

GDP reaches MOP403b in 2024 with 8.8% growth

HE economy continued its recovery in 2024, with Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growing by 8.8% year-on-year in real terms, rea-

ching MOP 403.3 billion, according to the Statistics and Census Service (DSEC).

The city's overall economic output returned to 86.4% of its 2019 level. Per capita GDP rose by 7.6% to MOP 587,922, while the

implicit GDP deflator, measuring overall price changes, increased slightly by 0.4% to 105.0.

The growth was primarily driven by a 9.2% rise in service exports, supported by a 23.8% increase in visitor arrivals. Gaming

services saw a significant 21.8% boost, although other tourism--related exports declined by 6.1% due to a high comparison base from the previous year. Compared to 2019, however, tourism services still registered a 13.0% increase. In contrast, merchandise exports and imports declined by 14.5% and 7.6%, respectively.

Domestic demand showed moderate growth, rising by 2.3% year-on-year. Private consumption expenditure grew by 4.9%, driven by stable employment and economic activity. Household spending in Macau increased by 3.8%, while overseas consumption surged by 11.1%. However, government consumption expenditure declined by 5.1% following the end of the "Livelihood Subsidy Scheme."

Investment activity remained strong, with gross fixed capital formation increasing by 4.6%. Private construction investment rose by 5.1%, and equipment investment saw a notable 31.1% jump. Public equipment investment edged up by 1.2%, while public construction investment dropped by 10.0% due to the completion of major infrastructure projects.

In the fourth quarter of 2024, GDP expanded by 3.4% compared to the previous quarter, bringing economic output to 88.0% of its pre-pandemic level.

The Macau Economic Association (MEA) previously projected that full-year GDP would grow by about 9% in real terms year over year in 2024, recovering to approximately 86.5% of the pre-pandemic level of 2019.

EMPLOYMENT RATE SHOW MODEST DECLINE

The unemployment rates experienced decreases for the period of November 2024 to January 2025, according to DSEC.

The general unemployment rate fell to 1.6%, while the rate for local residents decreased to 2.1%, down 0.1 and 0.2 percentage points, respectively, from the previous quarter.

The decline is attributed to a reduction in job seekers during the Chinese New Year, with the total number of unemployed individuals dropping by 500 to 6,200.

However, the overall labor force decreased by 2,500 to 382,500, and total employment fell by 2,000 to 376,300.

Notably, employment in the Gaming sector increased, while the Hotels, Restaurants, and Construction sectors saw declines. The underemployment rate also dropped to 1.3%, with 5,000 individuals affected, primarily in Real Estate and Business Activi-

Melco keeps 'a close eye' on Thailand for expansion amid legalization push

ELCO Resorts & M_{Entertainment} is gearing up to enter Thailand as the country moves toward legalizing casinos.

With the potential to become a premier gaming and entertainment hub in Southeast Asia, Thailand presents a significant opportunity for the company.

CEO Lawrence Ho confirmed in January the company's ambition to secure a license to operate an integrated resort in Thailand once the regulatory framework allows for it.

To support this effort, Melco has already established a Thai subsidiary ₹ dedicated to studying & the feasibility of such an ខ្លី endeavor.

"We see Thailand as a generational opportunity that probably happens once every century," Ho remarked in a recent earnings call with analysts.

"We've conducted extensive studies, made multiple visits, even opened an office in Thailand. While it is still early days, we remain vigilant and flexible in our approach, including potential partnerships and structural adjustments," he added.

Having gained experience from previous bidding processes, such as



in Japan, Melco is taking a measured stance in Thailand, noting that the group is still in the "very early innings in

However, Ho said that the gaming operator will "keep a very close

Meanwhile, chief financial officer Geoff Davis also highlighted Melco's strategic outlook on intellectual property (IP) fees, emphasizing that the company has taken industry trends into account while setting its pricing model at a competitive level.

Thailand's revised draft of the entertainment complex bill outlines strict conditions for the implementation of casinos, with local punters being required to have at least THB50 million (USD1.5 million) in fixed deposits for at least six months to be able to enter casinos.

requirements also include an entry fee capped at THB5,000 (USD 150).

EXPANDING INVESTMENTS

Melco is ramping up investments across its properties, with a strong focus on enhancing customer experience and expanding technological capabilities.

Ho announced in the call that the company remains committed to its Macau operations, where efforts are underway to improve visibility and accessibility.

"Our primary objective is to attract and retain high-quality, high--value customers," Ho stated.

At Studio City, renovations to the high-limit area are nearing completion, while at City of Dreams, enhancements around the main casino entrance aim to boost foot traffic.

Additionally, all baccarat tables in Macau will feature smart technology by the end of March, optimizing marketing and player reinvestment strategies.

SUDDEN CLOSURE OF BANK ACCOUNTS MAY BE RELATED TO 'UNLAWFUL' REMITTANCES

PEVERAL banking institutions Oin Macau have reportedly informed clients of sudden account closures, according to sources familiar with the issue.

An investigation by The Times suggests that these closures may be connected to accounts involved in "unlawful" remittance activities, particularly among non-resident workers (TNR) from the Philippi-

The investigation reveals that many of these workers use a "middleman" to transfer money to GCash, an e-payment platform.

The process typically involves the workers sending money to a middleman's bank account, who then acts as an informal remittance service, offering a slightly better exchange rate.

Filipino workers in Macau can currently remit money through local remittance companies, such as BDO Unibank, Pacific Ace, and Global Remit, with fees ranging from MOP25 to MOP30, depending on the method used for the receiver to collect the funds.

The intermediaries charge a flat fee of MOP20 and allow transfers to be made through bank transfers, eliminating the need to visit a remittance center.

Some would also opt to visit a bank and deposit money through Cash Withdrawal and Deposit Machines (CWD) located across the city.

However, this method often results in multiple deposits and



transactions into their accounts, particularly during the first week of the month.

Some TNR clients, especially those with Banco Nacional Ultramarino (BNU), have reportedly been notified of account closures, with no clear explanation given.

The Times reached out to BNU for comment, but the bank declined to provide details, citing banking confidentiality

"All information regarding BNU clients, whether individuals, companies or institutions, is subject to banking confidentiality. BNU values the trust that all customers place in the Bank, therefore, as you may understand, we will not disclose any information about any of our customers' financial relationship with BNU," the bank stated to the Times inquiry.

The same institution added, "On the other hand, we may assert that no new policies have been implemented recently. BNU operates and has always operated in accordance with best financial practices and in strict compliance with the Regulatory Authority's guidelines."

In response to the Times' query, the Monetary Authority of Macao (AMCM) emphasized that both banks and account holders must adhere to agreed terms and con-

It also noted that banks are entitled to terminate business relationships with customers after providing prior notice, and customers can reach out to resolve

"In line with the bank's 'Customer Acceptance Policy' and commercial decision, the bank reserves the right to terminate the business relationship with the customer with prior notice. In special circumstances, account holders may contact the bank to come up with a resolution,' the AMCM added.

The AMCM clarified that banks must conduct thorough due diligence before establishing business relationships, in line with anti-money laundering and terrorism financing guidelines.

"Banks shall conduct customer due diligence procedures, which shall include but not limited to understanding customer's background, purpose of account and transaction, etc., in accordance with the AMCM's 'Anti-Money Laundering and Combating the Financing of Terrorism Guideline' as well as respective internal 'Customer Acceptance Policy," the bureau said.

Some workers have explained that they prefer this method of transferring money because it offers lower fees and avoids the time-consuming process of using official remittance services.

Sources revealed that due to the rise of online remittance services, registered remittance companies are seeing a significant drop in bu-

"Business is nothing like it was before bank transfers or GCash became popular. There are many days now, even at the end of the month when we're usually busiest, that we don't have as many transactions," said a teller at a remittance center, who requested to remain anonymous.

Around two years ago, the AMCM issued a warning against using the mobile app YourPay for remittances from Macau to Indonesia, as it was not authorized to operate in Macau and was deemed illegal.

The AMCM stated that the app was promoted across various media platforms.

The authority clarified that it is not authorized to conduct financial activities in Macau, making it illegal.

Under Macau's financial regulations, individuals involved in unauthorized financial operations may face significant fines.

PORTUGUESE MINISTER PAULO RANGEL **TO VISIT MACAU**

Portuguese Minister of State and Foreign Affairs, Paulo Rangel, will visit Macau this month, marking the first visit by a senior Portuguese official since the pandemic. Rangel will attend the Boao Forum in China and meet with Chinese officials, including his counterpart, Wang Yi, according to TDM. In Macau, he will meet Chief Executive Sam Hou Fai, engage with the Portuguese community, and hold discussions with Consul General Alexandre Leitão. This will be the first meeting between Rangel and the new Chief Executive. Rangel is also expected to return later this year for Portugal's Camões Day celebrations.

TOURIST FINED FOR EXITING MOVING TAXI ON AMIZADE BRIDGE

A woman who exited a moving taxi on the Amizade Bridge has been fined MOP 600 for violating Macau's traffic laws. A viral video circulating on social media shows the tourist leaving the vehicle while it was still in motion. According to the taxi driver, she said she was feeling unwell and needed fresh air. She later managed to hail another taxi on the bridge to continue her journey to Macau International Airport. Traffic laws strictly prohibit passengers from entering or exiting moving vehicles. The taxi driver will not face penalties, as he reportedly took all necessary precautions.

Casino revenue rises 6.8% in February

TAMING revenues in **U**February climbed by 6.8% year-on-year to MOP19.74 billion, surpassing analysts' forecasts, according to the Gaming Inspection and Coordination Bureau.

The positive performance was partly attributed to the Lunar New Year holiday, or Golden Week, which brought an influx of visitors.

Macau welcomed approximately 1.3 million arrivals during the eight--day holiday, a slight decline of 3.5% compared to the previous year.

However, January's total visitation of 3.6 million surpassed 2019 figures by 6%.



visitation February's data is expected later this month.

Last month, JP Morgan Securities (Asia Pacific) Ltd. reported that the gambling sector experienced stronger-than-anticipated demand following the Lunar New Year holiday.

This memo comes after the city reported a year--on-year decline of 5.6% in gross gaming revenue

(GGR), totaling MOP 18.25 billion in January.

Despite the post-holiday resilience, JP Morgan forecasts Macau's full-year GGR to grow by only 1% to 4% in 2025, lower than the industry consensus of 5% growth.

Also, Citigroup has sharply reduced its 2025 growth forecast for the city's GGR, citing the disappointing Chinese New Year CNY gambling volume and the implementation of US tariffs on Chinese exports.

The banking group now predicts a 1% year-on-year decline in first-half GGR, compared to its earlier 7% growth forecast. LV

SATELLITE CASINO WORKERS BRACE FOR UNCERTAINTY AS TRANSITION DEADLINE NEARS

 A^s the three-year transition period for satellite casinos approaches its conclusion, workers are bracing for potential job losses and reduced benefits amid significant industry changes.

The impending deadline, set for the end of the year, will restrict operations of the remaining 11 satellite casinos to management companies, intensifying concerns about job security among employees.

Many workers, some with nearly two decades of experience in the gaming sector, fear that these changes will adversely affect their welfare.

"We are worried about whether our benefits will be reduced and if we will be able to keep our jobs amid potential operational shifts," shared one employee who has dedicated over a decade to the casino, as reported by TDM.

Another anonymous employee, reflecting on the uncertainty, expressed anxiety about adapting to new roles if operational changes occur.

"I'm concerned about my ability to handle a new job," they stated.

The transition has already resulted in displacement for some, with colleagues being transferred to unrelated departments, such as kitchens, while others, particularly older workers, have opted for early retirement.



The operational model for satellite casinos is poised for a significant shift, restricting them to earning only fixed management fees starting next year.

This change raises concerns about financial viability; some managers argue that if these fees are set at unsustainable levels, it could impede their ability to repay bank loans. To ensure sustainability, they are advocating for rental prices to be aligned with operational performance.

Lawmaker Lei Leong Wong emphasized the broader implications, noting that the closure of satellite casinos could impact not only employees but also surrounding small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs). "Business owners near the

satellite casinos are also worried," Wong said.

Wong urged the government to announce a clear plan to safeguard job opportunities for affected workers and to consider the economic ripple effects on the communi-

While gaming concessionaires are responsible for employees under their contracts, many satellite casino workers are employed by contractors, leaving them in a precarious position.

Adding to the discussion, Chief Executive Sam Hou Fai spoke about the handling of satellite casinos, emphasizing the contractual obligations of gaming concessionaires in managing these establishments. He stated, "I believe gaming concessionaires will coordinate well with satellite casino operators. Workers of satellite casinos are sent to work there by gaming concessionaires. They are supposed to have an arrangement to take over them."

He also mentioned that if gaming concessionaires require assistance, the SAR government would be ready to help.

Sam clarified, "Of course, gaming concessionaires will have their business judgment in dealing with these workers. If they need help from the SAR government, we will provide them help. Will the SAR government intervene in their discussion? It's more on the gaming concessionaires. There are supposed to be contracts. Also, they are supposed to have certain anticipations during the transition period. They should consider how to deal with it."

The concerns extend beyond the casino workers themselves.

As reported last week, Secretary for Security Wong Sio Chak has also voiced apprehension about the potential closure of satellite casinos, emphasizing the social and economic ramifications.

During a press conference on the 2024 crime report last week, Wong stated that the government is closely monitoring the situation, particularly its impact on employment and nearby businesses. He noted that while the issue is not currently a public security concern, it could evolve into one if not addressed promptly.

Lawmakers affiliated with the Macau Federation of Trade Unions, including Leong Sun Iok, Ella Lei, and José Pereira Coutinho, have echoed these concerns. They highlighted the significant impact on businesses in the ZAPE area following the closure of seven satellite casinos two years ago and warned that the loss of another 11 venues could devastate the local economy.

Pereira Coutinho has called for an extension of the transition deadline, while Lei and Leong have urged gaming concessionaires to find solutions, such as acquiring the casinos or reintegrating displaced workers into other properties.

Wong Sio Chak considers amending law after filming accident

THE Secretary for Se-**▲** curity, Wong Sio Chak, has admitted to considering amendments to the current law to grant the government more power to prosecute individuals and entities that disregard authorities' advice during filming sessions on public streets.

Wong addressed the issue following media inquiries regarding an incident last week, in which 12 people were injured during the filming of a street pursuit scene on Rua do Seminário.

The media questioned whether authorities were considering prosecuting the filming team for failing



to follow safety instructions. According to the government's legal analysis, Wong stated that there is no legal basis for prosecution since the accident occurred on a "closed-to-traffic" street, which is treated as private property under the law.

Although authorities claim the vehicles' speed was "not that high," Wong pointed out that the police, after assessing the scene before issuing the filming permit, imposed safety requirements that the crew

did not fully adhere to.

He also noted that the injuries were minor and not directly caused by the car crash. "The injured people were not hit by the car but fell while trying to escape, tripping, hitting walls, and suffering similar

minor accidents," he explained.

"We do not permit reckless or unsafe driving. Following this incident, we contacted the Cultural Affairs Bureau (IC), which subsequently suspended the filming license."

considering While amendments to the law, Wong emphasized the need for a balanced approach to avoid excessively strict regulations that could harm Macau's reputation and discourage filmmakers from choosing the city as a filming location. Such restrictions, he noted, would contradict the government's efforts to promote Macau as a movie-friendly destination.

VISA EASING LEADS TO <u>FEWER OVERSTAYS</u>

At the same time, Wong highlighted that recent measures facilitating mainland residents' access to visas for Macau have significantly reduced cases of illegal immigration and overstaving. According to official statistics, cases of illegal immigration among mainland residents dropped by 33.1% in 2024, while instances among foreigners fell by 42.3%. Additionally, overstaying cases among mainland residents holding individual visas decreased by

"[The reduction] is directly related to the visa-easing policies. If you can easily obtain a visa to Macau, there is no need to stay illegally," Wong stated. He added that "nowadays, mainland residents can obtain visas more easily, and Zhuhai residents can visit Macau more frequently. Previously, each visa allowed only one entry, but now 7huhai residents can use their visas to visit Macau at least once per week. As a result, the number of illegal immigrants and overstayers has decreased."

FIA unveils new 'time attack' racing format for World GT cup

THE FIA GT World Cup, set to take place in Macau this November, will introduce a new qualifying format, which was unveiled at the latest World Motor Sport Council meeting.

The "Super Pole" session will serve as a second qualifying round, featuring the top 10 fastest drivers from the initial session. A key change is that in the Super Pole, racers will have two individual flying laps on a fresh set of tires, allowing them to push for their best lap around the Guia Circuit without interference from other drivers or yellow flags.

The concept of this "Time Attack" session is not new, having been suggested multiple times in the past. GT3 cars often struggle to fully exploit their performance on the narrow Guia track, making the revised format a welcome change.

The FIA GT Commission stated: "Following an in-depth revision incorporating competitors' feedback, the qualifying format of the FIA GT World Cup has been revised. In addition to the 30-minute qualifying session known from previous editions (Q1), a second segment

(Q2), reserved for the top ten drivers from the first session, has been added."

The rest of the event schedule remains unchanged, featuring a 12-lap qualifying race on Saturday, followed by the 16-lap FIA GT World Cup-deciding main race on Sunday.

Two-time FIA GT World Cup winner and reigning champion Maro Engel praised the update, saying, "It's a great idea to introduce the Super Pole session in Macau. This will be one of the most spectacular and exciting sessions of the season, and it should also ensure sporting fairness. The fans have a lot to look forward to."

Similarly, last year's qualifying race winner and two-time main race winner (2019 and 2023), Raffaele Marciello, added, "In Macau, it was always tricky to have a clean lap. With this new format, you won't hear the excuse of traffic or a red flag. Having only two laps will be very challenging, but now the fastest guy will probably be on pole!"

The eighth edition of the FIA GT World Cup, held as part of the Macau Grand Prix, will take place on November 13-16 on the streets of Macau

HINA'S national "two sessions," a key political event shaping the country's policy direction, are set to convene in Beijing this week against the backdrop of a complex and challenging domestic and global environment.

The annual session of the top political advisory body, the Chinese People's Political Consultative Conference National Committee, will commence tomorrow. The session of the top legislature, the National People's Congress (NPC), will open on Wednesday.

The Chinese premier, top legislator, top political advisor, chief justice, and top procurator will present work reports. Lawmakers will review the government's annual budget and development plan. They will deliberate an amendment to the law on deputies to the NPC and local people's congresses.

On the sidelines of the event, ministers from various government departments will engage with the public through interviews and press conferences, clarifying policies and responding to pressing concerns.

The "two sessions" serve as a critical window to observe China's development plan for the coming year. Decisions and policy announcements made here will not only affect the lives of 1.4 billion Chinese but also have an impact outside the country's borders.

So, what can be expected from this year's "two sessions"?

GROWTH TARGET FOR 2025

Typically, the GDP growth target set in the government work report is one of the most closely watched figures. As China's economy shifts toward high-quality development, GDP is not the sole measure of the economy. But it remains an important indicator.

In 2024, China achieved its growth target of around 5 percent, thanks in large part to a series of significant macroeconomic measures introduced to offset economic downturn pressure.

GDP growth serves as a cornerstone metric with profound and wide-ranging significance. Despite the challenges China's economy has faced in recent years, it is projected to contribute about 30 percent of global economic growth in 2024, making it the largest source of growth for the world economy.

INCREMENTAL POLICIES

To achieve its growth target, China will roll out more targeted policies to stimulate economic activity. The government work report is expected to announce policy measu-



res to ensure the goal is met.

China has already signaled a shift in its macroeconomic stance. At the Central Economic Work Conference last December, policymakers pledged to roll out more proactive macro policies in 2025. Notably, they decided to adopt a "moderately loose" monetary policy, marking a significant departure from the "prudent" approach over the past 14 years.

The meeting outlined nine key priorities, with boosting consumption at the forefront. This reflects China's emphasis on domestic demand as a top economic priority. In 2025, large-scale equipment upgrades and consumer goods trade-in programs are expected to be promoted with greater intensity and in a broader scope.

According to Finance Minister Lan Fo'an, China in 2025 will actively use the room for a higher deficit, increase the issuance of local government special-purpose bonds, continue to issue ultra-long special treasury bonds, and increase transfer payments from the central government to local governments. The specifics of these plans will also be a key focus of this year's "two sessions."

INTERACTIONS BETWEEN LEADERS, LEGISLATORS, ADVISORS

During the "two sessions," Chinese leaders, who are NPC deputies themselves, will interact with their fellow lawmakers at group deliberations. They will also interact with

political advisors to discuss hotspot topics that matter most to state governance.

These interactions serve as a window for observing how the central leadership stays informed about grassroots realities. This is a defining feature of Chinese democracy, often described in contemporary discourse as whole-process people's democracy.

In recent years, President Xi Jinping, a deputy of Jiangsu province's delegation to the 14th NPC, has typically participated in the delegation's deliberations.

Xi, also general secretary of the Communist Party of China Central Committee and chairman of the Central Military Commission, also attended the meetings of the NPC delegation of the armed forces and joined group discussions of political advisors from various sectors.

During these interactions, Xi emphasized key priorities such as supporting the growth of the private sector and private enterprises, accelerating digital economy development, and advancing high-level opening-up -- all crucial to China's economic and social progress.

FOREIGN POLICY

The "two sessions" also shed light on China's foreign policy, as the foreign minister typically holds a press conference on the sidelines of the meetings.

Last year, Foreign Minister Wang Yi answered 21 questions during a 90-minute press conference, with journalists from across the world participating.

The foreign minister touched on various regional and international hotspot issues, such as the Ukraine crisis and the Palestinian-Israeli conflict. He also expounded on China's foreign policies toward Russia, the United States, Europe, and Global South countries.

During this year's "two sessions," China's propositions on international relations are particularly noteworthy against the backdrop of a rapidly changing and turbulent global landscape.

AI, INNOVATION

Without a doubt, technological innovation will be a key focus during this year's "two sessions," with the artificial intelligence (AI) industry very likely to take center stage.

Over the past month, Chinese tech start-up DeepSeek sent shockwaves through the global AI industry and capital markets by introducing an open-source and popular chatbot.

Domestically, companies such as Tencent, Baidu, and BYD have begun integrating DeepSeek into their products. Some local governments have also announced collaborations with the DeepSeek AI model to enhance public ser-

vices, while others have organized training sessions to help officials and business professionals better understand the development and applications of DeepSeek and other AI technologies.

In fact, AI has already emerged as one of the hottest topics at many of this year's provincial-level "two sessions." Many AI-related plans mentioned in provincial government work reports focus on building innovation platforms, promoting deeper industry integration, and improving policy frameworks.

It's important to note that the rise of innovations like DeepSeek reflects China's commitment to taking the lead in technological advancements and its broader strategic focus on talent cultivation, innovation-friendly environment, business environment improvements, and the nurturing of non-public investments. These elements are expected to be underscored during the "two sessions."

Additionally, the sessions provide a crucial platform for lawmakers and political advisors to offer suggestions and foster broad consensus on national development. Some of them are corporate executives and leading researchers. What AI-related proposals and suggestions they will present will be a major point of interest for China watchers. MDT/CHINADAILY

Millions of Muslims mark the start of the holy month of Ramadan

USLIMS in Indonesia are shopping for sweets and new clothes and taking part in traditional festivities as millions observe the holy month of Ramadan, which started on Saturday.

Celebrations in the world's most populous Muslim-majority country range from colorful nighttime parades and cleaning family graves to preparing food for predawn breakfasts and elaborate post-sundown meals known as "iftars."

Each region in the vast archipelago nation of 17,000 islands has its own way to mark the start of Ramadan, when Muslims refrain from eating, drinking, smoking and sexual intercourse from sunrise until sunset for the whole month.

Even a tiny sip of water or a puff of smoke is enough to invalidate the fast. At night, family and friends gather and feast in a festive atmosphere.

Religious Affairs Minister Nasaruddin Umar announced on Friday that Ramadan will begin on Saturday, after the sighting of the crescent moon was confirmed by Islamic astronomy observers in Indonesia's westernmost province of Aceh.

Shortly after the announcement, mosques flooded with devotees offering evening prayers known as "tarawih" on the first



eve of Ramadan. In Jakarta's Istiqlal Grand Mosque, the largest in Southeast Asia, tens of thousands of worshippers crammed together shoulder-to-shoulder.

The daylong fasting is aimed at bringing the faithful closer to God and reminding them of the suffering of the poor. Muslims are expected to strictly observe daily prayers and engage in heightened religious contemplation. They are also urged to refrain from gossip, fighting or cursing during the holy

Flares, drums and tradition Samsul Anwar, his wife and

their 8-year-old nephew were

among hundreds of people taking part in a torchlight parade along the streets of their neighborhood in Tangerang, a city just outside the capital of Jakarta, on Wednesday after evening prayers.

They carried torches, lit flares and played Islamic songs accompanied by the beat of rebana, the Arabic handheld percussion instrument, as they walked along the cramped streets of the densely populated neighborhood.

"Every year we welcome Ramadan with a tradition that has been passed down from generation to generation," said Anwar.

Chinese Indonesian communi-

ties also participated in the parade by performing the vibrant "barongsai" or "lion dance," a prominent part of Chinese New Year celebration, to the sound of drums and trumpets.

The barongsai performance "was also held to show unity between the religious communities of Chinese and Muslim, aiming to increase religious tolerance," Anwar said.

Cost of living anxieties

It's also an exciting time for business. Hotels, restaurants and cafes all prepare special Ramadan promotions, and shoppers flock to shopping centers for new clothes and home decorations for the holiday of Eid al-Fitr, which marks the end of Ramadan. Children often receive new clothes and gifts.

However, some Muslims worry how they will cope financially during Ramadan this year amid soaring prices.

"Everything to do with cooking is rising (in cost) day by day," said Asih Mulyawati, a mother of two who lives in Jakarta's outskirt of Tangerang. "I worry this situation will impact Ramadan celebra-

Despite soaring food prices in the past month, popular markets such as Tanah Abang in Jakarta were teeming with shoppers buying clothes, shoes, cookies and sweets before the holiday.

Indonesia's Trade Ministry has said prices of imported staple foods including wheat, sugar, beef and soybeans have increased sharply this year as a result of rising global commodity prices and supply chain disruptions.

But many people say the rise in prices not only impacts imported foods but also local commodities like rice, eggs, chili, palm oil and onions. Many also blame the government for rising gas and electricity prices.

"The current gloomy economic situation and extreme weather recently also contribute to the soaring prices and the weakening of people's purchasing power," said Heru Tatok, a trader in Jakarta's Pasar Senen market. MDT/AP

US aircraft carrier arrives in South Korea, days after North Korea test-fired missiles

HYUNG-JIN KIM, **SEOUL**

A^{U.S.} aircraft carrier arrived in South Korea yesterday in a show of force, days after North Korea test-launched cruise missiles to demonstrate its counterattack capabilities.

The arrival of the USS Carl Vinson and its strike group at the South Korean port of Busan was meant to display a solid U.S-South Korean military alliance in the face of persistent North Korean threats, and boost

interoperability of the allies' combined assets, the South Korean navy said in a statement.

It said it was the first U.S. aircraft carrier to travel to South Korea since June.

The deployment of the carrier is expected to infuriate North Korea, which views temporary deployments of such powerful U.S. military assets as major security threats. North Korea has responded to some of the past deployments of U.S. aircraft carriers, long-range bombers and

nuclear-powered submarines with missile tests.

Since his Jan. 20 inauguration, President Donald Trump has said he will reach out to North Korean leader Kim Jong Un again to revive diplo-

macy. North Korea hasn't directly responded to Trump's overture but alleged U.S.-led hostilities against North Korea have intensified since Trump's inauguration.

North Korea said Friday it test-fired strategic cruise missiles earlier last week to inform its adversaries of its military's counterattack capability and the readiness of its nuclear operations. After watching the launches, the North's fourth missile testing event this year, Kim ordered his military to be fully ready to use its nuclear weapons.

Experts say Kim won't likely accept Trump's overture anytime soon as he is now focusing on his support of Russia's war against Ukraine with provision of weapons and troops. They say Kim could consider resuming diplomacy with Trump when he thinks he cannot maintain his country's current booming cooperation with Russia

Kim and Trump met three times from 2018-19 during Trump's first term to discuss the future of North Korea's nuclear program. Their high-stakes diplomacy eventually collapsed due to wrangling over U.S.-led economic sanctions on North Korea. MDT/AP

European leaders pledge to stand by Ukraine after confrontational Oval Office meeting with Trump

UROPEAN leaders pledged late Friday to stand by Ukraine in the wake of the contentious Oval Office meeting between U.S. President Donald Trump, Vice President JD Vance and Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy, with their statements in support of their neighbor on the continent ensuring a deepening transatlantic rift.

European leaders already were shaken by Vance's speech to the Munich Security Conference two weeks ago in which he lectured them about the state of their democracy. As prime ministers and presidents across the continent scrambled to respond, they have held a series of emergency summits to discuss security.

Another major summit was scheduled yesterday in London, hosted by U.K. Prime Minister Keir Starmer. More than a dozen European and EU leaders, including Zelenskyy, will gather for a meeting meant to drive forward action on Ukraine and security.

Starmer spoke with both Trump and Zelenskyy on Friday and maintained his strong support for Ukraine, his office said in a statement.

"He retains unwavering support for Ukraine, and is doing all he can to find a path forward to a lasting peace based on sovereignty and security for Ukraine," the statement said.

The European leaders' comments Friday largely did not mention Trump or Vance, but rather sought to assure Ukraine of their support as the war with Russia enters its fourth year. Zelenskyy re-posted their comments on X, writing "thank you for your support" to each — likely a dig at the Trump administration.

During the extraordinary meeting Friday in Washington, Trump chided Zelenskyy after Vance, one of the administration's most skeptical voices on Ukraine, said he was being disrespectful for debating Trump in the Oval Office in front of the American media.

"Have you said 'thank you' once?" Vance asked Zelenskyy.

The Ukrainian president said four times during the course of their exchange that he was thankful or had already expressed his thanks.

Trump then called off the signing of a minerals deal that he said would have moved Ukraine closer to ending its war with Russia. Zelenskyy left the White House shortly after Trump shouted at him, showing open disdain. The White House said the Ukrainian delegation was told to leave.

A senior Ukrainian official said Zelenskyy spoke to French President Emmanuel Macron, NATO Secretary-General Mark Rutte and President of the European Council Antonio Costa after he left the White House, describing all the conversations as "supportive" of the Ukrainian leader. The official, who is familiar with the matter, requested anonymity because he was not authorized to comment publicly.

Italy's Premier Giorgia Meloni, however, proposed "an immediate summit" between the United States and European allies "to speak frankly about how we intend to face today's great challenges, starting with Ukraine." She urged the West to stay united.

"Every division of the West makes us all weaker and favors those who would like to see the decline of our civilization," she said. "A division would not benefit anyone."

Some posts on X were directed to Zelenskyy. EU Commission President Ursula von der Leyen told him "your dignity honors the bravery of the Ukrainian people. Be strong, be brave, be fearless. You are never alone, dear President."

And Friedrich Merz, Germany's likely next chancellor, wrote: "Dear Volodymyr @ zelenskyyua, we stand with #Ukraine in good and in testing times. We must never confuse aggressor and victim in this terrible war."

The victory for Merz's party yesterday in Germany's national election ensured that Ukraine has an even stronger supporter in the European Union's largest country. Merz during the campaign promised to unite Europe in the face of challenges from both Russia and the United States.

But Alice Weidel, co-leader of the far-right, anti-immigrant Alternative for Germany party and one of Merz's challengers, wrote "Historic. Trump & Vance!" on X with a link to a video of the meeting. AfD's platform calls for the immediate lifting of sanctions against Russia and opposes weapons deliveries to Ukraine. Weidel also met with Vance in Munich.

Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán praised Trump for his conduct in the Oval Office, casting Zelenskyy as working against peace in his own country.

"Strong men make peace, weak men make war," Orbán wrote on X. "Today President Donald Trump stood bravely for peace. Even if it was difficult for many to digest. Thank you, Mr. President!"

Orbán is a consistent backer of the Kremlin and has been outspokenly antagonistic against neighboring Ukraine. After winning the last Hungarian elections in 2022, less than six weeks after Russia's full-scale invasion, he cited Zelenskyy as one of the opponents he had defeated in the campaign.

Meanwhile in Estonia, which borders Russia, Foreign Minister Margus Tsahkna said the only obstacle to peace is Russian President Vladimir Putin's decision to continue the war.

"It is time for Europe to step up," Tsahkna said in a statement. "We do not need to wait for something else to happen; Europe has enough resources, including Russia's frozen assets, to enable Ukraine to continue fighting."

And Swedish Prime Minister Ulf Kristersson's reminded Ukraine of what's at stake for the Nordic and Baltic countries, and others, if Russia's aggression spreads.

"You are not only fighting for your freedom but also for all of Europe's," Kristersson wrote on X. European officials from Austria, he Czech Republic, Denmark, Finland, France, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland and Spain, among others, also offered their support to Ukraine. MDT/AP

1974 TURKISH JET CRASHES KILLING 345



A Turkish Airlines DC10 has crashed near Paris killing all 345 people on board.

The plane was on a regular flight from Ankara to London via Paris. It came down just minutes after take-off at 1235 GMT, scything a mile-long trail through the forest of Ermenonville.

Among the victims were 200 passengers, many of them British, who had been transferred from British Airways flights cancelled because of a strike by engineers at London airport.

No-one was killed on the ground, although the forest is popular with walkers.

Only blackened stumps of trees remained where the pilot had probably attempted a crash landing. Bits of clothing and other wreckage from the plane were strewn across the whole area.

Hundreds of rescue workers, from the Red Cross Protection Civile as well as fire and ambulance crews, were on the scene within half an

But there was no-one to be rescued. All that remained to be done was to collect the bodies and take them to the church of St Pierre at Senlis

From there, soldiers transferred the bodies onto army vehicles during the night to be driven to the medical centre in Paris, where they will be examined by forensic scientists.

Eyewitnesses in the nearby village of St Pathu said they heard an explosion and saw flames coming from the plane long before it plunged into

Some bodies were found close to the village, about six miles from the crash site, which also suggests the plane may have exploded in mid-air.

Crash investigators looking for clues to the world's worst air disaster to date will start by studying the jet's engines. They are also looking for the black box flight recorder.

The possibility of sabotage has not been dis-

Among the victims were 17 members of Bury St Edmunds rugby club, returning from a trip to

IN CONTEXT

British trade union leader James Conway, general secretary of the Amalgamated Union of Engineering Workers, an Olympic silver medallist and four leading London models were among those killed in the crash. The final death toll was 346.

The Paris crash was the worst in aviation history up to this date and the first involving a fully-loaded wide-bodied jet since they had entered passenger service four years before. The accident was probably caused by a cargo door coming open during the flight, leading to a sudden loss of pressure inside the cabin and causing part of the flooring to collapse which damaged the controls and made it impossible for the crew to regain control.

An almost identical accident had happened in June 1972 when a DC10 lost its rear cargo door, causing the floor to buckle and jam some of the controls. Safety recommendations made following that crash had not been implemented.





The NRL has committed until 2028 to play regular season matches in Las Vegas as part of a strategic plan to win an international audience for the sport.

The Panthers led 12-10 at halftime and 22-10 after 52 minutes with tries to Isaah Yeo, Izack Tago, Laurie and Paul Alamoti. But the Sharks rallied strongly with second half tries to Kayal Iro and Addin Fonua-Blake to cut the lead to two points.

Laurie's late try allowed the Panther's to celebrate coach Ivan Cleary's 55th birthday in Vegas.

The Wigan Warriors beat the Warrington Wolves 38-24 in an English Super League match.

Wigan led 24-0 at halftime with tries to Tyler Dupree, Abbas Miski, Bevan French and Harry Smith in the repeat of last year's Challenge Cup final. Jai Field, Jake Wardle, Luke Thompson and Liam Marshall added second half tries as the United States became the seventh country to host a Super League match.

JILLAROOS EXCEL

Halfback Tarryn Aiken pulled the strings as the Australian Jillaroos crushed England 90-4 in the women's international.

Aiken produced an extraordinary play-making performance, picking England apart and laying on five tries for Tamika Upton, including a first half hat-trick. Julia Robinson and Jessica Sergis also scored hat-tricks in a 17 tries to one victory. England's only try was scored by Georgia Roche 34 seconds from fulltime.

England prop Vicky Whitfield was taken to hospital after a second half head clash with Sarah Togatuki which stopped the game for 10 minutes.



DPP WILL HAVE TO PAY AN INCREASINGLY HIGHER PRICE TO CONTINUE ITS DOOMED PAYCHECK POLICY

Although the cross-Strait situation remains stable, thanks to the strategic restraint Beijing exercises, the secessionist-minded Democratic Progressive Party authorities on Taiwan island have never stopped trying to make waves by proving their value to their external backers.

With the return of the "America first" fixated Donald Trump administration, the Lai Ching-te authorities of the island are focused on using economic interests to woo the administration's support for their secessionist cause. In their latest move in that regard, the DPP unveiled a plan to build a "non-red supply chain" with the United States at the expense of the island's competitive industry and development prospects.

Taiwan's semiconductor sector and dominant enterprises, the core competitiveness of the island, are to be employed as the means to meet their narrow ends.

The eagerness of the Lai authorities to cater to the Trump administration, whose coveting of the island's semiconductor industry is no secret, with their "paycheck policy" has met with wide opposition of the sector but garnered some "positive" responses from the US admi-

Shortly after Lai pledged to boost investment in the US under the excuse it was responding to the Trump administration's "global tariff threats", the US administration released \$5.3 billion in previously frozen foreign aid, including \$870 million in security exemptions for programs in the Chinese island, late last week.

Meanwhile, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio reaffirmed Washington's opposition to any change to the "status quo" in the Taiwan Strait, while saying that the US remains committed to its long-standing policies on Taiwan.

Yet the Lai authorities must be aware that the new administration stops short of mentioning such words as "values", "democracy" or "freedom" that dominated its predecessor's statements on Taiwan. Instead, the emphasis is on "investment", "tariffs" and "industries". That requires the DPP authorities to ceaselessly increase their input and adjust their expectations of the US side.

The shock waves caused by the US' about-face in its foreign and economic policies over the past month must have kept the Lai authorities in an extremely uneasy state. And the price Ukraine now faces for the US' support should give the DPP authorities cause for thought as they should realize that the price for the US' backing has risen steeply.

What the DPP authorities value the most is the US' reiterating of its "commitment" to "protect Taiwan" in case of "emergency". But what the US seems to be willing to promise so far is that it will prevent the "emergency" from happening rather than it will protect the island.

So Trump's refusal to answer a question from the media about whether "the US would allow China to take control of Taiwan by force" ahead of the first official Cabinet meeting of his second term on Wednesday must have dealt a heavy blow to the expectant Lai authorities.

Responding to that question, Trump said, "I never comment on that. I don't want to ever put myself in that position." And Taipei's unease will only have been further heightened by Trump's claim of his "great relations" with his Chinese counterpart, and the unquestioned openness of the US leader to strengthen economic and trade cooperation with the mainland.

That means, which should also be to the delight of the Trump administration, the Lai authorities will have to raise their stakes in the risky gambling. But the question is after offering even the jewel in the crown of the island's economy in the first month of the new US administration being in office, what else can they use to pay tribute to their imagined backers in Washington during the rest of their tenure. ISRAEL CUTS OFF AID TO GAZA IN ATTEMPT TO PRESSURE HAMAS TO ACCEPT NEW CEASEFIRE PROPOSAL

TSRAEL stopped the en-Ltry of all goods and supplies into the Gaza Strip yesterday and warned of "additional consequences" if Hamas doesn't accept a new proposal to extend the first phase of a fragile ceasefire.

Hamas accused Israel of trying to derail the truce and said its decision to cut off aid was "cheap extortion, a war crime and a blatant attack" on he truce deal. Both sides stopped short of saying the ceasefire had ended.

The first phase of the ceasefire, which included a surge in humanitarian assistance, expired on Saturday. The two sides have yet to negotiate the second phase, in which Hamas was to release dozens of remaining hostages in return for an Israeli pullout and a lasting ceasefire.

Israeli official, speaking on condition of anonymity in line with

regulations, said the decision to suspend aid was made in coordination with the Trump administration.

Israel says the new pro-

posal is backed by the US Israel said yesterday that it supports what it described as a proposal from U.S. Mideast envoy Steve Witkoff to extend the first phase of the ceasefire through Ramadan — the Muslim holy month of dawn-to-dusk fasting that began over the weekend — and the Jewish Passover holiday, which ends on April 20.

Under that proposal, Hamas would release half the hostages on the first day and the rest when an agreement is reached on a permanent ceasefire, according to Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's office.

Hamas warned that any attempt to delay or cancel the existing ceasefire agreement would have "humanitarian consequences" for the hostages and reiterated that the only way to free them was through implementing the deal and negotiating the second phase.

Hamas has said it is willing to free the remaining hostages all at once in Phase 2, but only in return for the release of more Palestinian prisoners, a permanent ceasefire and the full withdrawal of Israeli forces.

An Egyptian official said Hamas and Egypt would not accept a new proposal aimed at returning the remaining hostages without ending the war. The official noted that the agreement had called on the two sides to begin negotiations over Phase 2 in early February.

The official, who was not authorized to brief media and spoke on condition of anonymity, said mediators were trying to resolve the dispute. There was no immediate comment from the United States or Qatar, which along with Egypt has served as a key mediator with Hamas. MDT/AP
