which governs parts of the Israeli-occupied West Bank, is widely seen by Palestinians as a corrupt and autocratic accomplice to the occupation because it works with Israel to suppress Hamas and other militant groups.

The U.S. wants Abbas' internationally recognized Palestinian Authority to also govern Gaza, which it lost to Hamas in a week of street fighting in 2007. The U.S. also wants to revive the long-defunct peace process to negotiate the creation of a Palestinian state. MDT/AP

1982 Spain opens border with the Rock



The gates isolating the people of Gibraltar from Spain have been opened to pedestrians after 13 years.

Spain's new socialist government opened the frontier for "humanitarian reasons" at one minute after midnight this morning.

A Spanish police official in plain clothes unceremoniously unlocked the gates for both sides.

Carmen Ward, 35, married to a British worker in Gibraltar - known as the Rock - was the first Gibraltarian to come through on foot.

She said: "This is a humanitarian step and it ought to have been taken long ago."

A crowd of several thousand sightseers in festive spirit gathered to celebrate the momentous occasion as students performed an impromptu live music session.

There were several hundred Gibraltarian well wishers on the other side.

Despite the good will gesture by the Spanish authorities the frontier has opened under tight restrictions which include a ban on any British or foreign tourists crossing.

Only Spanish citizens or inhabitants of Gibraltar are allowed across.

Cars and commercial goods remain banned. The government of Gibraltar has reacted angrily to the restrictions but its plans to retaliate by closing the gates at night were overruled by the British Government.

The opening ends a period of isolation begun by General Franco in 1969 during the siege of Gibraltar.

The 25,000 inhabitants have been divided from Spain ever since. [...]

In context

The gates were officially opened to everyone in 1985.

Inhabitants of Gibraltar said Spain had relaxed its laws on the frontier to gain support for its bid to enter the European Community which it achieved in 1986.

The bitter battle over the sovereignty of the Rock continues.

It is relentlessly contested by the majority of the 30,000 inhabitants of the Rock who wish to remain British.

In 2002, talks between Britain and Spain continued with new vigour but an announcement the countries could share sovereignty was met with angry protests on the streets of

A referendum was held on 7 November that year in which an overwhelming majority of Gibraltarians - 98.97% - voted not to share British sovereignty with Spain.

But both the Spanish and British governments have said the result has no legal weight. The British and Spanish Foreign Secretaries met in December 2004 with a view to opening a new dialogue on the Rock's future.







'LEAVE THE WORLD BEHIND' IS A TERRIFIC BLEND OF THRILLER, DISASTER AND SATIRE

MAGINE that it's close to mid-**⊥**night and there's a knock at the door of your luxurious weekend rental home. A man is standing there, calmly apologizing. He says it's his home and that he and his daughter need your help. He's also dressed immaculately in a tux.

What would you do?

Did the tux make a difference? Would the man's race?

That early scene is when Netflix's "Leave the World Behind" really kicks into gear and never slackens as this terrific, apocalyptic, psychological thriller races to its conclusion, exploring race, affluence and responsibility along the way.

The luxurious home becomes a castle of sorts as the outside world crumbles. The man who says he's the owner tries to explain why he's turned up. "Under the circumstances, we thought you'd understand," he says. But understanding is in short supply here.

Adapted from Rumaan Alam's acclaimed novel, the movie is set against an end-of-days disaster in which technology — Wi-Fi, TV, phones, internet — has gone silent due to a cyberattack and there's been a massive blackout.

Well-to-do Amanda (a tart Julia Roberts) and her Atlantic magazine-quoting husband Clay (a hangdog Ethan Hawke) must work with the even-more-well-off G.H.

(a calmly sophisticated Mahershala Ali) and his savvy daughter Ruth, (a superb Myha'la). The racial divide easily swamps their joint class affiliation.

Also along for the disaster are Amanda and Clay's children, a "Friends"-obsessed daughter (a soulful Farrah Mackenzie, who even wears her hair in a "Rachel" 'do) and her older, slightly bratty 16-year-old brother (a brooding Charlie Evans).

It's a story brilliantly adapted and directed by Sam Esmail, showrunner of "Mr. Robot," who has made "Leave the World Behind" into a homage of Alfred Hitchcock, complete with the image of a man trying to outrun a crashing plane and using the master's discordant loud music.

Esmail, who manages to make a group of deer appear sinister, even makes a Hitchcockian cameo as a corpse on a beach.

The director paces the deepening dread flawlessly and there are visual delights throughout, like when the family starts off on their adventure with their car exiting at "Point Comfort." The camera often swirls and soars through glass cracks or holes in roofs like an uneasy bird, or parks itself at strange angles.

The mysterious catastrophe ships beach themselves, driverless cars crash like lemmings - sloughs away any pretense at civility, leaving the adults and children to turn on each other. Amanda, in particular, reveals a dark side and her husband — before the disaster, a can't-we-all-get-along bro abandons a hysterical survivor by the side of the road. Community is shattered, guns come out and protect-at-all-costs is the motto of the day.

The acting is first rate and it needs to be — this is a drama of manners and secrets, and each sigh or glance reveals so much. We haven't seen a nasty Roberts character in a while and Ali balances sophistication and slyness artfully. Together, they have some of the film's best scenes.

But a warning of sorts: It's best to click play on your remote knowing that the movie is more a satire than a true action-survival movie — the open-ended ending may divide viewers. Click anyway because the journey never drags. And don't be surprised if there's a jump in sales of survival tools this holiday season.

A dazzlingly fun historical fiction, 'A True Account' tests the borders of reality

■ Lbrief time, was a pirate. At least, according to the mysterious manuscript that shows up on Professor Marian Beresford's desk, brought by a bright-faced student excited at the possibility of finding the treasure that Hannah left behind.

Novelist and historian Katherine Howe embarks on a dazzlingly fun historical fiction, "A True Account: Hannah Masury's Sojourn Amongst the Pyrates, Written by Herself: A Novel" — aptly named given the way it tests the boundaries between reality and imagination.

When undergrad Kay Lonergan brings Hannah's

professor, Marian's years of cynicism have hardened her. She highly doubts its authenticity and even points out the more doubtful details, verging on breaking the fourth wall. But Kay convinces Marian to approach her famous explorer of a father and persuade him, and his expedition society club, to back their trip in search of long-lost pirate booty.

And is that jealousy we detect in the professor? The further the story gets, the more it seems that Kay is everything Marian wishes she was: young, exciting, fashionable, carefree, commanding, self-assured.

might be just the thing to spark some excitement into Marian's dull life — and to finally win her father's attention and approval.


History buffs will appreciate the accurate inclusion of figures such as pirate William Fly and Puritan preacher Cotton Mather. Those who aren't so thrilled about history will enjoy Hannah's wry take on the happenings of the early 1700s.

Mirrored in Hannah's restlessness with the status quo is Marian's inability to fit into the mold set for women of the early 1900s. She quickly becomes endeared to the young pirate who dis-

TANNAH Masury, for a found manuscript to her But Hannah's manuscript guised herself as a cabin boy and went bravely adventuring with one of the world's most notoriously vicious pirates, Edward Low.

Hannah's manuscript, which is about half of the book, follows only hints of the linguistic style of 18th--century American literature. Mercifully, she's far more readable than Mathers.

"A True Account" is a slow start that picks up quickly into a wild voyage of satisfying twists and an even more satisfying ending. The story ties threads of fact and fiction into an intricate knot that's just as enjoyable to look at as it is to untangle. DONNA EDWARDS, MDT/AP

MACAU Bats Rugby Club have had a busy period recently, starting with the U14s playing Hong Kong Football Club and Singapore Saints at the end of November. SOME LESS THAN HAPPY AT ELEVATED NEIGHBORS' TIES

Several weeks ago, Hanoi designated both the United States and Japan as "comprehensive strategic partners". This is Vietnam's highest official designation for a diplomatic relationship and one that Hanoi has used for its relations for China starting 15 years ago. Media in the US heralded the announcement as though the US is now standing on the same starting line with China in a race to draw the Southeast Asian country to the side of one country or the other.

The sensitivity the US media have displayed to such a diplomatic term should leave no one in doubt that the unease they have displayed over Hanoi and Beijing further upgrading their ties on Tuesday indicates it has taken them by surprise.

The sour grapes some US media organizations have shown at China-Vietnam relations being elevated from that "highest official designation" to a strategic China-Vietnam community with a shared future indicates they were not expecting China to leave the US flatfooted on the line.

But for the US, treating Vietnam as "comprehensive strategic partner" means selling it weapons with a view to turning Vietnam into a proxy alongside the Philippines on the other side of the South China Sea.

In contrast, as the continual strengthening of their economic and trade cooperation indicates, China and Vietnam view each other as partners. While the US cares about how Hanoi designates it and how much it can take advantage of that to push through its own agenda, even to Vietnam's cost. China cares about how the two sides can better tap the potential of their cooperation and exchanges and further expand their common interests.

Both China and Vietnam are now closely integrating into the global industry and supply chains. Not only have they seen a steady increase in their bilateral trade and investment but also their industrial, technological and cultural collaborations. They are working closely together to advance the digital economy, green economy and innovation-driven growth, featuring booming people-to-people exchanges. From January to October, Chinese tourists made more than 1.3 million visits to Vietnam.

Moreover, China and Vietnam support each other on issues involving their respective core interests and major concerns, and maintain close coordination in regional and international cooperation mechanisms. Vietnam is an important player in the Group of Friends of the Global Development Initiative. It also supports the global security and civilization initiatives China has put forward, as well as China's accession to the Comprehensive and Progressive Agreement for Trans-Pacific Partnership.

With dozens of deals inked over the past two days during the Chinese leader's visit, the two neighbors will accelerate synergizing the Belt and Road Initiative and the Two Corridors and One Economic Circle strategy, and broaden cooperation in such areas as connectivity, SOE reform, green energy and critical minerals.

The development of Sino-Vietnamese ties does not target any third party. Only those trying to a drive a wedge between the two neighbors or those trying to undermine stability and peace in the Asia-Pacific will be unhappy about the enduring vitality of China-Vietnam relations.

PUTIN SAYS THERE WILL BE NO PEACE IN UKRAINE UNTIL HIS GOALS ARE ACHIEVED

Russian President Vladimir Putin said yesterday there would be no peace in Ukraine until the Kremlin realizes its goals, which remain unchanged after nearly two years of fighting that has sent tensions soaring between Moscow and the West.

Speaking at a year-end news conference that offered him an opportunity to reinforce his grip on power, Putin gave some rare details on what Moscow calls its "special military operation."

He dismissed the need for a second wave of mobilization of reservists to fight in Ukraine — a move that has been deeply unpopular. He said there are some 617,000 Russian soldiers there, inclu-

ding around 244,000 troops who were called up to fight alongside professional military forces.

professional military forces.

"There will be peace when we will achieve our goals," Putin said,

repeating a frequent Kremlin line.

Putin, who has held power for nearly 24 years and announced last week he is running for reelection, was greeted with applause as he arrived in the hall in central Moscow. He didn't hold his traditional press conference last year after his military failed to take Kyiv and as the Ukrainian army retook territory in the east and south of the country.



EARLIEST VERSION OF MICKEY MOUSE SET TO BECOME PUBLIC DOMAIN IN 2024

M-I-C-K-E-Y will soon belong to you and me. With several asterisks, qualification and caveats, Mickey Mouse in his earliest form will be the leader of the band of characters, films and books that will become public domain as the year turns to 2024.

In a moment many close observers thought might never come, at least one version of the quintessential piece of intellectual property and perhaps the most iconic character in American pop culture will be free from Disney's copyright as his first screen release, the 1928 short "Steamboat Willie," featuring both Mickey and Minnie Mouse, becomes available for public use.

"This is it. This is Mickey Mouse. This is exciting because it's kind of symbolic," said Jennifer Jenkins, a professor of law and director of Duke's Center for the Study of Public Domain, who writes an annual Jan. 1 column for "Public Domain Day." "I kind of feel like the pipe on the steamboat, like expelling smoke. It's so exciting."

U.S. law allows a copyright to be held for 95 years

after Congress expanded it several times during Mickey's life.

"It's sometimes derisively referred to as the Mickey Mouse Protection Act," Jenkins said. "That's oversimplified because it wasn't just Disney that was pushing for term extension. It was a whole group of copyright holders whose works were set to go into the public domain soon, who benefited greatly from the 20 years of extra protection."

"Ever since Mickey Mouse's first appearance in the 1928 short film Steamboat Willie, people have associated the character with Disney's stories, experiences, and authentic products," a Disney spokesperson said in a statement to The Associated Press. "That will not change when the copyright in the Steamboat Willie film expires."

Current artists and creators will be able to make use of Mickey, but with major limits. It is only the more mischievous, rat-like, non-speaking boat captain in "Steamboat Willie" that has become public.

"More modern versions of Mickey will remain unaffected by the expiration of the Steamboat Willie copyright, and Mickey will continue to play a leading role as a global ambassador for the Walt Disney Company in our storytelling, theme park attractions, and merchandise," Disney's statement said.

Not every feature or personality trait a character displays is necessarily copyrightable, however, and courts could be busy in the coming years determining what's inside and outside Disney's ownership.

"We will, of course, continue to protect our rights in the more modern versions of Mickey Mouse and other works that remain subject to copyright," the company said.

Disney still solidly and separately holds a trademark on Mickey as a corporate mascot and brand identifier, and the law forbids using the character deceptively to fool consumers into thinking a product is from the original creator. Anyone starting a film company or a theme park will not be free to make mouse ears their

Disney's statement said it "will work to safeguard against consumer confusion caused by unauthorized uses of Mickey and our other iconic characters." MDT/AP

Sweden A large Swedish study has uncovered a paradox about people diagnosed with an excessive fear of serious illness: They tend to die earlier than people who aren't hypervigilant about health concerns. Hypochondriasis, now called illness anxiety disorder, is a rare condition with symptoms that go beyond average health worries. People with the disorder are unable to shake their fears despite normal physical exams and lab tests. Some may change doctors repeatedly. Others may avoid medical care.
